27 More Men Are Laid Off

GEORGETOWN — On Friday evening it is reliably reported that 23 employees of Bathurst Marine Ltd. were laid off work. This figure added to the seven men laid off earlier in the week gave a total of 30 men laid off last week.

As far as could be learned, the layoffs were at least partially attributed to a shortage of working materials and mainly affected laborers, a number of carpenters, and other trade helpers.

The men laid off, are reported to have been taken off the bottom of the seniority list as determined by the date of commencement with the company.

Finnish Ship Loads Pulpwood

GEORGETOWN — The large Finnish freighter, SS Atlas, under command of Captain Bertin, arrived in Georgetown on Friday evening from Cuba. On Saturday morning, longshoremen commenced loading the ship with a cargo of 1,500 cords of sap-barked and machine peeled pulpwood from the pulpwood storage of Quigley Pulpwood here.

It is expected that completion of the loading will be on Tuesday or Wednesday and the ship will then proceed to Florida where an additional 1,800 cords of pulpwood will be loaded before she proceeds to her destination overseas.

The SS Atlas loaded pulpwood here for overseas during the Christmas holidays several years ago. On Friday the ship was taken into port by harbour pilot, Roy Clow.

Two Fires Are Reported

Two alarms were answered over the weekend by the Mt Stewart Fire Department. Fire Chief Eldon Glover, reported the first one was responded to on Friday, at 1:30 p.m. The fire was at the farm of William Gunn, of Savage Harbour. Mr. Gunn lost a large barn 50 x 24 about 500 bales of hay, a quantity of oats and some farm implements. Estimated loss was \$350. The Fire Department saved two other small barns that were near the burned one.

The second alarm came about 11:30 a.m. on Friday, from the residence of Frank Handrhan, Fanningbrook, where the fire cracked in three places and caused about \$300 damage.
