ST. JOHN'S, Nfld. (CP)—The rest of the plan, which would transmit the power through the Maritimes and into New England, is open to further study," he said. An alternate route would be through Quebec to customers in Ontario and the United States. Mr. Winters, who spoke in the legislature with the permission of the House, said power would be available to Quebec if it was wanted there.

POWER FOR OTHERS
Mr. Smallwood said Brinco was bearing in mind and sharing Newfoundland's strong desire that Labrador power be made available to sister provinces of Canada including Nova Scotia, Prince Edward Island, New Brunswick, Quebec and Ontario.

He said Brinco will "commence immediate investigation of the most economic way to transmit Labrador power to those five provinces." The British consulting firm of Preece, Cardew and Rider had earlier found transmission by submarine cable to be economically feasible and the government had expressed favor in the route.

There was no definite statement from either speaker that the project would get underway in the near future, but Premier Smallwood said "we can see no reason whatsoever why the development should not be carried out by Brinco and completed early in the spring."

Dr. Bonnell Is Named Liberal House Leader

A Liberal caucus has chosen Dr. M.L. Bonnell (4th Kings) as leader of the opposition in the provincial legislature.

The announcement was made in the Legislature yesterday by A.W. Matheson (L-4th Kings) who resigned Monday as leader of the Liberal party in the province.

Outside the house, Mr. Matheson said the constitution of the provincial Liberal party provides for the naming of a house leader.

He added that the constitution also sets out the procedure for a convention to choose a provincial leader.

W.R. Jenkins, president of the P.E.I. Liberal Association, is out of the province and was unavailable for comment on when a convention will be held.

Dr. Bonnell, who has a medical practice at Murray River was health minister in Mr. Matheson's cabinet from 1955 to 1959 when Premier Walter Shaw's Progressive Conservatives took power. He is regarded as the top contender for the party leadership.

A native of Hopfield, P.E.I., Dr. Bonnell was educated in Charlottetown and received his degree in medicine from Dalhousie University. He was first elected in 4th Kings in the 1951 general election.

White Clergymen Join Demonstration

SELMA, Ala. (AP)—More than 350 Negroes and white clergymen marched from a church here Wednesday night and stood in the street singing and praying after police halted the procession.

It was the first night march since Governor George C. Wallace banned after-dark demonstrations following a violent outburst at nearby Marion the night of Feb. 18.

Negro leaders vowed they would stay in the street until arrested or allowed to proceed. Wednesday night's march—halted after a half a block—pushed to a total of 2,000 the number of demonstrators who surged into the streets here and at Montgomery, the state capital, in the long, tense day.

Five hundred marchers were blocked by police in the daylight demonstration here. But nearly 1,000 marched in Montgomery, massing at the white-domed state capital in a futile effort to hand the governor a civil rights petition.

MOST WERE NEGROES
The Montgomery marchers, most of them Negroes, dwindled to only about 200 after darkness fell. But the remnant remained in the street facing the capitol. Police stood around them.

In between the marches, Selma police arrested three white men on charges of assaulting three out-of-state white clergymen who took part in a march here Tuesday. One of the ministers, Rev. James J. Reeb of Boston, lay near death in a Birmingham hospital.

Civil rights trouble—shooter John Doar of the justice department met with Dr. Martin Luther King Jr., who touched off the mushrooming Negro voter drive nearly eight weeks ago.

Defeat Critical Of Rivard Case

OTTAWA (CP)—Opposition Leader Diefenbaker said Wednesday that Justice Minister Favreau now has established seven days as the normal "head start" for persons who break jail.

Mr. Diefenbaker, commenting to reporters on Mr. Favreau's Tuesday night announcement of a \$15,000 reward for the recapture of Lucien Rivard, recalled he had proposed such action a few hours after the narcotics smuggling suspect went over the wall of Montreal's Bordeaux Jail March 2.

He said Mr. Favreau told the Commons consideration would be given to offering a reward if there appeared to be any unusual delay in capturing Rivard.

"The minister of justice has set out seven days as the normal head start or period of grace given escapees before the full weight of the law is invoked."

He said Mr. Favreau has made a mockery of Canadian justice and has belatedly acknowledged in offering the reward federal responsibility and liability for prisoners such as Rivard.

Religious Friction Revives

DA NANG, South Viet Nam (AP)—Revived religious friction brought arson and gunfire Wednesday to Da Nang, the site of a strategic air base newly reinforced by 3,500 U.S. marines.

Buddhist youths burned the homes of four Roman Catholics in reprisal for the fatal stabbing of a Buddhist soldier by a Catholic soldier in a card game Sunday.

South Vietnamese rangers fired into the air to break up a crowd of Buddhist demonstrators shouting anti-Catholic slogans. They arrested 16 persons. No Americans were involved.

As the U.S. marines expanded their holdings in this area 9 miles south of the North Vietnamese border, U.S. Air Force fighter-bombers staged another raid, apparently against Communist bases and supply lines in eastern Laos territory held by the pro-Communist Pathet Lao. As in such strikes in the past, the F-100 and F-105 jets returned here without fanfare or official comment.

Provincial Government Wins Non-Confidence Vote 16-13

The provincial government yesterday survived the first motion of non-confidence of the 1965 Legislature session.

The motion, defeated on straight party lines, with 13 Liberals voting for the motion and 16 Conservatives against, was introduced in the Legislature yesterday by Opposition Leader M.

Bonnell and seconded by William Acorn (L-1st Kings). Presented as an amendment to the address in reply to the Speech from the Throne, the motion stated the government members "failed to give leadership in the face of serious deficit financing and as a result, they are not entitled to the confidence of this House and have lost the confidence of the people of Prince Edward Island."

In making the motion, Dr. Bonnell referred to what he termed "the seriousness of the financial statement and the fact that the government apparently doesn't want to consider the seriousness of it."

He said the premier should not publicly discuss the finances of the province in a serious condition, rather than indicate that "behind closed doors" when seeking aid from Ottawa.

CHIDES MR. FARMER
Chiding Attorney-General Alban Farmer for statements he made earlier in the session with regard to the federal Liberal Party, Dr. Bonnell said "the most serious part of the whole thing is that this same man, who also happens to hold the position of provincial treasurer, is the one who has to go to Ottawa and ask for money for the province—he's the one who called the Liberal Party one 'founded on

debt."

He said the premier should not publicly discuss the finances of the province in a serious condition, rather than indicate that "behind closed doors" when seeking aid from Ottawa.

Floral Emblem Change Made, 4th Kings MLA Tells House

A.W. Matheson (L-4th Kings) maintained in the Legislature yesterday that an act which pinned down the official floral emblem of the province as "Cypripedium Acaule" is contrary to the emblem named in the original act of 1947.

He reviewed the history of the act and said that the suggestion for a floral emblem was made by the late Blythe Hurst who wrote a weekly column for The Guardian.

"The emblem selected 18 years ago to honor Blythe Hurst," said Mr. Matheson, "was Cypripedium Hirsutum and not the Moccasin Flower which was made the official floral emblem by a recent act of this Legislature."

He added "if the House has made a mistake, let's correct it."

DEFICITS SUGGESTED

Income Tax Cut Urged By CLC

OTTAWA (CP)—A 250-member delegation from the Canadian Labor Congress (called on the government Wednesday to reduce personal income taxes, boost federal spending and continue deficit budget-making to keep the current economic upswing in motion.

Prime Minister Pearson said he agrees with the need for strong expansionary measures but appeared to question the CLC's opposition to a balanced budget when he said:

"Perhaps you're right. But if you can't secure a balanced budget in a time of expansion, it certainly will be difficult to do it at other times."

Labor Minister MacEachen assured the delegation the government is continuing its efforts to reduce unemployment. He said there has been a steady improvement in the situation during the last year, with the January jobless rate down to 4.3 per cent of the labor force on the seasonally adjusted figure.

The Commons continued study of the contributory Canada Pension Plan after a wrangle over a reply by Justice Minister Favreau.

Opposition leader Diefenbaker insisted Mr. Favreau made a false reply to a question concerning a letter exchange with the Quebec government.

Mr. Favreau insisted his reply was true and demanded a withdrawal, refused by Mr. Diefenbaker.

After a heated shouting match, the matter was dropped and the house proceeded with its business.

On the pension plan, the house approved a government amendment to allow a drop-off of 15 per cent of low-earning years in figuring benefits.

The original bill allowed 10 per cent and NDP and Conservative members pressed for 20 per cent but were defeated 64 to 60.

Arabs Unite In Move Against W. Germany

BEIRUT, Lebanon (Reuters) President Nasser of Egypt announced Wednesday night that representatives of Arab heads recommended at a Cairo meeting that all Arab ambassadors be withdrawn from West Germany.

Nasser said in a Cairo Radio address this will be one of four resolutions put before a special meeting of the Arab foreign ministers in Cairo Sunday.

The Arab envoys held a four-hour emergency session Tuesday to consider West Germany's decision to seek full diplomatic relations with Israel.

Nasser said the envoys also decided to warn West Germany Arab countries would sever diplomatic relations with it if it went ahead with its plan.

(Walter Scheel, West German economic co-operation minister, said earlier Wednesday West Germany would automatically cut off economic aid to any Arab state which broke diplomatic relations with Bonn.)

TENSION DISCUSSED
(Scheel was discussing at a foreign press luncheon in Bonn the tension between Bonn and Arab countries over West Germany's intention to establish diplomatic relations with Israel following the head-of-state treatment accorded in Cairo to East German Communist Leader Walter Ulbricht.)

Nasser, who was speaking at Shebin Al-Khaim, lower Egypt, said the suggested moves were among resolutions the envoys prepared for discussion by a conference of Arab foreign ministers.

The envoys invited the foreign ministers to meet in Cairo Sunday, Nasser said.

Opposition Loses Battle On Probe Of MLA Charges

The opposition put up a losing battle to have a committee with equal representation from both sides of the House set up to investigate charges of political interference in the business of the civil service commission.

Charges of patronage were made by George Ferguson (L-5th Kings) when he spoke in the draft address debate and subsequent requests for a retraction were turned down by Mr. Ferguson.

Yesterday in the Legislature, Premier Walter R. Shaw moved that the House committee on privileges make an investigation of the charges.

DR. BONNELL OBJECTS
Opposition Leader M.L. Bonnell, MD, objected to the privileges committee making the investigation. He said "you can't bring out the facts with numbers. There are five government members on the committee and only three opposition members as it. Numbers don't

make a right or a wrong. We want facts."

Dr. Bonnell wanted a committee that had equal representation of both sides. He said that if the privileges committee is to make the investigation "I'll advise my colleague not to allow this to go to a privileges committee unless we get a fair deal and fair representation in a fair investigation."
