**Local and Other Items.**

**WHEAT CROP DESTROYED.**—Already about one-tenth of the wheat crop in the vicinity of Geneva, N. Y., has been destroyed by the work of the Hessian fly.

**THE RUSH TO EUROPE.**—The New York newspapers say the rush of Americans to Europe is on in earnest. The war with Spain kept thousands from crossing last year, but this year there is nothing to deter lovers of the trip from taking it.

**HIBERNIAN MEMORIAL.**—The Ancient Order of Hibernians of Quebec have obtained permission from the Dominion Minister of Agriculture to erect a memorial monument on a suitable site of Grosse Ile quarantine station for the purpose of honouring the graves and perpetuating the memory of the victims of the ship fever of 1847 and 1848.

**DRAWING THE COLOR LINE.**—The color line has reached a singular crisis in Brooklyn, where the members of the African M. E. church are in a storm against their pastor, Rev. Mr. Henderson, one of the most eloquent colored preachers in the country, because he is too white. It is not often that such an issue has been raised in settling the color line.

**WOMAN'S DEVOTION.**—The passionate devotion of wives to their erring husbands is again strikingly illustrated by the intense grief of a Tiboro woman over the act of her husband in emptying the contents of his pistol into his brain rather than submit to capture by the officers who were hunting him down for having sought to murder his wife. It was on the day of this occurrence that a man was electrocuted at Sing Sing for having stabbed his wife to death in his cell, where he had been placed for having shamefully abused her, and where she subsequently came to give him a kiss of forgiveness. With the kiss came the fatal shot. She did not survive the cruel thrust long enough to plead for mercy for him. Otherwise she would have done so, no doubt.

**A ROMANTIC STORY.**—A romantic little story comes from Manila. The story concerns a blue-jacket in the American navy who won the affections of the young and charming daughter of a California farmer. They were engaged; but at the call of duty Jack took a fond farewell, and departed to share in the dangers and glories of the war with Spain. Under Dewey he fought at Manila. But when the fighting was over he was claimed for a high er destiny. Gur Jack Tar turned out to be a Count John Alphon Vasakevitch was nine years a lieutenant in the Russian navy. He left the service, and after three years' wandering, buried his identity in the ranks of enlisted men in the American navy, joining the Charleston at San Francisco. While he was at Manila his father, Count Vasakevitch, died, leaving him heir to the estate of Zamowski, in Poland, worth a million and a half of dollars. There was the title, the castle, the fortune, all to be laid at the feet of the lovely American girl. How happy she must have been? Well, not quite. In the meantime she had gone and married somebody else.

**Another Phase of the Deal.**

Mail and Empire: The Grand Trunk end of the Drummond deal is now to come before Parliament.

According to the original scheme the country was to pay annually for the use of Grand Trunk property as part of the Intercolonial the following sums:

Terminals at Montreal.....\$62,500  
Victoria Bridge.....40,000  
Thirty-five miles of railway.....37,500

In addition Canada was to contribute 5 per cent. on half the cost of doubling the tracks on the thirty-five miles and of enlarging the yards.

This latter condition meant that the country was to cover practically the entire expense of betterments, because we can borrow money at 2 1/2 per cent.

The rejection of the deal by the Senate has resulted in a revision of the terms, and now, instead of paying 5 per cent. on half the cost of construction, we are to contribute 4 per cent. upon a proportion of the cost calculated upon the user.

But we are still to pay \$140,000 a year as rental for ninety-nine years.

This sum is equivalent, on the annuity principle, to \$4,500,000 with interest; that is to say, if we were to borrow \$4,500,000 and pay \$140,000 a year back, the capital and the interest would be covered by the end of the ninety-nine years.

We could build into Montreal for less than that, but as it is, we pay the money and do not own the road.

**DEVoured BY CANNIBALS.**

**Captain Maurice Bell Loses His Life on the Congo.**

LONDON, June 3.—Details are to hand of the killing and eating on the Congo of Capt. Maurice Bell, a British militia officer who last year left England for the Congo in the service of the Free State.

It appears that Capt. Bell and his small force of fifty black troops proceeded in the direction of a village called Mondimbe. While marching in Indian file through a dense forest they were suddenly surrounded by 300 spearmen. The soldiers, who were mere boys and like all their comrades arrant cowards, no sooner saw the natives approaching than they threw down their rifles and cartridge belts and cleared into the bush, leaving Capt. Bell, his native sergeant and one boy to resist the attack.

Aided by his boy Capt. Bell loaded and fired again and again, and when at close quarters used his revolver with such effect that he accounted for fully ten natives before the end came. The cannibals however in the end naturally overcame Capt. Bell and his companions. First, the three were speared, then cut up and afterwards eaten. In accordance with their usual custom, when a white man is killed, pieces of his body were despatched to all the surrounding villages to inflame the natives.

When the news of the tragedy reached the main force, a punitive expedition was sent from Basoko, and also a force from Commandant van Wert. Portions of the bodies were then found in a village twenty miles distant from the scene of the struggle. In the punitive expedition 100 natives were killed and a number taken prisoner.
