THE PROGS.—Fresh to strong southerly and southerly winds, cloudy and foggy, becoming showery.

FREE FOR-ALL.—In the free-for-all race at Sydney on Saturday Minota won. Best time, 2:22. Montrose was second and Minnie third.

SUPREME COURT.—Supreme Court opens at Georgetown to-morrow. Mr. Justice Hodgson, the Attorney-General, the clerk of the court, and several other lawyers go down on the morning train.

ST. ANDREWS TEA.—A special train will leave Charlottetown on the 25th inst for the St. Andrews Tea, calling at intermediate stations. Fare from Charlottetown, forty-five cents, other stations in like proportion.

GOOD.—Work has again commenced on the Park Roadway. A new top timber is to be placed around the balance of the breastwork from the bathing house to Brighton Road and the roadway is to be properly ballasted and graded. The timber has been supplied by Mr. Compton, of Flat River and the City Surveyor has charge of the work.

SOCIAL MEETING.—The ladies of the W M S of the First Methodist Church will hold a social meeting at the residence of Mrs F S Moore, "Watermere," this evening from 7 to 9:30. All members of the society are urgently requested to attend, and have the privilege of bringing a friend with them. A silver collection in aid of mission work will be taken up.

THE BRIDGE.—The Dredge Prince Edward this morning moved over from the railway wharf to dredge the dock on the eastern side of Mr. Lemuel M Poole's wharf. Mr. Poole is having the dock dredged to a depth of eighteen feet at dead low water, so that the Grand Duchess will be able to lie along the side of the wharf, and so that he will be able to provide accommodation for the largest steamers coming here.

His Honor the Lieutenant Governor and party also went up in the train. Accessions of passengers along the route brought the number up to over three hundred.
