

# Local Man Plays In Film Produced In British Isles



ERROL MacKINNON, WITH CAP IN "HIGH TIDE AT NOON"

Of interest to Charlottetown readers in connection with the J. Arthur Rank production "High Tide at Noon" is the fact that an important role is played by a native of this city. He is Errol MacKinnon son of Mrs. Alice MacKinnon (Doul) and the late Dr. Wilbur MacKinnon, veterinary surgeon and at one time meat inspector in Charlottetown.

His mother is presently employed with the National Film Board in Montreal. William Taylor, Guardian Photographer is a first cousin and Mrs. Hector MacNeill of 261 Fitzroy Street as well as Mrs. Windsor Bell of South Melville are his aunts.

Mr. MacKinnon first started his professional career as a radio announcer at CFXY. He also worked as a bank cashier in Murray River, Montague and Ottawa before joining the Canadian Navy during the last war.

Then came a spell in radio and TV in Boston and a season with the Canadian Repertory Theatre in 1949. He went to England in 1953 and has since appeared in "Desperate Hours" on TV.

"High Tide at Noon" is a story of MacKenzie Island, and its people, a tiny fishing community of Nova Scotia. It has had its premiere at Halifax on July 10. Mr. MacKinnon plays the part of the village storekeeper. This is perhaps significant when it is recalled that his grandfather, the late Ewen MacKinnon, kept store at Hampton, P.E.I. for many years before his death.

## Suggests Old Drowning Action

BUFFALO, N.Y. (AP)—Blowing air directly into the lungs of a drowning or shock victim has been called the best method of artificial respiration by three medical researchers.

They said Monday night that experiments here and at Baltimore City Hospital have proved the mouth-to-mouth method "infinitely superior" to other methods, including the back-pressure arm-lift system.

Dr. James Elam of Buffalo said that on five of the 10 subjects the back-pressure method failed to force any air into the lungs. Because of the subjects' heavy builds, he said, the tongue lodged against the rear of the throat and blocked the air passage.

HE SAID THE GREATEST ADVANTAGE of the old but neglected mouth-to-mouth method is that it forces the rescuer to make sure the air passages are clear.

The back pressure method was successful on the other five subjects but it drew only one-quarter of the air into the lungs that breathing directly into the mouth did.

Dr. Elam is director of the department of anesthesiology at Roswell Park Memorial Institute in Buffalo. The other doctors are Dr. Peter Safar, chief of anesthesiology at Baltimore City Hospital, and Dr. David G. Greene, professor at the University of Buffalo. The group plans to publish its findings in medical journals.



## Player Of Toronto Dies at 80

DETROIT (AP)—Tonto, the lone ranger's trusty Indian friend, is dead. But his guttural voice will continue to symbolize the faithful red man to thousands of kids yet unborn.

John Todd, 80, who looked more like an English squire than an Indian, died Sunday in hospital here. For almost two decades Todd was Tonto in more than 2,500 half-hour radio shows.

The live broadcasts were discontinued about two years ago. But transcriptions of the old lone ranger program are still being broadcast over hundreds of stations. The program will probably continue for years.

At one time, a real Indian was hired to understudy Todd and he played the part on several programs. But stations were deluged with telephone calls from children who complained the real Indian didn't "sound like an Indian."

Todd resumed his normal schedule and the Indian was put to work running a station mimeograph machine.

## Addresses Of Welcome To Visiting Papal Delegate

Following is the text of the addresses of welcome delivered at St. Dunstan's Basilica last evening to the Most Rev. Giovanni Panico, visiting Apostolic Delegate to Canada.

Address by the Most Rev. Malcolm A. MacEachern, Bishop of Charlottetown:

"Your Excellency: "Since our lay men and women wish to express their sentiments of appreciation and loyalty this evening, and the clergy wish to do likewise tomorrow, I feel that my few remarks should be more or less of a personal character. "My first words will be ones of greeting to Your Excellency in your vicarial capacity as personal representative of Our Holy Father, Pope Pius XII whom we all admire as the most outstanding Pontiff of modern times. When he speaks with authority and conviction in matters pertaining to faith and morals—when he addresses words of wisdom and understanding to such diversified classes as shepherds and jurists, midwives and diplomats, miners and astronomers, artists and railwaymen, dress-makers and theologians, we cannot but be astonished at the range of his knowledge and the ease with which he can accommodate himself to them all, and in his person, words and actions, we perceive the universality and humanity of the Church as well as its Divine character. As Vicar of Christ on earth and visible Head of the Church he is giving an intellectual and moral leadership which commands the respect and admiration of all men, and we cannot but have the conviction that in the light of his guidance the finger of God is everlastingly present.

**HIGH QUALIFICATIONS**

"To be deemed worthy of representing such an outstanding Pope here in our evergrowing Canada, is an indication of the trust and confidence placed in Your Excellency. This leads me to greet you in your own right. Your natural talents and world-wide experience place you in a favourable position as the bond which joins us with the Head of the Church and, as a proficient guide in our many and complex problems. You have been trained in the world's most famous universities including those of diplomacy, and, to your academic accomplishments you have added a wealth of the practical order in many countries such as Colombia, Argentina, Czechoslovakia, the Saar, Australia and Peru before coming to Canada. Your graciousness, your affability, your charm, your many other admirable qualities, all add to your stature as an accomplished diplomat and Churchman. Your zealous efforts to further the interests of the Church in our land since your arrival are known to and appreciated by all.
