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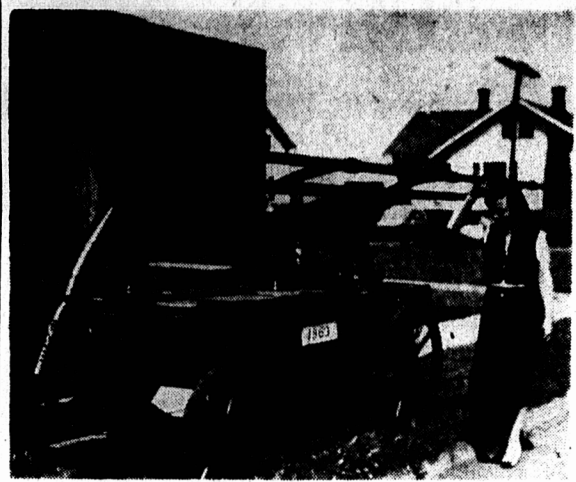

Hand Equipment Recalls Early Fire Fighting Days In S'ide



—At the convention of Maritime Fire Chiefs held in Summerside some time ago there was in the parade the first fire engine used in that town. This equipment (shown above) is a hand-pumped machine about 20 feet long. It has two cylinders, each about nine inches in diameter with a stroke of about 18 inches.
It was manned by men pumping on a handle on each side and required 18 or 20 men to properly handle. It has one outlet for fire hose and water was pumped from water front, or underground tanks through a 10-inch suction hose 15 feet long.
Built in 1863 at Seneca, N.Y., by Coverly & Co., this piece of apparatus was the first secured by Summerside and with another hand engine of a larger type, the "Niagara", comprised the fire fighting equipment of the town until 1884 when the steam fire engine "Beaver" was secured. This equipment served the town from the early days until 1908 when the water system was completed.

Present-Day Equipment
Today Summerside has up-to-date equipment including one new modern pumper secured in 1939, one combination chemical and fire truck, one hook and ladder truck equipped with new aluminum ladders, one salvage truck, one hose truck, over 3000 feet of regulation fire hose, besides tarpaulins for salvage corps, shut-off fog and regulation nozzles, and such other equipment that an up-to-date department would require.
There are two fire companies, one hook and ladder company, and one salvage company.

to bona fide dealer or replacement cost, whichever is lower, less cash quantity discounts, plus excise duties and sales taxes, if any."
By inserting the words "directly or indirectly" in the motion, Mr. Croll intended to include any attempts to evade the proposed law through these three trade practices: Combination sales of commodities; inflated trade-in allowances; concealed price reductions in premiums and discounts.
Exempted From Ban
Exempted from the loss-leader ban would be sales of goods:
1. Damaged, or sold because they are the balance of a line being discontinued or out of season.
2. For charitable purposes or relief agencies.
3. Which are perishable and must be sold promptly to prevent deterioration and consequent loss.
4. Sold in clearance sales, provided in advertisements and mark-ups.
5. On final liquidation of a business, provided it is made clear in advertisements and mark-ups.
6. Under the bankruptcy or winding-up acts or by judicial order.
Mr. Croll's notice of motion was interjected during testimony by representatives of the Canadian Pharmaceutical Association.
J. W. Preston of Toronto, the association's secretary-manager, and Professor Horace Fuller of the Ontario College of Pharmacy, expressed deep concern that the elimination of price maintenance will result in widespread price-cutting and cause the ruin of many small merchants.
Previously, Mr. Preston stated that the association would not be so opposed to price maintenance removal if a law could be drafted to block loss-leader selling.

Doctor's Bill Slashed From \$8,300 To \$700

MONTREAL, Nov. 29 — (CP) — A doctor's bill for \$8,300 was slashed to \$700 by Mr. Justice Joseph Archambault.
The \$8,300 represented \$100 a day for visits, the Superior Court judgment found, to a patient who went out almost daily with an attendant.
The \$8,300 claim was made by Dr. J. D. Fieldman against Mrs. Evans. In May, 1950, Evans engaged quarters in a convalescent home of which the doctor was president.
Evidence showed that Evans was not ill but required a place to stay where he could have medical supervision and care if necessary. His Lordship noted that Evans regularly took his meals outside the institution and nearly every day went for a taxi drive with an attendant.
An attendant said some of the doctor's visits were merely "social calls," often only a "how are you"

New Heating System For Holman's Store

At the inauguration of Holman's 25-Year Club recently, Mr. A. W. MacDonald, in relating incidents of years past when the founder, Mr. R. T. Holman was living, told how the store at that time was heated by using the old fashioned pot bellied stoves and that it was his chore, as junior boy, to bank the fires at night before leaving.
The heating system presently being installed by the firm is a far cry from this antiquated system and will be the first of its kind in Summerside.
The new unit is a hot water system using a Ray fully automatic burner using bunker "C" oil, crude oil which is not refined but is used just as it comes from the ground. The oil has to be pre-heated and in this case will be heated by a hot water heater installed in the bottom of the 12,000 gallon storage tank capable of holding two full railway cars of the fuel oil. This huge tank is being placed underground beside the store in the driveway leading from the street to the parking lot.
The water heater used in this storage tank was built by Mr. Marc Bernard of Halifax who is in charge of the installation work and who is superintendent of out-of-state installations for the Reo Engineering Co. of Halifax. The oil is conducted to the combustion chamber of the furnace and through the Ray air atomizer (burner) at approximately 100 lbs. air pressure. In this process the oil is mixed with air to give proper combustion of the fuel.
Superintendent Bernard said that this method of heating is cheaper than the other method, has lower maintenance costs and allows more storage room in the basement.
The new unit will replace two hot water furnaces and two steam furnaces presently used to heat the building. It is expected that the heat system will be in operation within three weeks.—S.

Normal Operations For Canadians In Europe

WEST SECTOR, Korea, Nov. 30 — (Friday) — (CP) — Canadian troops in Korea have been ordered to carry on normal military operations—except that no offensive infantry action is to be started.
High-level orders to govern front-line operations during the remainder of Korean armistice negotiations—orders subject to much speculation and controversy during the last 48 hours—were clarified tonight.
In effect, the orders as they now stand are:
1. Operations will continue as before except that no offensive infantry action against the Chinese Reds will be initiated by Canadian troops;
2. The present forward defence positions will be maintained and improved;
3. All normal precautions will continue to be taken to safeguard forward positions;
4. Patrol activity will be confined to "aggressive reconnaissance" only;
5. Artillery, mortar and tank fire will be retaliatory, harassing, counter-battery or on enemy targets openly exposed;
6. Suspected enemy positions will not be engaged;
7. Retaliatory fire will be in the ratio of five to one;
8. Harassing and counter-battery fire will be only on known enemy troop and gun positions.
The operations order was handed down from the highest level. Within the Canadian formation, it was paraphrased by Brig. J. M. Rockingham, brigade commander, to ensure that it was in the most simple terms, easily understandable to all ranks.

Heavy Christmas Express Traffic Is Expected

MONTREAL, Nov. 30—As a heavy volume of Christmas express traffic is anticipated this year, George H. Griffin, manager of the Express Traffic Association of Canada, said here today, that to avoid disappointment it will be necessary to express Christmas parcels early if they are to reach their destination before the Yuletide holiday.
For New Brunswick, Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island the latest date for expressing parcels with-in the Provinces and to Quebec is December 15, to Newfoundland December 13, to Ontario December 14, to Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta December 12, and to British Columbia December 10.
Parcels sent by express from centres in the Province of Newfoundland to British Columbia should be on their way by December 8 at the latest; to Quebec, Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island December 13, to Ontario December 11, to Manitoba, Saskatchewan, and Alberta December 10, while the deadline for destinations in Newfoundland is December 15.

Ming Sung Company Told Not To Use Canadian Registry

OTTAWA, Nov. 29—(CP)—Prime Minister St. Laurent said yesterday that the Ming Sung Company has been told that seven Canadian-built and Canadian-registered ships they have been operating in Asiatic waters will no longer be allowed to "carry on under Canadian registry."
In reply to questions by George Drew, Progressive Conservative leader in the Commons the Prime Minister said however that the order-in-council allowing the ships to fly the Canadian flag has not been revoked.
The ships have not returned from recent runs from the port of Hong Kong to Macao and Canton. The Government does not know where they are at the moment.
The banks which gave a \$12,000,000 Government-backed loan for construction of the ships by the Ming Sung Company of Canada, have instituted legal proceedings following failure of the company to meet interest payments.
