Allies Challenge

Continued from page 1. truce commissioner, said the Communists could not be ready that soon.

Aside from the Red complaint of truce violations, the commission was working swiftly and smoothly to get the armistice operation in full swing.

By 10 p.m. (9 a.m. EDT) today, opposing armies were to complete the withdrawal from the battle-line. They will leave a buffer zone 2 1/2 miles wide winding 150 miles through abandoned hills and valleys once drenched in blood.

A political conference of belligerents and other interested nations, due to assemble by Oct. 26, will attempt to agree on unification of the country.

The undefeated Allied and Red armies completed much of the withdrawal during the first two days of the truce. Rear-guard units were manning the Allied side until the final hour tonight.

The withdrawal also was proceeding without incident on the heavily mined islands off the east and west coasts of North Korea.

The UN had maintained small radar and rescue stations there for downed pilots. The Allies have 10 days to evacuate the islands.

Guns sounded in Pyongyang, Red capital, where Marshal Kim Il Sung ordered a 12-gun salute "in commemoration of our victory over the interventionists."

There were no victory claims from South Korea where President Syngman Rhee remained grimly determined to unite the land.

lantic, the Bonn government established a food "air bridge" to Berlin Wednesday. A regular Pan American airliner brought in 4,400 pounds from Hamburg. More air cargo will follow.

Bonn food ministry dispatched 20 tons of American flour in a big diesel truck and trailer. It was delayed a total of 6-8 hours by two Communist customs inspections, but got through without confiscation.

Reg Premier Otto Grotewohl, who called the United States' original free food offer a "slander against the German people," went before the Soviet zone Volkskammer Parliament Wednesday.

He described the food relief in West Berlin as "American provocation," and said he was willing to buy \$15,000,000 or \$50,000,000 worth—more—of American food and other goods if America will sell it at world prices under equal terms," he asserted.

The reason Grotewohl talked of paying was obvious. He could not afford to let the Soviet Union appear miserably by comparison with the United States.

The Russians have agreed to sell Grotewohl's government more food in return for German manufactured products.

"MEET ME AT THE FAIR" RATED TECHNICOLOR HIT

Action, romance, comedy, plus ten great songs and a nostalgic breath from the American scene of a half century ago are blended with charming effect in Universal-International's Technicolor "Meet Me at the Fair," which opens today at the Prince Edward Theatre with Dan Dailey and Diana Lynn in the starring roles.

The film presents Dailey with many opportunities to project the singing and dancing talents for which he is justly famous. Miss Lynn appears in an excitingly different characterization and Chet Allen, 13-year-old singing discovery, makes his debut in the picture.

A new Diana Lynn emerges in the picture, which enables the star to wear costumes more daring than any she has ever displayed in a film and to pursue the object of her affection with delightful abandon.

Hugh O'Brian, young U-I contractee, turns in a telling performance as Diana's fiancé who is given the go-by after his conniving with crooks becomes apparent. Carole Mathews has the role of the other woman in the film, whose love for Dailey goes unrequited.
