COLLECTING LEAVES.

Here is a Good Way to Preserve Them.

The method once generally followed to preserve autumn leaves was to press them with an iron that had been rubbed on a piece of beeswax; but this produces a very stiff effect, and renders the tips of the leaves quite brittle, while the wax imparts a high, unnatural gloss. A newer and more successful plan consists in painting the under side of each leaf with linseed oil, ironing it immediately, and then painting and ironing the upper side in the same way. This treatment gives the leaves sufficient gloss, while they remain quite pliable. It is not necessary to press and dry the leaves beforehand, but there are some painstaking ones who do this. It is said that the tints may even be well preserved by painting only the upper side of leaves with oil and then laying them, without ironing, between newspapers under heavy weights, and leaving them quite dry.—Delineator.

THE U. S. DEFICIT.

Secretary of the Treasury Makes it Out as Being \$38,000,000.

WASHINGTON, D. C., November 5.—The treasurer of the United States has submitted to the Secretary of the Treasury the annual report of the transactions and condition of the treasury for the past fiscal year. The net ordinary revenues of the Government were \$405,321,335, an increase of \$57,597,630, over those of the previous year, while the net ordinary expenditures were \$443,368,582, an increase of \$77,594,423. The resulting deficiency of \$38,047,247 exceeds that of the preceding year by \$19,994,793.

Acetylene Explosion.

OTTAWA, November 4.—A serious acetylene gas explosion occurred at Cobden at five o'clock, as a result of which Mr Arthur G Best, agent for the Massey Harris Company at that place, and son of Mr W J Best, manager of the Massey-Harris Company here, had his face and right hand severely burned, and it is possible that his eyes may be injured. Mr Best had taken the agency for acetylene gas lighting for Cobden and surrounding district, and was engaged in installing his first plant in Arne's jewellery store, when the explosion occurred. The accident was due to Mr Best's opening the carbide chamber and holding a lighted candle over it.

NEWS NOTES.

Some New York state doctors are accused of calling smallpox by other names, in order to avoid reporting the disease, and causing their patients' families annoyance. Physicians who would add to the risk of the spread of a dangerous epidemic have a good deal yet to learn in the matter of the duties of their profession.

THE MAIL ARRANGEMENT.—The Agriculturist, of Summerside, refers to the new mail arrangement and says: "It seems a long, roundabout way for mails and passengers to reach the Island, during these months when the Point du Chene route is just as available as in summer, and it strikes one very forcibly that some arrangement could have been made for close connection between the C.P. Express and the Northumberland, which would for some weeks to come, obviate the necessity of sending mails and passengers right past the Northumberland and away around by Pictou, and we trust that another season will see this matter, finally adjusted upon a basis satisfactory to all." This is a point to be noted and provided for next year.

AUSTRIA-HUNGARY.

The laws of Austria-Hungary are published in eight different languages.

The name Hapsburg, or Habsburg, was originally Habichtsburg—that is, Hawk castle.

Hapsburg prosperity has always depended upon luck, marriage and diplomacy. They have known little of the art of governing.

The dual monarchy is not a happy family. The Hungarians dislike the Austrians, but they are very fond of the present emperor.

The frontier of Austria-Hungary measures 5,395 miles, defended by 25 or 30 fortified cities, camps and coast fortifications. Vienna, the capital, is undefended.

Casimir Felix Baden, late premier of the monarch of Austria-Hungary, was the son of a cook. This is the more remarkable because of the rigid loyalty to rank and high birth in the Austrian court.

The style of the emperor's dominion is the Austria-Hungarian monarchy. This is made up of the kingdom of Hungary, with its principalities, and the empire of Austria. The latter was an archduchy until 1806.

In Vienna a man is often admitted to court socially because of his official position whose wife is never received. No matter how high he rises and how powerful he becomes, his wife is barred. Even the late empress was snubbed because she was only the daughter of a duke.

On a peace footing the Austria-Hungarian army numbers 24,583 officers, 334,114 men, 47,149 horses. On a war footing the numbers are put at 45,238 officers, 1,820,940 men and 281,886 horses, while the number of men who might be compelled to serve in the landsturm, or national guard, is over 4,000,000.

Buddhism in Burma.

Some sailors on board one of her majesty's ships at Rangun obtained leave of absence to go into the interior and lost their way. A short time afterward they were brought back by some Burmese, who had fed them and showed them the way home. The Burmese immediately returned to their village, and, though the then chief commissioner, the late Sir Charles Aitchison, endeavored to find them, in order to reward them, I believe he never succeeded. It caused a good deal of comment in Rangun at the time. I think it is interesting as showing the effect of the teaching of Buddha and how it saves the Burman from that "lust of gain" which, as you say, "has taken so strong a hold of our civilization," though I sometimes found it inconvenient living in a land where the people are so utterly indifferent to money.—Spectator.
