**DEATH OF A MISER.**—A curious instance of avarice of a part of a man named Murdoch Manro, was discovered by his death which happened at Kelly lately. He came to live in Kelly about 55 years ago, and during the greater part of that time was employed as a labourer on the Blairadam estate, until a few weeks back, when from his enfeebled state of health, he was engaged in breaking road metal up till a few weeks of his death. He lived with a widow in Kelly, and on the occasion of his death she had been at work out of doors, when a neighbour happened to look in to enquire for Murdoch, and it was discovered he was dead. Upon opening a chest, the first thing that presented itself was a bank cheque to the value of £790 of the Bank of Scotland, Edinburgh, neatly folded in a piece of paper and sewed inside an old jacket. In the centre of the chest there were £213 in £1 and guinea notes, partly of the British Linen Company, and of the Bank of Scotland, of date 1812; and strewed along the bottom £34 in silver were found, rolled up in sums of 20s each, and some 1s 0½d in copper coin—the whole amounting to no less a sum than £1,047 6s 0½d. He was not least suspected, of having money, but looked upon as one deserving charity, so much so, that Sir Chas. Adam accidentally meeting with him a few weeks ago, gave him 2s. to relieve his apparent poverty.—*Fifehire Journal.*

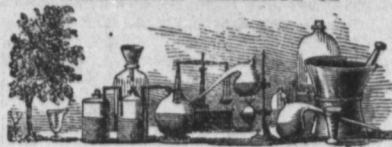
