# Accused Elects Trial Before Jury

Original election of trial by magistrate J. Dionne Four of Summerside and two charged, was altered yesterday before Magistrate W. Chester MacDonald in Prince County magistrate's court.

Four had appeared on Jan. 15 and pleaded not guilty to a charge of stealing four tires and four rims and a car jack and battery at Port Hill, the items being property of Agnes M. R. Campbell of Summerside. At that time accused elected trial by magistrate and he changed this election yesterday to trial by a judge and jury.

Magistrate also changed his election similarly on a charge of breaking and entering Wellington centre schoolhouse and committing an indictable offence therein. On this charge Four elected his method of trial Jan. 22.

Both of the cases were adjourned for preliminary hearing to Jan. 31.

Martin Joseph Gallant, 42, was charged with the two offences, requested court and his cases were adjourned one week that the court may assign counsel for him.

Second witness, Cst. Frederick Conolly, Summerside detachment RCMP, stated he and Const. W. Lynn investigated the accident.

One car was on the north side of the Sherbrooke Road, owned by Douglas Egginton, who was present at the scene. The second vehicle was on the ways in the centre of the road and was sitting behind the first.

SEVERE DAMAGE  
Cst. Conolly stated there was severe damage to both cars. The right hand end of the Egginton car was so mangled it could not be towed. He said the highway was closed for three to four hours and visibility was poor.

Other officers which were called on by Const. Conolly, Cst. Kenneth Lynn, the other investigating officer, corroborated the evidence of Cst. Conolly.

The case was adjourned to Feb. 12 so that the defence may call evidence.

SENTENCE DEFERRED  
A youth from RCAF station Summerside pleaded guilty to a charge of breaking and entering the RCAF station curbing club rooms and committing an indictable offence. Sentence was deferred to Feb. 5, with accused remanded in custody.

One man was fined \$5 and costs for failing to register his motor vehicle for the sale of intoxicating liquor in a place

# Frank W. Curtis Elected President of United Fund

Jean-Paul Stoltz, writer for outstanding community service, Russell S. Seller, president, and Frank W. W. Reid, campaign chairman, were each presented with a plaque at last night's annual meeting of the Prince Edward Island United Fund organization, held at the Prince of Wales College.

The presentations were made by Hon. J. David Stewart, provincial secretary, acting on behalf of the premier, who he reported is confined to his home suffering from a slight cold. Mr. Stewart reported that a Premier Walter Shaw is expected to be back at his desk in a day or two.

During the election of officers, Frank W. Curtis, Charlottetown, was named president to succeed Mr. Seller, also of Charlottetown. Mr. Stewart observed that the

recent campaign "is unique, in that it is the first time an all-province wide campaign has ever been attempted in Canada."

Both Mr. Seller and Mr. Reid, who has been working in the public relations committee, stated that "an informed public is essential to the success of the campaign of this nature were invaluable to the Island effort."

In December, 1960 a 25-member steering committee was set up to work with Mr. Seller, and from then on the organization began to take a permanent shape, finally culminating in the first United Appeal campaign ever held in the province which opened early in the fall of 1962.

Both Mr. Seller and Mr. Reid were confident that the \$12,000 still required will be obtained before the start of the provincial for the next drive, which is due to start in October of this year.

# De Gaulle Succeeds In Blocking Britain

BRUSSELS (Reuters)—French President Charles de Gaulle succeeded Tuesday in blocking Britain's attempt to join the European Common Market despite last-minute United States intervention on behalf of Britain.

The French success was seen by diplomats here as direct challenge to the Kennedy administration's policy of a "outward-looking market in the Atlantic community."

Shortly after a West German spokesman confirmed "the negotiations are broken off," chief station earlier in the day with Prime Minister Macmillan.

Referring to the trade interests of Commonwealth nations in the Common Market issue, he said "no time must be lost by consultation to bring together the various parts of the Commonwealth so that full and informal discussions may take place."

At the same time, he added, "Britain herself could raise quite a number of objections against such a solution."
