Whipping as Punishment.

HARTFORD, Conn., Nov. 12.—Judge Simeon E. Baldwin, of the Supreme Court, addressed the Businessmen's Association last evening on whipping as a punishment for crime. He favored whipping, but not the public whipping post, for wife beating and ruffians who knock people down and rob them, bullies who assault passers-by on the streets, men who assault with intent to kill or to ravish, and those who assault young girls or boys. He thought it would be a deterrent to crime and would deplete the jails and prisons, besides having a reforming and salutary effect upon those convicted of first offences.
