

A Terrible Death.

Eliphalt Roberts, a young man 21 years of age, met with a sudden and frightful death on Monday morning, while attending to the engine that was hoisting pitch into the brigantine Sullivan alongside of the government pier. The accident occurred between 7 and 8 o'clock, when the laborers were all busy, each man attending to his own work. Young Roberts was the driver of the engine, and when seen last was standing with his hand on the lever. It is thought that his coat must have caught in the machinery in some way and drawn him in to his death. When the engine stopped the laborers looked around and saw nothing but Roberts' legs, his body being apparently in the machinery. Steam was shut off and the fire raked from under the boiler, but some minutes elapsed before the body could be extricated from its position. Life was extinct when that was accomplished. There was a deep cut on the lower jaw of the deceased, which was caused by one of the cog wheels. His neck was broken and his back in three places. The body was taken to the home of his father, Robert Roberts, where an inquest was held by Coroner White and a verdict of accidental death returned. Deceased was a sober, industrious young man, and had a large circle of warm friends to whom the news of his sudden death was a great shock. -St. John Telegraph.

Socialists in London.

Lord Salisbury, replying to a Socialist request to receive a deputation of unemployed workmen, writes that the Government are deeply sensible of the poor in winter, and will consider attentively any ascertained facts laid before them; but, in view of recent events, he does not think any public advantage would result from his receiving a deputation.

The Socialist Federation has issued a long manifesto, saying: "We will not take the responsibility for leading unarmed and defenceless people against a powerful body of armed men who are obliged to obey orders which they detest. We, therefore, call upon citizens who are obliged to submit to force in the city to assert their rights of public meeting and petition in Trafalgar Square at 3 o'clock in the afternoon of Lord Mayor's day. We appeal to you not to injure the great cause by riot or disorder. Finally, we pledge ourselves to continue the agitation until we obtain for unemployed workmen that recognition of their labor which they have a right to demand."

Troops from the Maritime Provinces.

During Mayor Howland's visit to Fredericton, N. B., his worship addressed the Infantry School Corps in the drill hall. Sir Leonard Tilley was also present and addressed the corps. During the course of his speech, his honor stated that the reason this province was the last called upon to furnish troops for the suppression of the late rebellion in the Northwest, was owing to the fact that Great Britain was then on the verge of a war with Russia, and it was, therefore, deemed unwise, at that critical time, to withdraw troops from this province, with the certainty of an attack on our seaport towns from Russian privateers, and an invasion of the provinces by Fenians. Sir Leonard stated that this had been a state secret, the necessity for the observance of which had now ceased to exist. -Fredericton Capital.
