Let's Talk It Over

We invited W.J.E. to come down
out of the clouds and discuss
teaching techniques so that the
man on the street might know
what we were talking about. We're
very much afraid he's still up
there. We'll admit W.J.E. conducts
his campaign in a gentlemanly
manner. There is no sign of mud-
slinging in his attack. So far all
he threw at us was the dictionary.
Unabridged! We're still a little
dizzy from the impact. If the
depth of an argument were in
direct proportion to the length of
the words used, we'd be waving a
white flag right now. As it is,
we're not quite sure whether W.J.
E. was throwing around those or-
thographical monstrosities in a
facetious mood, or whether they
are really part of his stock in
trade.

We are sorry if we have been
guilty of misreading between the
lines what the traditionalist posi-
tion on education is. If we have,
it is because we have been read-
ing and listening to the wrong
exponents of traditionalism. For
we have never heard one of them
do anything but attack changes in
the educational picture. As far as
we know, they "stand pat" on the
methods of the past, deeming them
as inviolable as the "Ten Com-
mandments". Perhaps it is be-
cause they are so busy attempt-
ing to tear down the progressivist
educational structure, and they
have no time for a consideration
of "safe" improvements of their
own. They grow lyrical when they
tell you of the grand old teachers
in the little red schoolhouses
of yesterday.

If you ever suggest to the "old
guard" that some of the methods
of these teachers of twilight days
may be a bit outmoded today,
you'd better smile, pardner, if you
value your life. We agree, how-
ever, that some of the old teach-
ers may have been as great as
their supporters claim. They must
have been, considering the educa-
tional handicaps under which they
were forced to labor.

Here are just a few opinions on
education that should establish us
as a "middle of the roader". We
don't believe with the progressiv-
ists that a teacher can withhold
his restraining hand and let the
pupils "develop their personalities
unfettered by outside controls". On
the other hand, we don't believe
in "pin-drop" order in a classroom
if it is induced by fear of pun-
ishment, and nothing else. Hitler
imposed discipline on a whole na-
tion that way. We believe there
must be some development of
self-control on the part of the pu-
pils; some appreciation that class-
room order is for his own good.
We don't believe in throwing the
text books out the window, and
proceeding in a haphazard fash-
ion with whatever sources of in-
formation may come to hand. We
believe in curriculum subjects, but
do not think they should be sepa-
rated into air-tight compartments.
There is much more correlation
between subject's today than there
was forty or fifty years ago. This
column is stretching out, so we'd
better discontinue it now. We'd
like to continue the discussion in a
later column.
