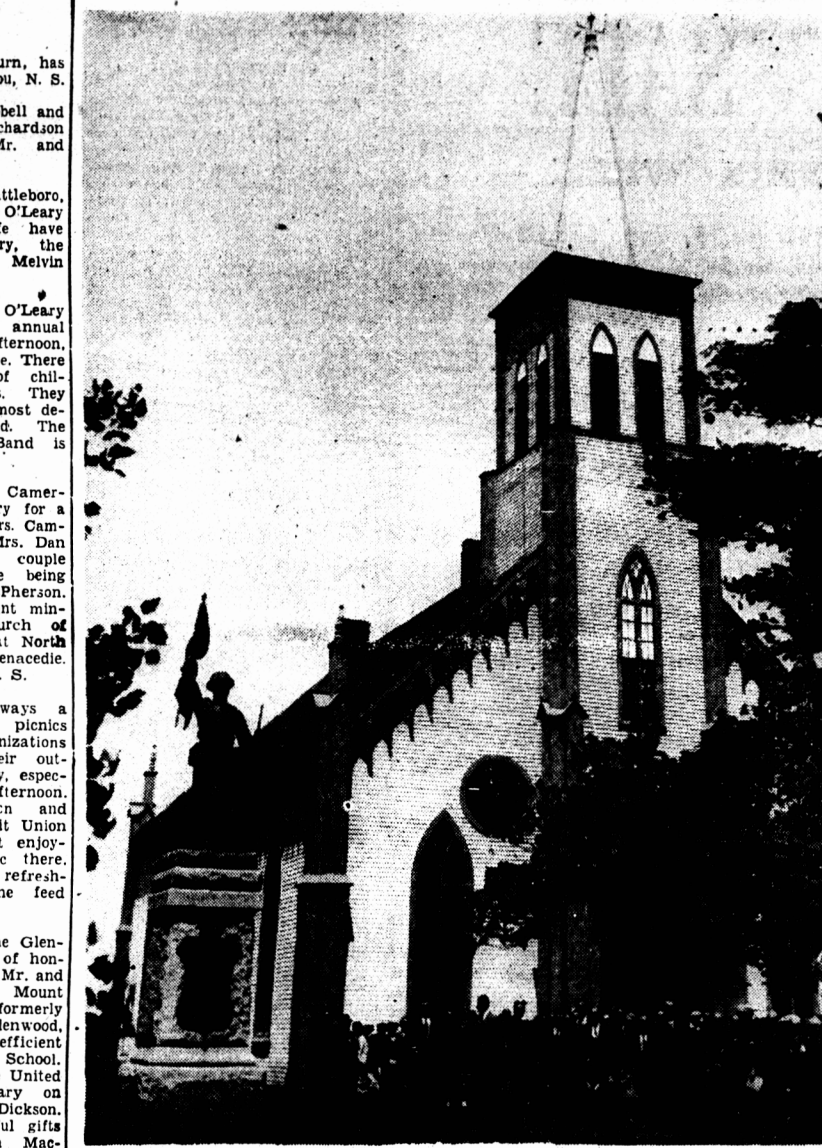
Rain Washes Out Golf Practice

Canada Reports Budgetary Surplus

OTTAWA, July 14 (CP) - The Federal Government today reported a \$20,000,000 surplus for the 1950-51 fiscal year, built up a budgetary surplus of \$213,600,000 in the first three months of the year's operations, it was announced today. The three-month figure compared with a surplus of \$202,900,000 in the April 1-to-June 30 period of 1949. The last fiscal year ended with a surplus of more than \$110,000,000. Finance Minister Abbott has said frequently that revenues always run ahead of expenditures during the first months of the year. Expenditures usually are heaviest in the last few months when accounts for the year are received. Since the outbreak of the war in Korea, there has been some conjecture in unofficial circles that Mr. Abbott will end the year with a deficit, rather than a surplus. Although Canada's contribution to the fight against North Korea so far has been limited to three destroyers, it is anticipated that defence expenditures will be heavier than anticipated when the budget was brought down last March. In June, revenues amounted to \$195,000,000 and expenditures to \$175,000,000. In June, 1949, revenues were \$191,000,000 and expenditures \$240,400,000, arising out of the assumption by Canada of Newfoundland guaranteed stock as provided for under the terms of union. Aussies Take Opening Matches In Cup Tourney

MONTREAL, July 14 (CP) - Showing too much power and class for their opponents, Australia's Frank Sedgman and Ken McGregor today loped through to straight-set victories over Canada in the two opening singles matches of the North American Davis Cup tennis tie. Sedgman, ace of the four-man Australian team, disposed of Brendan Macken, 7-5, 6-2, 6-1. In the second match, Lorne Main of Vancouver bowed to McGregor 6-1, 6-2, 7-5. Doubles play starts tomorrow with the competition concluding Sunday, weather permitting. In the doubles, Henri Rochon and George Robinson, both of Montreal, will be pitted against Jack Brownich and Sedgman—one of the greatest twosomes in the world today. Macken and Main didn't fare as well today as Canadian singles players did against Australia here last year. In that tie, Macken defeated Billy Sidwell and Main took one set from the same lean Australian while losing his match. McGregor replaced Sidwell on this year's down-under team while Main drew a Canadian starting assignment over Henri Rochon. Rochon, Canadian singles champion, was defeated by Sedgman in 1949 in straight sets. Macken and Main, however, battled bitterly through the best-of-five matches today. Macken, 27, playing his fifth year as a Canadian Davis Cupper, was a 10-1 underdog before his match with Sedgman. The Aussie never appeared flustered and was never seriously threatened—even in the close first set. His bullet service and accurate placements were near perfection. Macken was faulty in service and seemed unable to cope with Sedgman's trick of racing back and forth from the baseline to the net. Sedgman had four aces to Macken's none and counted 31 placements to the Montrealer's 20. Macken also had 40 nets, 38 outs and six double faults. Sedgman had 29 outs, 30 nets and only three double faults.

Jackie Robinson Sued For Damages

CHICAGO, July 14 (AP) - Second baseman Jackie Robinson of Brooklyn Dodgers today was sued for \$100,000 damages by a Chicago advertising executive who charged the baseball player with breach of contract. Stanley Kuttner charged in his Superior Court suit that Robinson violated a contract which gave Kuttner exclusive rights to use of Robinson's name in connection with the sale and distribution of men's clothing. The suit said, a contract between Robinson and Kuttner became effective Jan. 3, 1948, but Robinson gave the same rights to "certain other persons" thereafter. In addition to the \$100,000, Kuttner seeks to recover \$1416 which the suit says was part of a \$1,500 advance royalty paid to Robinson in connection with the sale of shirts.

N. B. May Have Telephone Strike

SAINT JOHN, N. B., July 14 (CP) - There will be no walkout of New Brunswick Telephone Company operators until at least July 27, union officials said today. H. C. Tracey, international representative of the International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers (A. F. L.) said last night that if no settlement was reached by then the 400 girls throughout New Brunswick would then strike. Local 1472 is willing to reopen negotiations, he said. Completion of a strike ballot count revealed 382 operators in 27 exchanges in favor of a walkout if necessary and nine opposed, the union officials said. The union is still seeking a 10 per cent wage increase, a five day, 40-hour week and union shop. It has rejected a conciliation board majority recommendation of a five per cent wage boost. Following the rejection by the union bargaining committee they referred their de-

Ask Permission To Investigate Russian Claims

LONDON, July 14 (AP) - Britain, France and the United States today asked Moscow to admit an impartial, international commission into Russia to investigate Soviet claims that only 13,546 German prisoners of war remain there. Russia announced May 4 that repatriation of German prisoners had been completed except for that number, chilling hundreds of thousands of Germans with relatives still missing. The announcement said the only Germans left in the Soviet Union were those condemned for serious war crimes, those whose alleged war crimes are still being investigated and a few who were temporarily detained because of illness. The news shattered the hopes of hundreds of thousands of Germans with relatives missing. Reaction in West Germany was bitter, with German officials declaring that 1,500,000 Germans are still missing, including tens of thousands of deported civilians. The U. S. State Department labelled the Russian claim "fantastic and absurd." It estimated the number of Germans still being held at "at least" 200,000. Before the Soviet announcement was made, the United States and France accused Moscow of lying about its repatriation claims to hide the fate of hundreds of thousands still unaccounted for. There was speculation that many of them were being used in forced labor battalions, or that they were being trained to form a pro-Soviet East-German army. The British note today accused Russia of hiding the fate of "tens of thousands" of prisoners, and urged Russia to: 1. Identify and give the whereabouts of the prisoners admittedly still being held. 2. Permit the prisoners to correspond with their families. 3. Give full details of any persons whom the Soviet Government, by classification as civilian workers or in any other way, have deprived of prisoner-of-war status and have thereby excluded from their prisoner-of-war statistics. 4. Supply full information on identity and burial place of Germans who died in custody in Russia.

OTTAWA, July 14 (CP) - Discussion about teacher's salaries will move to an international plane here next week at the fourth assembly of the world organization of the teaching profession. Northern Ireland's representative, J. K. Carson of Belfast, said in an interview today that the study of teachers' salaries would be one of the important items on the agenda of the meeting, which opens Monday. "No matter what country, teachers are up against it in regard to salaries," he said.
