

# S' side Buffeted By Winds, Snow

SUMMERSIDE — The Summerside area got its usual pre-Christmas buffeting Saturday night when 3.2 inches of snow blanketed the area and was piled high by winds howling out of the west northwest that gusted to 62 miles per hour.

Town police last evening reported a quiet weekend and no traffic accidents as a result of the storm.

Christmas decorations which were being placed were slapped around by the high winds but little damage was done as most were securely placed.

The Christmas scene in Summerside is attracting wide attention this year as many residents have installed quite elaborate decorations which added much to the nighttime scene and traffic in many areas has been heavy the past two evenings.

All main roads are open but a few secondary roads are not.

## St. Eleanors Turkey Farm Loses 80 Turkeys in Blaze

AN ESTIMATED \$12,000 damage was caused by fire yesterday morning when nearly 800 dressing turkeys, owned by Norman Johnston, St. Eleanors were lost to flames as the fire which broke out around 6.30 a.m. was believed caused by a faulty oil space heater. Some people are seen looking over the ruins, which included a lot of well roasted turkeys, yesterday afternoon.

Approximately 800 turkeys, many of which were destined for Summerside and vicinity homes today, were destroyed in an early morning fire yesterday at St. Eleanors, when a two-story 30 by 40 building, owned by Norman Johnston, went up in flames.

Another larger building, about 20 feet away was saved by fire department, while a third building, containing many more turkeys, was not endangered.

Also lost was a tractor and other equipment with the total loss being estimated in excess of \$12,000. The building and turkeys were insured.

The fire, which had apparently been burning for some time, was first noticed by Vance Harris, who was dispatched to the scene.

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## Lone Case Heard In S' side Court

SUMMERSIDE — Only one case was on the docket of town police court Saturday. A lone drunk plaided guilty and was fined \$20 and costs. Police received no reports of serious accidents overnight despite the dangerous driving.

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## S' side Council Sets Holiday For Dec. 26

SUMMERSIDE — Summerside Town Council met briefly Saturday afternoon to approve three resolutions, one of which declared Boxing Day, Dec. 26 a civic holiday in Summerside.

Mayor J.R. Morrison presided with all members present except Councilman Leo Wood.

Another resolution approved extension of date for completion of the assessment roll to Feb. 28, 1963, as council had been advised by the assessor it would be next year's assessment by Dec. 31.

A third resolution had to do with transfer of accounts from the Bank of Nova Scotia. It was the opinion of council that the business of the bank should be distributed locally where such is warranted. Because the Bank of Nova Scotia is receiving the full patronage of the town's borrowing and deposit accounts, except for the small amount of services which is carried at the Provincial Bank of Canada, the change was made.

(Continued from page 1) ocean freighter African Pilot which carried \$10,000,000 worth of the food and drugs, a shipment on the ransom. The ship was captured by Cuban forces at 3:05 p.m. AST. It was three hours more before the first freedom fighter could be off.

More than 300 newspaper and television workers were at the base, along with a scattering of others, including leaders of the Cuban 700 Miles Committee whose long efforts to free the men finally were crowned with success. Authorities had taken precautions to limit the crowd at the base.

Slowly, then faster, they came down the ramp—the men who had known the heartbreak of defeat of their mission in Cuba 20 months ago, men who had lived through bitter humiliations and who had received 20 years prison sentences, the misery of life in a prison crowded with political captives.

MUCH EMOTION The scene was laden with emotion. Some of the liberated men charged impatiently down the ramp, two steps at a time, laughing with joy.

Most looked happy although some seemed tired.

Some stopped to shake hands with acquaintances, hugging their comrades who were exchanged on credit early in the year.

"I have now kissed the land of liberty," shouted 21-year-old Oscar Corayo, as he embraced his father, Coray, who lives in New York. Another youth, standing near by, wept quietly.

Members of the 60-man group of wounded prisoners who had been released earlier in the year were at the air base, wearing yellow tee-shirts as a mark of homage to the arrivals, who had been forced by Castro's regime to wear yellow as a token of shame. "A badge of honor," one man called the yellow shirt.

## Airman Retires After 24 Years
