PHOTOGRAPHS WANTED.

LORD STRATHCONA, the High Commissioner for Canada, desires the individual photographs of all officers, non-commissioned officers and men who have proceeded or about to proceed to South Africa on active service. The families and friends of the officers and men concerned are requested to send the photographs required to Lieut. Colonel Moore, D. O. C. who will forward them to headquarters. It is supposed that the photographs are to be obtained in compliance with the request of the Queen. We have no doubt. In every case there will be a prompt response to Lord Strathcona's desire.

—Mr R. K. Brace has received, through the Hon. N. Clarke Wallace, a letter from Lieut. Col. Cotton, assuring him that his son, wounded at Paardeberg, is doing well. By the way, Mr. Brace was the Inspector of Gas for this city until summarily dismissed by the Laurier-Tarte Government. A strange reward for sending his son to the front!

—Commenting upon La Patrie's inflammatory article on the Montreal traces and the fact that La Patrie is Mr. Tarte's personal organ—purchased, by the way with \$20,000 from the Drummond deal—the Brooklyn Times says that "the sooner this mischievous little man is removed from the sphere of active politics in Canada, the better for Canadians of all classes. He is a political incendiary and agitator, and a perpetual menace to the nation."

—An Ottawa correspondent reports that Mr. Pineo "has a natural desire to visit the land of his ancestors, though his desire to carry out the wishes of the people who elected him would lead him to prefer a postponement of the engagement until after the provincial session. This, however, does not meet the views of the two Governments." We should think not. Mr. Pineo has been offered the position in Paris only that he may be absent during the Provincial session! Apart from Mr. J. S. Clarke, there are in this Province several good supporters of the Liberal Party who would be glad to go to Paris at \$5 or \$10 per day and all expenses paid. But Mr. Pineo holds the key of the Provincial position in respect to Sir Louis as well as Premier Farquharson. So he was taken, and all true Liberals left.

THE MINTO

Sir,—On the 13th February, the day I crossed in the Minto, there was then no trouble for the Princess to cross that day. To prove this I may say that we had a heavy south east to south storm February 18th, 22nd, 25th and March 2nd,—four storms in succession; and how is it that Georgetown harbor is not ice-locked as it used to be in former years, after a southerly storm,—especially with no board ice in harbor to keep heavy ice from coming in? Where is the 25 feet ice, or 10 feet, or one foot ice? Or how is it that it is not coming in to open harbors to the north of it? The first of this month a schooner was launched in open water at Murray Harbor. What is the use of the Patriot writing nonsense about the ice and the Minto. We know that the Patriot's writer at Georgetown takes his writing at the table in the saloon of the Minto. The trouble with the Minto is in her rose—the holes in rose are too big and when she gets in ice she creaks and then certainly she must stop. It is a good job for the builders that this is a fine winter. The Stanley was troubled the same way the first winter. But the next summer on the slip she was put to rights—which will be done to the Minto. But if the Government had sent Mr. McMillan across as did the Tory party when building the Stanley, the Minto's rose would be all right. Now, Sir, you can see Capt. Finlayson's drift for saying there was no use in bringing the Stanley out to do what the Minto could not do. It was all a bluff. By bringing the Stanley out, it would expose the Minto, and Finlayson wants to screen the Davies party, and at the same time he is working for the builders of that boat, and they are getting her off their hands quite easy. I tell you the Minto is not what she ought to be, and the public will know it by and by.

The Charlottetown people should push the Stanley out for there was no trouble for her to run daily to Charlottetown all winter. Captain Hyde, Murray Harbor, crossed the first of this week. She stuck in a small pan of thin ice and lay there until next day when the pan broke up and she got in open water all over the pan. It is an outrage that the public, or shippers of Charlottetown, should be so deceived. The Board of Trade should wake up.

Rev. G. M. Campbell leaves tonight on return to Fredericton.

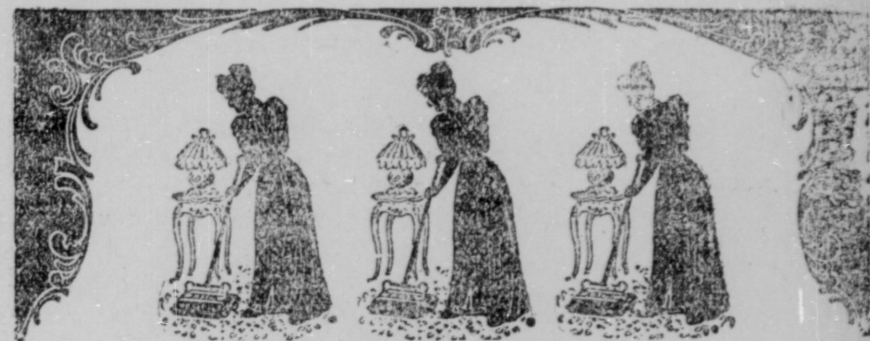
Mr. S. C. Moore crossed by the Minto today en route to Halifax.

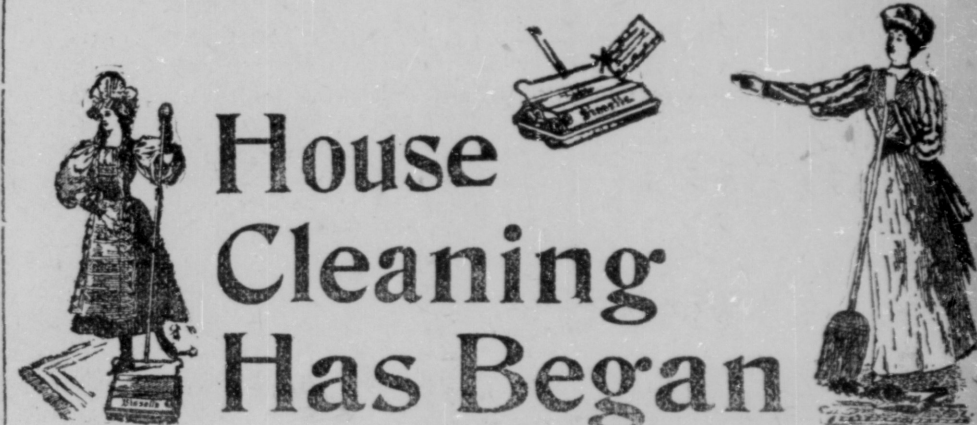
