

Yanks Gain Game On Sox; Braves Defeat Chicago

New York Yankees, who looked as though they could be had, padded their American League lead to 5½ games with a 2-0 victory at Baltimore Tuesday while Detroit Tigers chilled Chicago's second-place White Sox 3-1 in 11 innings on Al Kaline's home run.

In the National, Warren Spahn won his 18th and claimed the 41st shutout of his 13-year career, as Milwaukee beat Chicago Cubs 8-0. Hank Aaron belted his 39th home run in the Braves 11-11 barrage.

In night games second-place St. Louis was at Cincinnati, third-place Brooklyn played Philadelphia and Pittsburgh was at New York.

No other games were scheduled in the AL.

Bill Skowron got the job done for the Yankees, who were held to three hits for seven by young Billy O'Dell. Skowron had two of the three, rapping his 17th home run in the second, and drove in the other two with his third out, a ninth-inning single off reliever Billy Loes.

13TH VICTORY

Tom Sturdivant, who had two of New York's six hits, won his 13th, but needed ninth-inning help from Old Sal Maglie when George Kell led off with his third hit, a single. Maglie, in his Yankee debut after Sunday's purchase from Brooklyn, gave up a single to Bob Nieman but then nailed it as Jim Busby bunted into a force out, Tito Francona popped up and Joe Durham flied out.

Yankee Mickey Mantle was 0-for-4, losing three points for a .370 average. Boston's Ted Williams tops the bat race with .376. Kaline, who singled for Detroit's first run, led the 11th with his 21st homer. Gerry Staley, who had won five, lost his first. The 37-year-old righthander also gave up a pinch single by Ray Boone that tied it in the ninth after making his 40th relief appearance when Bob (no-hit) Keegan walked Charlie Maxwell to open the frame.

EIGHT HITS

Southpaw Billy Hoelt went all the way for his seventh victory. He allowed eight hits, but only two were damaging — Larry

Doby's 14th homer in the second and Walt Dropp's 13th home run in the ninth.

Spahn, 36, gave six hits, struck out five and walked but one while breaking a tie with Eppa Rixey and Larry French for the NL shutout record for lefties. The major league record for shutouts by a southpaw is 70, by Eddie Plank in the AL. Righthander Grover Cleveland Alexander set the NL shutout mark with 90.

The Braves, blanked for six on four hits by southpaw Dick Littlefield, scored five in the seventh, three unearned, on two walks, four singles and an error. Aaron made a real breeze with his three-run shot in the eighth, putting his major league leading RBI total at 118.

NEW YORK (AP)—New York Giants, helped along by second baseman Bill Maeroki, defeated Pittsburgh Pirates 6-5 in 12 innings Tuesday night on Ray Jablonski's sacrifice fly.

The Giants, scoring their other runs on homers by Willie Mays, Danny O'Connell and Vaino Thomas—who tied it 5-5 in the

ninth—made it when Maeroki suffered a mental lapse in the 12th.

With one out, O'Connell walked. Then Don Mueller tapped a soft liner which Maeroki knocked down. O'Connell, thinking the ball had been caught, stayed at first. But as Maeroki made a futile toss to first in an effort to get Mueller, O'Connell took off for second and slid in safely under a wild throw by first baseman Frank Thomas.

When the dust had settled, Maeroki's part in the fracas was ruled a fielder's choice. Thomas was awarded an error.

Mays was 3-for-5 and upped his average to .337.

JERSEY CITY, N. J. (AP)—A triple by Chico Fernandez and Willie Jones' pinch-hit sacrifice fly brought Philadelphia a 2-2, 12-inning victory over Brooklyn Tuesday night, dumping the third-place Dodgers 10 games behind first-place Yankees.

The Dodgers managed only three hits, two by Gil Hodges, off Jack Sanford, Dick Farrell and Bob Miller with Farrell winning his seventh.

Stassen Goes Back To London

WASHINGTON (AP)—U.S. negotiator Harold Stassen, apparently undaunted by Washington scepticism, flew back to London Monday night for more Western disarmament talks with Russia.

"The mutual interest in avoiding modern war is so large," he said before taking off, "that we feel we should be patient and persistent in these negotiations."

Stassen conferred with State Secretary Dulles shortly before leaving. He gave a first-hand report to President Eisenhower immediately after his arrival here Friday.

The next meeting of the five-power United Nations disarmament subcommittee in London is scheduled for today.

Soviet delegate Valerian Zorin has already denounced the Western plan as falling to provide a basis for negotiation.

Stassen said he expects to explain Western proposals in greater detail today and perhaps at subsequent sessions.

Whether today's meeting will be followed by other London sessions is uncertain. Most officials here think that the talks will be broken off soon by a recess of indefinite duration. Disarmament discussions might then be transferred to the United Nations General Assembly, which opens its annual session in New York Sept. 17.

Canada Grows At Fast Rate

TORONTO (CP)—Canada has been showing one of the fastest rates of growth in the world with a population increase of 15 per cent in the last 15 years, says the issue of the Bank of Nova Scotia's monthly review.

The review says that between mid-1951 and mid-1956 2,000,000 more persons were added to the Canadian population, which now numbers more than 16,500,000.

The rate of growth was faster than at any time since the early years of the century. The population increase in the last five years compares with 16 per cent in Venezuela, 12 per cent in Australia, New Zealand and Brazil and nine per cent in the United States.

The review says that in the prosperous conditions associated with the rapid expansion of the economy in recent years, the birth rate has been high, immigration has been high, and emigration relatively small.

Favorable economic conditions have been encouraging more people to marry young. The number of marriages has remained remarkably large considering that the group of native-born young people in recent years reflects the low birth rate of the early 50's.

Young people are having larger families than they were 15 years ago. There is an apparent tendency towards more families of three or four children rather than one or two.

In both the East and the West the fastest-growing counties (or census divisions) were those containing substantial cities, and those embracing new resources areas, the review says.

All parts of Canada are experiencing the population growth. The newer areas across the north has been a scene of quickening population while more people are leaving farms to move to urban centres.

Prince Charles, 8, Will Be Attending A Boarding School

NEWBURY, England (Reuters)—Prince Charles, eight-year-old heir to the throne, begins life in an English boarding school this month.

At the request of Buckingham Palace, the headmasters of Cheam School, which Prince Philip attended, opened their doors to the prince today and cheerfully described what will face the young prince when he arrives Sept. 23 as one of 12 "new boys" among the 90 students.

Right from the start, it will be made clear that Charles is just one of 12 new boys," said Peter Beck, 48, one of the two joint headmasters. "There will be no special treatment."

He will be called Charles by the boys and Prince Charles by the teachers and will sleep in an unheated, uncarpeted dormitory with six or seven other boys about his own age.

His bed probably will be a narrow wooden one, 200 years old, without springs and with a hard, thin mattress. He will make it himself in the morning.

QUEEN AMUSED

"When the Queen saw the bed, she laughed," Beck said, "and told Charles 'you won't be able to bounce on that.'"

The prince, who had a look at the school last month with his parents and sister, did not seem troubled. The dormitory has one mirror and five sinks. There is no heat but the boys may have as many blankets as they wish.

The staff, made up of a governess for the youngest boys, a woman music and drawing teacher, seven male teachers and the two headmasters, eat their meals with the boys in the "inn" room.

The fees are £300 a year, and the Queen will be expected to provide her son with either grey flannels or corduroys, the school cap and two school ties.

He must write home once a week and his letters will be scanned carefully, not for spelling errors but to be sure not for any sentiments expressed.

LITTLE TV

Charles, a great television fan, will be strictly rationed at Cheam. The school has one television set and it is turned on only when the headmasters think there is something worthwhile.

Apart from playing sports—cricket, soccer, rugby, tennis—the boys see a movie on Saturday nights, providing they haven't stacked up any "black" marks against themselves.

Enough "blacks" could send a boy, and this includes Charles, to the headmasters' study for a "talk" or a caning "in the customary place."

The prince, who is breaking royal tradition by going away to boarding school, will be mingling with boys of varied backgrounds
