Swift Action Planned On Warren Report

GREEN WASHINGTON (AP)—A White House committee on presidential safety created to coordinate the broad recommendations of the Warren Commission is planning swift action Monday to get proposals ready for the new Congress in January. Senate Democratic Leader Mike Mansfield of Montana said the new security measures, growing out of the commission's investigation of President Kennedy's assassination, should be "one of the first orders of business" when Congress reconvenes. The Warren report, declaring Lee Harvey Oswald to have been the lone and unaided assassin, was selling phenomenally after it went on sale at three outlets Monday, the U.S. government printing office reported. The office disclosed 25 to 27 further volumes, containing the full testimony and exhibits on which the 888-page report was based, may be ready in six to eight weeks. It says only that they will sell for \$75 to \$100 a set.

Children Well After 20 Hours Lost In Woods

FREDERICTON (CP)—Thirteen-year-old John Parris and his 10-year-old sister Susan were reported well Monday night after spending more than 20 hours lost in woods in the Lake George resort area 25 miles southwest of here. Police reported Susan was "winded" by the experience but otherwise well after being flown out of the wooded area by a helicopter. The children, son and daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Alan Parris of Fredericton, were spotted early Monday afternoon by a private air service. The father, Norman Roach of Fredericton, the other two aircraft were also spotted. The children were on a ground 200 volunteers, police, forestry and power company personnel, searching the hunt. The youngsters disappeared about 5 p.m. Sunday while on a family outing.

Estes Fighting Attempts to Put Him Behind Bars

By FINIS MOTHERSHEAD ABILENE, Tex. (AP)—Billie Sole Estes, whose West Texas financial empire crashed in a national scandal, now lives a quiet but busy life here, fighting attempts to put him in prison and making himself interested in dozens of potential projects. The oystish-looking tycoon, not yet 40, no longer has the \$150,000 fortune he had in the little town of Pecos. But while a bankrupt, he resides now in a \$30,000 home, drives an air-conditioned Cadillac, and occasionally relaxes on a lawn sloping down to a private dock and fishing pier. But there is little time for relaxation. Estes is appealing a \$100,000 fine and a 10-month prison sentence against him, and further trials lie ahead. Frequent trips take him away from the handsome lake front home in an exclusive Abilene subdivision, and his telephone rings constantly. While avoiding direct comment on most matters, Estes said his divorce wife Patsy made no bones about wanting to live quietly and to be regarded as a private citizen atmosphere for their five children—four daughters and a son—ranging from seven to 16. Aside from the press of personal affairs, Estes said that his legal involvements make it inadvisable to court public attention at this time. LEND HIS NAME Except to acknowledge the loan of his name to possible new enterprises and a non-profit corporation for aiding underprivileged children, Estes won't disclose where he may be doing nowadays either. "But here's a clue," he said, displaying a mass of undecipherable notes on a home telephone scratch pad. "Right there are some pretty important things developing in 15 or 20 states."

Doctors Seek Order To Halt College Suit

SASKATON (CP)—Two Saskatchewan doctors last week asked a court order to halt a \$100,000 libel suit brought by the Saskatchewan College of Physicians and Surgeons against the Commonwealth, a weekly newspaper published by the CCF-NDP party. Dr. Samuel Wolfe and Dr. Melvin H. Langer made the application in Court of Queen's Bench chambers Thursday and it was adjourned until Oct. 8. A similar application by the doctors Sept. 16 was rejected by Judge W. G. E. Campbell, but the applicants were told a second could be filed if additional information was available. The doctors filed several of their motion. They listed six grounds on which the action as based

Information Given On Post Office

CAPITAL BUREAU OF THE GUARDIAN OTTAWA—Information about the construction of a new post office at Craupaud, P.E.I., was provided yesterday by Public Works Minister J.P. Deschamps in reply to a question placed on the common law order paper by Queens' MP MacLaurin. The minister revealed that the land for the post office was acquired on Feb. 14, 1964, in the amount of 7,500 square feet. It was purchased from A. P. Simmons at a price of \$100,000. Work commenced on the post office in March of this year and was completed in September. The new office building is 24 by 20 feet in size.
