Fish And Game Ass'n Votes To Sponsor Pheasant Project

O'LEARY — The West Prince branch of the P.E.I. Fish and Game Association, at the quarterly meeting here Friday night, decided to sponsor a local pheasant project and also voted a sum of money for improvements to several trout streams in the area. The president, William Gortel, reported some improvements already carried out on the Little Pierre Jacques stream at Glenwood. A mud digger was used to deepen the stream which has been filling up in recent years. As the machine was being operated on the ice the project had to be abandoned when the ice gave way but plans are to resume work this fall. Following discussion a motion was passed approving a trout fishing season from April 15 to Sept. 15, two weeks shorter than last year. The proposed pheasant scheme will be carried out by the president, Mr. Gortel, who has successfully raised pheasants for several years. Approximately 300 eggs are expected from six hens on hand and these will be hatched and released at the proper time. Raeford MacLean and Wilfred Dennis were appointed as pheasant committee to work with Mr. Gortel. It was unanimously approved by the meeting that a closed season be requested on Hungarian partridge in the area from Portage to North Point. It was generally agreed that the few Huns remaining in the West Prince area should be left alone for several years. Cecil Dennis was appointed chairman of the stream improvement committee and \$100 was voted for this purpose. The president reported attending a fishery meeting in Summerside and stated that 131,000 fingerlings (trout) were released west of Enmore last year by Kelly's Pond fish culture station. Minutes of the last meeting and of the Prince County branch meeting were read by the secretary-treasurer, Lorne Johnson.

Muirhead, Ceres, California; and two grandsons, Jim and Edward Boulter, Cincinnati. Her husband, J. Wilfred Boulter, M.B.E., predeceased her in August 1948, and her daughter, Georgie M. Boulter, superintendent of the New England Baptist Hospital, died in March, 1957. The funeral of the late Mrs. Boulter will be held from the MacLean Funeral Home this afternoon, service commencing at 2 o'clock. Interment will be in the People's Cemetery.
