

Will Route Trans Canada Highway Through Ch town

The Trans Canada Highway will be routed through Charlottetown via Elm Avenue, Great George Street and Grafton Street, The Guardian learned yesterday from His Worship Mayor J. David Stewart. The portion of the highway which is inside the City limits will be financed by a three-way arrangement involving the City, the Province and the Federal Government.

As usual the Federal government pays fifty percent of the cost. The Provincial government pays one-half of the remainder, or twenty-five percent of the whole, and the City also pays twenty-five percent of the cost.

The City's portion extends from the City limits on Elm Avenue to the end of the Hillsboro Bridge approach near the Government garage.

Mayor Stewart said that Grafton Street and Elm Avenue would be widened in no way as is possible. He suggested, for example, that Elm Avenue might be widened and extra six feet.

WORK PROCEEDING
Meanwhile work is proceeding on the Province's portion of the road on either side of the City. Some three weeks ago, Department of Highways machines began clearing the trees from the side of the road on the highway linking the north end of the City with the concrete highway near the Charlottetown Hotel. This will complete the highway between Charlottetown and Borden.

This stretch of highway will be built of concrete. It will have a 22-foot top but the portion of it running from the City limits for some 350 feet westward will have ten-foot asphalt shoulders. This will enable the home owners to landscape their properties right to the shoulder.

Work is now underway also on the highway linking the Hillsboro Bridge with the concrete highway

27 Water Safety Instructors On Duty In P. E. I. This Year

Twenty-seven Red Cross Water Safety instructors are stationed at various centres throughout the province today. Six of them are life guards at the National Park. One is employed at Fort Edward in Victoria Park as a Charlotte town life guard.

Many of them are at camps which are operated by youth movements. Others are teaching swimming classes in different communities. All of these young people are trained to teach swimming and life saving. They are qualified to administer First Aid in emergencies and are schooled in the prevention of water accidents.

Eighteen have just completed a ten-day course conducted at Red Cross headquarters here. Mr. W. R. Shaw, president of the P.E.I. Island Red Cross Society, presented water safety instructor awards at the conclusion of the course.

Mr. Ian Rankin, acting chairman of water safety services, presented them with their Royal Life Saving insignia.

The Life Guards were tested in the use of rescuators by Dr. L.E. Prowse and in their knowledge of First Aid by Dr. W. R. Stewart. The swimming and life saving skills were carried out by the North River causeway under the instruction of Mr. Paul Cudmore, R.C.M. instructor.

Mr. Sinclair Cutcliffe conducted the first aid courses. Mrs. Harry Cudmore, director of Red Cross Water Safety Services, told the Guardian that the Kwanis pool will open this morning for instructional classes. More than three hundred children are enrolled in classes which begin at 9 a.m. today.

Mrs. Marjorie Dover, Miss Margaret Jardine and Mr. John Fielding will be the permanent summer staff in this area. They will be assisted during the first few days by Miss Elaine Spicer and Miss Mabel England.

Mr. Oles Cantwell of the Sanitary Division, provincial Department of Health, has been making frequent tests of the water both at the Causeway and at the Kwanis pool.

Complete Switch-Over In New Zealand Defence Role

AUCKLAND, N.Z. (CP)—A review of New Zealand defence policy has completed the switchover from the traditional role which prevailed until the end of the war.

The basic features of the change are: 1. New Zealand has become entirely a Pacific and Far East power in defence matters. There is no longer any looking to Europe and the Middle East where the main New Zealand forces fought in two wars.

2. The emphasis is all on getting small forces quickly to the scene of operations, not in training a citizen army after the outbreak of war as hitherto. In pursuit of the new aim, a substantial part of the active strength will be permanently stationed abroad.

FIVE-YEAR PLAN
New Zealand has adopted a five-year program of reorganization and reequipment to cost some \$450,000,000.

As a result of the changes, New Zealand will take over a further section of the British defence burden in the Far East. It will be enough to give Britain noticeable relief.

Under this program, the New Zealand contribution to the Commonwealth strategic reserve based on Malaya will consist of a infantry battalion, which can rapidly be expanded to a fully-equipped and trained brigade when necessary, a squadron of Canberra jet bombers with another in reserve in New Zealand, and a modern cruiser or two frigates, with others on call.

This is a small force by world standards, but it is the largest strength New Zealand has maintained abroad in peacetime.

SIZABLE FORCE
With a proportionately larger contribution from Australia, the two South Pacific members of the Commonwealth will have a sizable contingent on operations or immediate call in Southeast Asia.

The brigade on short call for emergency service would eventually be expanded to a division in a continuing emergency by recruiting and training of men from the reserve.

In keeping with this trend, a larger proportion of the forces will be permanent personnel.

LESS DRAFTING
Compulsory training will be abandoned for the air force and will be disbanded. The intake for compulsory army training will be reduced.

The New Zealand defence contribution will continue to consist entirely of conventional forces. It has been judged that New Zealand is too small to play any effective part in the nuclear deterrence forces in any event be needed for limited wars, police actions and similar purposes, this is the most useful part the country can take in the joint effort.

SALISBURY, Southern Rhodesia (Reuters) — Queen Elizabeth, the Queen Mother, arrived here Tuesday aboard a Bristol Britannia airliner for a two-week tour of the Federation of Rhodesia and Nyasaland.

A 21-gun salute greeted her as she reached the foot of the steps from the plane. She was welcomed by the acting governor-general, Sir Robert Tredgold, and the governor of Southern Rhodesia, Sir Percival Williams - Plowlett and Lady William-Plowlett.
