The Weather Holds

Since writing our last newsletter, harvesting weather has been ideal, and while the weatherman was giving out warnings based on the possibility of a wandering hurricane visiting here, yet the storm evidently had other ideas and this province was spared. Rain is still needed but most farmers would prefer to wait a few days longer in order that grain might be saved in good condition.

Grain crops are spotty this year, some very good, some very poor, with the average quite likely below last year.

Livestock Auctions

There is likely less organization in and less real bargaining power on the part of the farmer in connection with the sale of cattle in this province than with any other farm commodity.

The farmer's bargaining power usually depends on his ability to sell the average number of animals to make a good sale. The buyer, who may purchase hundreds of cattle and who usually has a good knowledge of market values, is an expert in this line or less of an amateur.

For some years past, at various centres in Western Canada and in Ontario, livestock auctions for fat and feeder cattle have been developed and are reputed to have had the effect of strengthening markets and giving the farmer better returns.

At such an auction with a number of buyers present, competition which is not present in the person to person transaction which is the usual method employed in making a sale.

The possibility exists that the setting up of such public auctions in the Maritimes could effect some improvement in the present system which from the farmers' standpoint is far from perfect.

Potato Market Survey

From the fruit and vegetable market report of August 25th we quote information for the various parts of Canada on the potato crop.

Prince Edward Island—Potato crop prospects continue good. August movement heavier than usual due to better prices.

Nova Scotia—Potato crop in general below average in both quality and quantity.

New Brunswick—Early cobs were light, prospects better for later varieties due to more moisture.

Quebec—Early crop disappointing, below average yield expected for late varieties.

Ontario—Early crop was not heavy, late crop appears satisfactory, market has eased off with shipments offered from Manitoba, Alberta and the Maritimes. Wholesale price in vicinity of \$4.50 per bag.

British Columbia—Early crop all marketed, late crop appears satisfactory.

Alberta—Bumper crop in prospect.

Neighborhood Groups

The rapid increase in cost, size and capacity of farm machinery constitutes a real problem for the operator of the 100-acre farm.

The equipping of such a farm with tractors, cultivating equipment, potato machinery, baler, combine, forage harvester, results in an outlay altogether out of proportion to the value of the farm and the earnings thereon.

That such machinery is desirable from a labor-saving and efficiency standpoint appears to be evident. The solution of the problem is either larger farms or group ownership of machinery.

Larger farms will mean smaller population and the disappearance of the family type farm which has a great deal to recommend it in the building of a sound, stable, Christian nation.

Federation Meetings

Federation members and officers of school district groups may expect to have school district meetings called towards the latter part of September.

A number of important questions will be up for discussion. The usefulness and vitality of any organization depends upon the interest of the individual member and his willingness to take an active part in its affairs.

The willingness to attend meetings, offer suggestions and criticism is the best way to have an organization develop the sort of program and do the things done which the members are interested in.

Farm Account Book

The Department of Public Printing and Stationery, Ottawa, has available for farmers a Farm Account Book which contains a year's supply of record forms, especially for farmers, inventory sheets for everything on the farm, crop record sheets and a variety of general information.

While this may not be the usual time of the year to think about a Farm Account Book, yet four months may not be too far in advance to start planning the carrying out in 1953 the good resolutions made for 1952.
