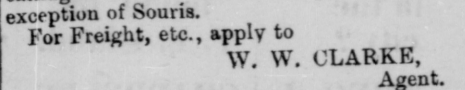

The Montreal Gazette says "The grit fashion of comparing Mr. Laurier with Mr. Mercier to the former's advantage, and holding the Dominion leader up as a model of all the virtues, while the provincial chief is pointed to as an example of all that is vile in Canadian politics, is not very well founded. Mr. Laurier has a clean record; Mr. Mercier is rotten. That is all true. But the two men are part of one machine, and if anything was made evident during the last election campaign in the province of Quebec, it was that Mercier is the biggest part. The majority won by the grits in this province represents the triumph of no principle in Federal politics. It is simply the evidence of a desire of a majority of the constituencies (though not a majority of the people) to obtain more money for the province out of the proceeds of federal taxation. Quebec likes to spend, but it does not like to pay. Mr. Laurier in Parliament represents this idea."

The death of George Jones of the New York Times, the paper which exposed the Tweed ring, has called forth a great deal of inside history respecting that colossal den of thieves. But perhaps the most interesting thing is the account of the fate that has befallen the chief operators. Jones, the avenger, died an honored citizen, whereas Tweed died in jail, Connolly died in exile in Paris, Harry Ghent started a bar-room and died in poverty, Hitchman died in an asylum for the insane, and so on. Oakey Hall, who was mayor of New York when the ring of which he was a leading spirit was in its hey-day, is still alive, but is treated as a social leper. Peter B. Sweeney, known as "Brains" Sweeney because of his ability in shielding the gang, is also living and is well off, but the public will have nothing to do with him. "Misery," says one writer, "has been the certain crop of all the sin and crime of twenty years ago." The Toronto Globe commends this pregnant fact to the Canadian bootleggers who are now being fished out. It is worth remembering too by all who may be tempted to follow the evil example set by men in high places.

The following from the Toronto Telegram, written before Sir Hector's resignation, will be endorsed by all good Conservatives:—Because with all its faults, and it has not a few, the Conservative Government in now bearing the ark of Canada's hopes, independent and patriotic journals are anxious that it should be neither defeated nor disgraced. If united Canadian and British, rather than United States' sentiment had a strong hold on the heart of the Opposition, the Conservatives need not imagine that the fate of the Abbott Ministry would excite much concern outside the ranks of their own party. It is not altogether a question of Ins and Outs. The Conservative policy embodies much that tends to make this Dominion mighty, while, unfortunately, the Liberals have deserted the ground that should be occupied by stalwart patriots. The country is safer in the hands of honest Conservatives than it would be under the guidance of honest Liberals. There is a greater promise of national advancement in one policy than in the other. This patriotic preference for the Conservatives, strong as it is, does not throw a coverlet over the iniquities of some ministers who have disgraced the name. The party is entrusted with the championship of a great cause and it cannot afford to let the standard of Canadian unity and independence be sullied by any individual's sins.

—La Patrie, which is the most influential of the grit organs in Quebec, announces that it has authority for stating that Sir Richard Cartwright does not sympathize with the Toronto Globe's attack upon Premier Mercier and his government. Really!

The present unsatisfactory attitude of China towards the great powers of the world serves to call attention to the military strength of the celestial empire. The general impression, says an exchange, prevails that China is without warlike resources. But the great military possibilities of China have been recognized by the most eminent authorities. The late "Chinese" Gordon once expressed his belief that China might some day overrun Russia and probably attempt the conquest of Europe. It is well known that General Wolsley, the highest living military authority of England, has given expression to similar views. China is a monstrous empire, whose subjects are innumerable and whose resources cannot be estimated. If the Chinese should suddenly awaken to their possibilities as they have in one or two instances in the remote past, their capacity for mischief would be unlimited. Let some great military genius arise in China, some ambitious Mongolian Napoleon, who could understand the empire's military possibilities and know how to use its resources, and China could raise a formidable army for conquest, and make herself an opponent far too strong for the ridicule of any modern nation.

Eggs.—It has been an exceedingly dull week in the egg trade. Receipts have been heavy, demand very light, and with continued hot weather and cold storage warehouses all full, receivers have been forcing sales at low prices, but have not been able to prevent stock from accumulating and there is now a large supply on hand. The best P. E. Island, N. S. N. B. and Michigan are quoted dull at 17 to 17 1/2 cents.

Fish.—Codfish continue in fair supply and steady demand with prices about as last quoted. Receipts of hbi herring in fair supply and steady. There have been good fair arrivals of mackerel, and prices are ruling a little lower.

A Rich Little Isle.

AN ISOLATED SPOT IN THE PACIFIC OCEAN EXPECTED TO PROVE A BONANZA FOR ITS OWNER.

Few are aware that away off in the Pacific ocean is an island on which flies the Stars and Stripes, and which is absolutely owned by an American; yet such is the case. The little spot which is marked on the charts as not larger than the point of a pin, is in latitude 24 degrees north, longitude 54 degrees east, and is known as Marouae Island. Capt. A. Rosehill, a citizen of the United States, is the possessor of this not very extensive domain, which is only three miles long by almost two miles wide, and at its highest point is not more than 60 feet above the waters of the vast ocean that surrounds it. At the present time the little island cannot boast of an inhabitant, but in a short time several dozen souls will take up their residence on it. The island is covered from end to end with a vast deposit of guano of unknown depth, and Capt. Rosehill, who is now in San Francisco, is making preparations to work the deposit. Samples of the guano show it to be of the highest commercial value, and it is expected to prove a bonanza to the owner.

The Presbyterian Journal shows that in 1880 the population of the country was 50,152,806; in 1890 62,622,250, an increase of 24 per cent. The church figures are given for 1880 and 1890. The number of churches reported in 1881 was 5,598; in 1891, 7,070, an increase of 26 per cent. The ministers and licentiate in 1881 were 5,387; in 1891, 6,597, an increase of 24 per cent. The candidates in 1881 were 622; in 1891, 1,317, an increase of more than 200 per cent. The communicants in 1881 were 581,401; in 1891, 806,798, an increase of almost 39 per cent. The S. S. members in 1881 were 633,664; in 1891, 883,680, an increase of nearly 40 per cent. The contributions in 1881 were \$8,874,281; in 1891, \$14,062,356, an increase of more than 62 per cent.

The British government has notified the government of China that from this time forth no British officers will be allowed to serve in the Chinese navy. The British government has taken this step on account of the refusal of the Chinese authorities to furnish an explanation of the Chinese officer in hauling down the flag of Admiral Lang while the British officer was in command of the Chinese north coast squadron at Hong Kong in 1890. Admiral Lang resigned his commission in the Chinese navy in June 1890 giving as his reason for resigning that the Chinese officers of the squadron were insubordinate. Later, as a result of Admiral Lang's resignation, the Chinese government declared that it would never again entrust the real authority in the navy to any foreigners.
