Red Cross Clinics Opening Today

The Red Cross mobile blood donor team consisting of 12 girls arrived in the city early last evening after an uneventful trip from Halifax as compared with its visit here last December when the team encountered difficulty with two of the three vehicles.

Members of the team said last night that they are all set to get underway with the three days of Charlottetown clinics which start off with a three-hour session this afternoon at St. Dunstan's University. According to Desmond Duffy, the chairman of the Red Cross blood donor committee at the college, a record attendance is expected since there has been no clinic at St. Dunstan's since this time last year.

The Charlottetown clinic will officially open at Zion Church Hall this evening at 8 p.m. and run until 10 o'clock, the objective is 150 for this evening's session at which the mobile team will be assisted by volunteers drawn from Zion Church Ladies' Auxiliary, Trinity United Church Women, Nurses' Association and Birchwood High School Red Cross.

"Much of our time was spent in the field in Germany. We were to have come home last October, but the Berlin crisis prompted our prolonged stay. When we arrived in Quebec aboard the Ivernia, the river pilots were on strike, so the captain piloted the ship into Quebec himself."

Cpl. Fall said the men would be home with their families until about April 22 when they will return to Camp Gagetown, N.B. The men will then be going to Montreal in early June for the "tinting of the colours" which will probably be followed by a five-week concentration in Gagetown with British troops that will arrive for the exercise.

Living in German army German-speaking people, Cpl. Fall said he and others soon picked up enough of the language to understand the German conversation. The Fall's six-year old daughter "can speak German as well as English" said he.

Asked whether the Berlin crisis had any marked effect on the soldiers in West Germany, he said that all seemed normal. "We enjoyed our stay in Germany, but we're sure glad to be home again," he said.

School Bd. Chairman Sees New Era For Education

The beginning of a new era in the educational system in Charlottetown was forecast by the chairman of the Charlottetown Board of School Trustees, Dr. R.G. Lea in addressing the Charlottetown Rotary Club yesterday.

Dr. Lea said the last 12 years have marked a period of re-orientation, re-orientation and development and the era just beginning will, it is hoped, show the results of that period.

He said that the establishment of a vocational high school in this area will mean the school board will be able to establish a broader curriculum.

"Although this is still in the study phase, but with its establishment we hope to be able, at the grade nine level, to divide our classes into those who will remain with us for grades nine and 10 and go on to Prince of Wales for their academic high school course, and those who will go on to the vocational school for their two-year high school course, based on a solid core of regular, high school subjects supplemented with technical and vocational subjects.

"At the end of this year they will receive a high school graduation certificate. In this group in the future will be, we hope, many who now end their formal education at the end of grades eight to 10," he said.

Russia Leading In Fish Output

BOSTON (AP) — The Soviet Union, which depended on the Georges Bank fishing grounds off Cape Cod in 1961 in what appears to have been the most intense fishing operation in the world, now leads world fisheries production, a United States government report said Monday.

The Boston Blue Sheet, a daily fishing news report, said that the Russian catch topped that of all other maritime nations of the world.

It described the Russian blitz on the fishing grounds off Cape Cod as probably the most intensive of all commercial fisheries operations in world history.

Ten years ago, the report said, Russia's inland fisheries accounted for 54 per cent of the national catch. Last year, the inland fisheries produced 75 per cent of all Russian fish. Russia entered the Russian catch topped that of all other maritime nations of the world.

Well Known Insurance Man, Lloyd S. Stevenson, Passes

One of the province's best known insurance men, Lloyd S. Stevenson, 65, died in hospital yesterday after an illness of several days.

An Island native, he was born in New Glasgow, a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. William Howard Stevenson. He was a veteran of the First World War in which he served overseas with the famous Island 105th, later transferring to the 85th Canadian Highlanders.

After demobilization he joined the Bank of Nova Scotia and served in several Maritime branches before returning to the province to enter the life insurance field. He began with the North American Life Company in 1924 and remained with them until his death. He also had carried on a general insurance business.

He is survived by his wife, the former Ethel Menne, of Kentville, N.S., and four sons, Jack, William, Robert and Murray, all of Charlottetown. Also surviving are two brothers, Vernon, Fredericton, N.B., and Bruce, Souris. There are also 15 grandchildren.
