## Robbery With Violence Cases Are Adjourned

Two city men, James Carl MacCallum and Thomas Joseph Larter, charged with robbery with violence, had their cases adjourned to Thursday, November 17, for decision following the summation of the case by the Crown and defence lawyers in Queens County Judges Criminal Court yesterday. C. St. Clair Trainor is the presiding judge.

John P. Nicholson, Q.C., is acting for the Crown. Counsel for MacCallum is Allison M. Gillis and counsel for Larter is John J. Holmes. Both counsel members said that no defence witnesses would be called.

The first witness yesterday was Con. Roland Diamond, a member of the Charlottetown Police Force. He testified that he saw both accused on the night of June 16 on King Street in a car owned by Francis Quinn after he stopped it because he knew Quinn's license was suspended. He said MacCallum was lying down in the back seat of the car and Larter was in the front with Quinn. Cst. Diamond testified that he saw them later that night at the Queen Charlotte Armouries parking lot standing by the car. He said he followed both accused and Quinn down Water Street until he believed they were going home and continued on his patrol.

John King, Charlottetown, told the court that while he was driving his bicycle on Pownall Street on the night in question he saw three fellows running around the corner of Pownall and Sydney Street.

Sgt. Charles Ready, a member of the Charlottetown Police Force testified that he first saw the four \$20 bills when they were passed to him on Clark Street by Quinn. He said that he and another member of the police force drove Quinn to Larter's house on Clark Street and Quinn went in and later came out with the bills.

Under cross examination Sgt. Ready said he had no idea where Quinn got the bills, tendered in evidence and that the only money he had where they came from was from what Quinn told him.

Defence Minister Hellyer introduced the armed forces unification bill providing for a single service called the Canadian Armed Forces with rank structure now used by the army.

## TO JUDGE ARSENAULT

# Wire Recalls Early Tourism

The following telegram received by the Hon. A. E. Arsenault, retired Judge of the Supreme Court of P.E.I., who is now in his ninety-seventh year, recalls his work as the initiator of the P.E.I. Tourist Association in the early 1920's following his appointment to the bench after having been Premier of the province from 1917-1919:

"Delegates in attendance at the thirty-fourth annual meeting of the Canadian Tourist Association are very pleased to send you greetings from Vancouver. We are all appreciative of your contribution to the cause of tourism and particularly for the leadership that you gave our Association as its very first President. We would like to extend to you our very best wishes for good health and well being. I look forward to meeting you when I visit Prince Edward Island. Signed: I.C. Pollock, President, Canadian Tourist Association."

It was during the early part of 1919, in his capacity as Premier, that the Hon. A.E. Arsenault opened the roads in P.E.I. to the automobile which, up until that time, were permitted on the roads only on certain days, and at stated times.

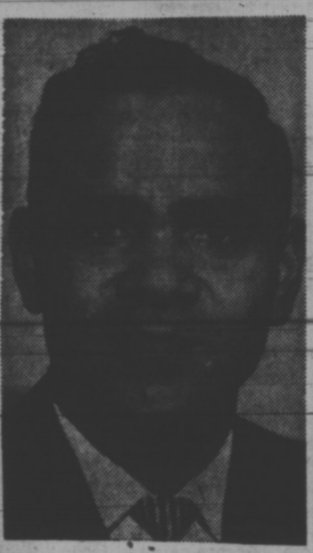
