Youth Exchange Plan Slated For Discussion

Leaving the province this morning, Malcolm MacKenzie, deputy minister of education, will represent Prince Edward Island at the federal-provincial conference on youth travel, being held in Ottawa tomorrow.

This youth travel project is being carried out by the Canadian Centennial Commission, and is scheduled to get underway this year and wind up with the close of celebrations of the 1967 centennial.

The idea of the project is to select certain students, with the proposed age range of 15 to 17 who will exchange visits from one province with another at the expense of the federal government.

Mr. MacKenzie said "through the program it is expected that those selected will gain experience which will provide participants with a broader outlook and a vastly increased

The committee reported that this year two extra trips will be made daily by the ferries plying between Borden and Cape Tormentine and that during the tourist season "total trips at Borden will be nineteen, one per day each way."

TORONTO (CP) - An imaginary atomic bomb exploded in downtown Toronto Sunday and killed at least 450,000 persons. The mock attack - dubbed "Buckeye 1" by the Emergency Measures Organization here - was the second in a series of national survival exercises involving regular units of the Canadian army.
