THE ELLIOTT.—The steamship Elliott sailed from Boston for Charlottetown last evening, and will leave Charlottetown on return on the evening of Friday, 10th inst.

GOVERNOR-GENERAL'S VISIT.—Colonel Dogliotti received a telegram today, from Ottawa, authorizing a guard of honor and a salute from Fort Edward on the arrival of the Governor-General next Thursday evening.

FOREST FIRES.—A serious forest fire is raging at Shutes, N.S. The fire started Monday, and up to yesterday destroyed about three miles. At last accounts it was proceeding towards the Hebert and Joggins.—Moncton Transcript.

EVERYBODY COURT.—Judge Barbier, of the Exchequer Court of Canada, accompanied by the Acting Registrar of the Court, arrived here last night and are at the Davies. This morning the Judge opened and adjourned the Court. There was no business to be transacted.

A PLAGUE OF SPIDERS.—According to a late despatch from Columbus, Ind., there is a plague of black spiders in Crawford County and parts of Perry. Several persons have been bitten. Only one fatality has resulted; the victim swallowed a spider while drinking from a jar. Many of the spiders are of enormous size.

THE MARKET.—There was a good attendance at the market to-day and sales were lively at the following prices: Butter, 18 to 20c; eggs, 10 to 11c; chickens, per pair, 40 to 45c; turkeys, per pair, 40 to 45c; currants, per quart, 7 to 10c; red currants, 6 to 8c; gooseberries, 6 to 8c; cherries, 10 to 12c; raspberries, 10 to 12c; blueberries, 5 to 7c; new potatoes, 75 to 80c per bushel; hay, per cwt., 25 to 30c.

PROFESSOR FORTANA.—Yesterday afternoon Professor Fortana, while blindfolded, drove a lancecock containing several well-known citizens over many of the principal streets of the city, the route selected being unknown to him, and on the way stepped off at the residence of ex-Councillor Beer, and found a wagon ring in a sugar loaf on the sidewalk in the dining-room, which Mr. Beer had secreted there some hours previously.

THE END NOT YET.—On Saturday a writ was issued out of the Supreme Court at suit of D. N. Murray against Van Meter, Butcher & Co. for balance of wages and traveling expenses, and a bonus of one-third of the apparent profits of the firm of Van Meter, Butcher & Co. for the year ending March 15, 1894, after allowing a reduction of 10 per cent. on paper outstanding. The total amount claimed is \$2,000.—Moncton Times.

AT THE OPERA HOUSE.

The Elton Opera Company gave their opening entertainment at the Opera House last evening to a not extravagantly large but greatly pleased audience. NEWS NOTES.

The British regular army at the end of last year numbered 220,000 men of all ranks, which was about 3,000 above the "establishment." The reserves numbered 80,349, among the militia 124,700, the yeomanry (volunteer cavalry) 10,400, and the volunteers 227,500.—During 1893, 31,817 recruits joined the army.

Probably the oldest clergyman in the world was a Greek priest who lately died in The-saly, Greece, after completing his 120th year. He never left the place in which he was born and where he died. He was accustomed to begin his priestly offices before sunrise, and to retire promptly at nine. His sight and hearing were in excellent condition to the day of his death, and he never made use of spectacles. He was in the active ministry for ninety-nine years.

A Rio Janeiro special says: A plot to abduct or assassinate Dr. Presidente Jose de Moraes, the President of Brazil, has been discovered. The object of the conspiracy was to prevent his entering upon the duties of President of the Republic of Brazil, to which he was elected by an overwhelming majority in the closing days of de Mello's term of office. The plot was discovered throughout the country, particularly in this city and state. The police are making arbitrary arrests, and an uprising is imminent. If revolution comes, it will be more formidable than the last.

The Duchess of Bedford recently told a girl's needlework society in Mile End, England, that the bonnet which the Queen had at the jubilee service was practically made by the Princess of Wales. "It was sent home," said Her Grace, "looking heavy and ugly. Nobody dared return it to the milliner without the Queen's orders, and nobody liked to ask Her Majesty for such instructions. So the ladies in waiting showed it to the Princess of Wales, knowing how clever she is in all such matters, and Her Royal Highness, with her own hands, altered it and twisted it till it became the extremely becoming and tasteful hat-dress which we all admired on that memorable occasion. Everybody who saw it thought that the Queen had never had a prettier bonnet, but how it came to be so pretty is news of today."
