It was back in 1905 that Dan Patch 1.55 1-4 set the harness record by pacing a mile in 2:01.47.

In 1918 Single G, then a four-year-old, equalled Dan Patch's performance by pacing in 2:01.14.

At Indianapolis, Indiana, Grand Circuit meeting the attendance was the greatest for several years and it was wonderful racing over the new world's record for trotters in a two mile race was set up in which Dale Hanover triumphed over Clever Hanover and Dean Hanover.

The trotting record for the Rutland, Vermont, track was also lowered at the meeting last week, first by Volo Mae, who tramped in 2:04 3-4, then by Emma Signal, who won in 2:04 1-2.

The great Danbury Fair will be held the first week in October. This is one of the best speed meetings in the east and it always assured of a big entry list because it is late in the season and horses have returned from the Grand and other circuits.

Among those in that country at present are Hazelton 2:00-3:4, Guy Fletcher 2:01 Musketone 2:02, Gayleworth 2:02 3-4, Brevere 2:03, Oscar 2:03, Truxa 2:03 1-2, Day Star 2:05, Plucky 2:06 1-4, The Laurel Hall 2:06 1-4 and Vitamine 2:00 1-2.

Henry Clukey set up a new track record at Windsor, Maine, last week when he drove Dusty Hanover 2:00 3-4 an exhibition mile in 2:01 1-4. The same day Jane Azoff 1.59 1-2 won the Free for All over the same track.

Dannie Steele has given Junior Bars a new record in a winning race. It is now 2:09 3-4. Junior Bars raced in the 2:16 class at Charlottetown during the Provincial Exhibition.

Chatham, N. B. will hold a two days race meeting Wednesday and Thursday, September 27th and 28th. Purses total \$875 and the classes are 2:15 Trot and Pace, 2:26 Trot and Pace, 2:20 Trot, Free for All, 2:20 Pace and Classified Race. The Secretary is J. Mac O'Brien, Chatham, N. B.

Chatham track was out of commission for several years over the season was regarded as improved and barns and buildings built. In its day it was considered the fastest track in the Maritimes and many records were made over it.

When Sep Palin set up a new world's record for a double-hitch of 1:58 3-4, displacing a previous record of 1:59 1-4 made by the same team, and the 2:00 1-2 former world's record, he drove Greyhound and Rosalind to cart with pole hitch. The old world's record was made to four wheel light wagon, which it would seem to the writer a much slower hitch than the one Palin used.

A new Canadian record for two-year-old pacers was established by Pine Ridge Alex, owned by Pine Ridge Stable, Lennox, Ont., when he stepped the second heat of the Two Year Old Futurity at Genesee, Ont., in 2:12, lowering the previous record set by Bob Lee last year by two and three-quarter seconds. Pine Ridge Stable is owned by Dr. Locke, who is famous all over America because of his success in curing diseases by foot correction methods. World Series To Open In Yanks Stadium

CHICAGO, Sept. 15—(AP)—The 1939 world series between New York Yankees and the champions of the National League -- presumably Cincinnati or maybe St. Louis Cardinals, or possibly Chicago Cubs will open in Yankee Stadium Oct. 4.

The first two games will be played in the Yankee Stadium and from New York the world series contenders will move to Cincinnati, St. Louis or Chicago, to play on Oct. 7, 8, and 9.

Oct. 6 will be an open date to permit the teams to travel. Should a sixth and seventh game be necessary, the teams will travel on Oct. 10, resuming play in New York the next day.

NEW YORK, Sept. 15—With Steve Sundra starring on the mound and at bat, the Yankees muzzled Detroit Tigers 10-3 today and moved within half game of clinching their fourth consecutive American Baseball League pennant.

The right-hander defeated his opponent, scored his 10th triumph with six-hit hurling and in addition doubled a run home in the second inning and singled with the bases loaded for two others in the fifth.

Cleveland Indians discharged three-run barrages in the last two innings to defeat Boston Red Sox 7-1 and provide right-hander Willis Hudlin with his 10th win of the season.

Vernon Kennedy won his ninth game of the year, pitching St. Louis to a 5-1 victory over Washington and allowing only seven hits.

A three-run homer by Bob Johnson and tight pitching by Lynn Nelson gave Philadelphia Athletics a 3-2 victory over Chicago White Sox.

U. S. Golf Players Meet For Title

CHICAGO, Sept. 15—Two little fellows with great big hearts, Marvin (Bud) Ward of Spokane, Wash., and Ray Billows of Poughkeepsie, N. Y., tomorrow will battle over 36 holes for the 43rd United States amateur golf championship.

Referee Stops Bitter Scrap With Loser Helpless But Game To Carry On

(By Sid Feder, Associated Press Sports Writer) MUNICIPAL STADIUM, Philadelphia, Sept. 15—Tony Galento stopped Lou Nova via the technical knockout route tonight in two minutes 44 seconds of the 14th round of their 15th round fight before an estimated 20,000 fans.

Referee George Blake stopped the bloodiest bout seen in any ring in a long time, after Nova was floored twice in the 14th round and gallantly, but helplessly, tried to hang on.

From the second round on both fighters were covered with blood and the referee's shirt was red stained from shoulders to waist.

Galento opened a bad cut alongside Nova's left eye in the second and continued to fire at it all the way. Tony came out with a mouth lacerated under the lower lip and just below the chin.

Nova was down for a one count in the third and was on the floor again in the eighth for about four seconds, but the knockdown time-keeper ruled it was a push and that he had not been dropped.

Los Angeles Youngster In Semi-final

Heleen Jacobs, the four-time former champion, attained the women's semi-finals by defeating Valerie Scott of England, 2-6, 6-2, 6-3, and will face Kay Stammers of England, tomorrow. Like Miss Jacobs, the English girl staged a rally to defeat Mrs. Sarah Palfrey Fabvan of Boston, 1-6, 6-3, 6-1.
