Student Specials Are Arranged

MONCTON. — As schools and colleges throughout the Atlantic Provinces close for the Christmas holidays, Canadian National Railways is lining up the "Student Specials" to ensure that accommodations is available for the thousands of scholars homeward bound for Yuletide.

College vacation traffic begins around December 15, and the heaviest return movement is expected between January 2-15, as the universities and schools reopen. Students attending colleges in the Maritimes will be travelling to all points in Canada, including Newfoundland and British Columbia, and there are some going to the United States.

At Dalhousie University there are 115 students from Newfoundland, 78 from Prince Edward Island, 395 from Nova Scotia, (excluding Halifax city), and 196 from New Brunswick.

St. Mary's University has 18 from Newfoundland, three from P. E. I., 60 from Nova Scotia and 25 from New Brunswick. At Nova Scotia Tech, there are 27 from Newfoundland, five from P. E. I., 65 from Nova Scotia and 36 from New Brunswick.

Other Maritimes universities which have students representative of all provinces are Kings College, Mount St. Vincent, Acadia, St. Joseph's, the University of New Brunswick, Mount Allison, St. Francis Xavier, St. Thomas, St. Dunstan, Edgemoor School for Girls, the schools for the blind and the schools for the deaf.

Special trains, and extra cars on regular trains will be used in the Atlantic Region to handle the traffic. George Stiven, general passenger agent of the region has announced.

In the Maritimes, extra cars will be carried on regular trains such as the "Ocean Limited", "Maritime Express" and "Scotian". In Newfoundland the C. N. R. has announced that extra trains will be operated out of St.
