The Government will grant £3,000,000 to construct piers and harbors in Ireland.

The public debt of the United States has been decreased since the 30th June last nearly \$75,000,000.

The men in the Staffordshire potteries intend to demand the recovery of the decrease made in their wages last November.

Prince Leopold has rather nettled fair frequenters of the House of Commons at Ottawa, by expressing surprise that the ladies' gallery had no screen in front.

Lord Cooper, the present Viceroy of Ireland, is lineally descended from James, the twelfth Earl, and the first Duke of Ormonde, one of the best Lords-Lieutenant that ever sat in Dublin Castle.

The Great Council of the Swiss Canton of Geneva has adopted a measure relative to the withdrawal of subsidies for religious purposes, which involves the disestablishment of the Protestant and Catholic churches of that canton.

Lord Ripon according to Mr. La bouchere has determined to raise the moral tone of the Vica-regal Court in India by announcing that in no case will he kiss the ladies who honor his Court with their presence. Whether the ladies will regard this as a gain or loss Mr. Labouchere is in doubt.

A farmer who left the neighboring town of Gloucester, Quebec, to settle in Montana writes to warn other Canadians from coming there. He says: 'This is the last country to live in. It snows every other day, and there is frost every night. The railroad officials are a lot of Mormon impostors, and care for nobody except a Mormon. Sunday is unknown, work going on as on any other day. I would advise every young Canadian to stay at home rather than come here.'

That Leadville is not all that it is cracked up to, may be inferred from a letter received from a former resident of this city, who was induced to go to Colorado under a promise of \$4 per day working in the mines. On arriving there he found thousands without work, and those that did find employment received \$1.60 per day, and paid \$7 a week for board. The letter concludes: 'There are hundreds out here to-day homeless and hungry, and some of them from Canada, climbing the mountains trying to get home. On the way from Denver to Leadville I saw fully two hundred tramping for home.'—*Toronto Globe.*

The Montreal Herald contrasts the recent Beaconsfield administration with the previous Gladstone Ministry to the disadvantage of the former, on the ground that during the last year of the Gladstone regime the income tax only amounted to £5,942,000 while this year the receipts from this source show an increase to £9,000,000. It thinks that a Finance Minister who should relieve the English people from the income tax would assuredly make for himself a great name, and recall Gladstone's former promise to accomplish this. As a matter of fact the income tax is one of the fairest and least oppressive means of raising a revenue, and bears upon those classes who are well able to afford it out of their superfluities, while the poorer classes are spared. The people who call themselves Liberals show their usual inconsistency in opposing this method of taxation for revenue only.
