Double Jeopardy Ruled As Charges Dismissed

ALBERTON—Two men charged with assaulting Rodmond Zidershaw, Tignish, on Aug. 26, 1961, had their cases dismissed by Magistrate W. Chester S. MacDonald in Alberton yesterday on the grounds of double jeopardy.

Robert Frederick Jones, Ebbsfleet and Joseph Wilfred Doucette, St. Edwards, pleaded not guilty to similar charges of assault in a court appearance in Alberton on Aug. 30 and defence counsel, J. Watson MacNaughton, QC, objected in a later court appearance in Summerside to new charges being laid, on the grounds that the former charges had already placed the two men in jeopardy.

Evidence was taken on a charge against Louis Doucette, Ebbsfleet, charged with breaking the windshield of Edward Tremblay's car and the case was adjourned to Aug. 14 in Summerside. All three cases resulted from an incident at St. Edwards on Aug. 26 last when Fishery Officer Eiderhav was severely injured.

COURT DISTURBANCE
For causing a disturbance in Alberton court house on Aug. 1, Ivan Chester Adams, Alberton, was fined \$20 and costs. For driving a motor vehicle while impaired by alcohol or a drug, Lee Clayton Ramsay, of Campbellton was fined \$75 and costs. Milton Aymar Smallman, O'Leary pleaded not guilty to a similar charge and the case was adjourned for one week.

Falling to give right of way resulted in a fine of \$10 and costs to Annie Joseph Chalson, Tignish, while Robert Murray MacAusland, Bloomfield was given a similar fine for operating an improperly equipped vehicle.

Joseph Arthur Cannon, Dugar, gave evidence on his own behalf on a charge of possession of illicit spirits contrary to the Excise Act. Defense lawyer, Mr. MacNaughton requested the adjournment owing to a material witness in the case being an inmate of Summerside jail.

Securities Are Stolen

NEW YORK (AP)—Sutro Brothers and Company reported Wednesday the theft of some \$100,000 in securities.

Sutro is the third major brokerage house here to be hit by stock-robbers. J. S. Bache and Carl M. Loeb, Rhodes previously reported thefts of \$1,300,000 and \$125,000 respectively.

Stephen Floersheimer, a Sutro partner, said the loss was covered by insurance. He said the matter is in the hands of police. The Federal Bureau of Investigation said it is investigating.

Investigators say the plastic becomes hard as crystal if eaten.
