### Local and Other Items.

**THE HOSPITAL FUND.**—The trustees of the P. E. Island Hospital thankfully acknowledge the receipt of \$25 donated towards the building fund of the new hospital by their talented and enterprising young friend R. D. McLeod, Esq., formerly of Rose Valley Lot 67, now vice-president of the Whiting Glass Works, Boston, Philadelphia, New York and Chicago.

**THE RAINFALL.**—Although fears have been entertained by some as to the damage which will be done to the grain crops this season, and although many have complained about the continual rain, especially this month, the rainfall of April, May, June and July of this year is not nearly up to that of 1897 or 1898. In 1897 the rainfall during April, May and June was 10 16 inches; last year 9.86 inches, and this year 6.90 inches. In July 1897, the rainfall was 4.52 inches, last year 3.35 inches and this year up to the 19th 3.63 inches. Certainly we have had a lot of rain this month, but it will be remembered that the damage last year was done in August after the grain was well shot into head. Our farmers are now hoping for a dry hay-making and if well housed the crop will probably be very fair, although of course not up to the extra yield of last year.

**A GOOD OUTING.**—The parishioners of St. Andrew's are at present making extensive preparations for their mammoth gathering on Tuesday, July 25th. The tea will be held on the old historic ground adjoining the church. Here you will see the site of the old St. Andrew's College the oldest institution of learning established on the Island. Here some of the shining lights of the 19th century received their early training. St. Andrew's is one of the most picturesque spots of the garden of the gulf. If teaparties are not in your line, arm yourself with a rod and spend a few hours angling in the placid waters of the Hillsboro where the speckled beauties abound in profusion not five minutes walk from the ground. A special train leaving Charlottetown at 10 o'clock local time on which you can obtain a return ticket for forty-five cents will place you on the spot. Come one, come all, and enjoy a days outing that will do you good for years.

#### THE QUEEN'S PRIZE

Canadians Making Good Scores at Bisley

BISLEY, July 17.—The second stage of the rifle shooting contest for her Majesty the Queen's prize began this morning. The contest is open only to volunteers and retired volunteers and is in three stages. Last week there were 1,770 competitors, of the first stage of the shooting at 200, 500 and 600 yards.

At 200 yards the Canadian Bertram and several others scored the highest possible, 35. Of the other Canadians, Cartwright, Robertson, and Huggins scored 33, Henry and Wilson 32, Gilchrist and Wetmore 31, Blair, Graham, Ogg and Fleming 30; Bravles, Weatherbe, Simpson and Buckley 29, and Heller and Ross 27.

The shooting in the second stage was at 500 and 600 yards, 10 shots at the first and 15 shots at the second.

**BUFFALO HERD.**—In connection with a vote for the Banff National Park, Mr. Sifton stated in the House of Commons a few days ago that the herd of buffalo there were doing phenomenally well and were now a fine herd.

**MEETING.**—The shareholders of the Masonic Temple Company will please remember the adjourned annual meeting of the shareholders of the above company to be held in Masonic Temple building this evening at 8 o'clock sharp.
