Gunman Kills Two On Earl Of Derby's Estate

LIVERPOOL, England, Oct. 9.—(AP)—A gunman attacked the Earl of Derby's country home to-night and killed two man servants, slightly wounded Lady Derby and injured a valet who tried to disarm him.

After a two-hour search police announced the arrest in Liverpool of 19-year-old Harold Winstanley, a footman employed at the Derby home, Knowsley Hall, near here.

They said he was armed when arrested and would be heard in magistrate's court tomorrow.

Lord Derby was attending a dinner at nearby Southport at the time of the shooting.

Lady Derby was taken to a hospital with bullet creases on one shoulder. She was suffering from shock. Killed were Walter Stallard, butler to Lord Derby, and Douglas Stewart, the second butler.

Pearson May Be Named President Of U. N. Assembly

OTTAWA, Oct. 9.—(CP)—External Affairs Minister Pearson leaves for New York this weekend and probably for his second straight big international job.

He will head Canada's delegation to the next meeting of the general assembly of the United Nations, starting Tuesday. Indications are that he will find himself president of the assembly, a position that will throw him into east-west arguments over Korea and several other global headaches.

Additions to the Canadian delegation are expected to be announced shortly because representatives of the parties in opposition in the Commons are due to go along as so-called parliamentary advisers. These are likely to include Gordon Graydon, Progressive Conservative member for Peel and foreign-affairs expert of the official opposition.

Mr. Pearson, who stepped down last month after a year as chairman of the Atlantic Pact Council, sat in on a cabinet meeting today. He will return to Ottawa from New York from time to time during the sessions.

The chairmanship of the Canadian delegation is expected to be turned over to Health Minister Martin if and when Mr. Pearson is given the assembly presidency. Mr. Martin is the other cabinet minister on the delegation.

S'side Board Of Trade Favors Town Purchase Of Old Post Office Bldg.

At the regular monthly meeting of the Summerside Board of Trade held last night in the Town Hall the following resolution was moved by Mr. Fred Bingham, seconded by Mr. T. Earle Hickey, C.A., and passed:

"Moved that the Summerside Board of Trade go on record as favoring the purchase of the old post office building by the town, as a temporary measure, for possible disposal at a later date to a responsible party or parties, who would see that it would be a credit to the town and not become an eyesore or made use of in a manner undesirable to a residential district. It is suggested that no further capital or operating expense be made by the town other than the purchase price."

Considerable discussion took place regarding this matter and the consensus of opinion of those present was that the town should acquire possession of the building and site. The fact that, unless it is taken over by the town, it could be purchased by private parties and perhaps converted into a warehouse, was a deciding factor in the action of the board in supporting the purchase of the post office building by the town.

It was stated that the purchase price would be \$7,500.00. The Provincial Government having indicated that it had no intention of purchasing the property, the Town of Summerside is the next on the priority list and should the town decide against the purchase the building will then be put up at auction to private party or parties.

No action was taken on the matter except to instruct the secretary to again write the Town Council asking that the proper authority be obtained to demolish any building which, in the opinion of the fire marshal, was a definite fire hazard.

Mr. Lloyd Gorrill brought up the matter of the inconvenience caused to the public of this province, travelling to the mainland, by the fact that there is no seven o'clock crossing of the car ferry in the morning.

After some discussion the secretary was instructed to write to Mr. B. Graham Rogers, director of transportation and request that application be made to the proper authorities to have this early morning crossing put into effect, at least during the summer months.
