Local Items Appearing In Dominion Public Accounts

Though this city has seen no activity in construction of the proposed Federal Public Building here the Government has spent over \$316,884 on the project, according to the Public Accounts of Canada for the year ending March 31, 1952.

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Meeting of The P. E. I. Presbytery

The Prince Edward Island Presbytery of the United Church of Canada met in regular quarterly session in Hertz Memorial Hall, Charlottetown on Tuesday afternoon, Feb. 3, beginning at 2 o'clock.

The Chairman, Rev. D. W. MacPherson of Murray Harbour, presided and Rev. S. H. Haslam of Margate led in the opening devotions. Minutes of last meeting were presented in printed form by Rev. W. B. Crowe of Bedouque, Secretary.

Correspondence was read from the Hunter River Pastoral Charge re electric power rates for rural churches which in some cases have only one evening service a month, asking Presbytery support in an effort to secure more reasonable rates.

Rev. R. A. MacLeod, Statistical Secretary, reported that all but two pastoral charges had sent in their schedules. The figures so far were encouraging.

Rev. S. H. Haslam spoke on The Observer plan. He reported that over 40 congregations had enrolled, making a total of ten thousand families to receive the church paper, at the reduced rate when the paper goes to all the active families in a congregation.

Rev. W. B. MacPhall, of Breadalbane, Convener of Home Missions, read the grants requested for aid-receiving and marginal fields, and these were approved by Presbytery.

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St. Dunstan's Alumni Active in Boston

The Saint Dunstan's University building fund will receive a helping hand from the Alumni Association of Boston when the latter holds its annual benefit dance and whist party at the Rose Croix Hall, Roxbury, next Friday night.

A former Islander, Richard B. Johnston, lawyer of Boston and a son of the late James J. Johnston of this city, takes a keenly active part in the annual dance in support of his Alma Mater.

The Missionary & Maintenance report was given by Rev. J. F. MacKay of Vernon. The figures were not all in, but a number of the crosses were reported, and the Presbytery has probably passed its allocation. Plans were also mentioned in reference to the United Church Exposition to be held in Charlottetown in May.

Mr. Sydney Green reported on the Presbytery visitation of Pastoral Charges, reviewing the work and planning re the new scale of ministerial salaries. 28 of the 34 charges have been visited, with encouraging results.

The evening session opened at 7 p.m. the Chairman presiding and Rev. W. N. Byers of Mount Stewart leading in prayer.

The Pastoral Relations Committee reported a request from Rev. George Gough of Cavendish for a change of pastorate at the end of the conference year. Some discussion took place re the method of removal and employment of Rev. W. B. F. Corkum in a church in Ottawa.

Presbytery approved the arrangement whereby Mr. Thurber is to be lay supply at O'Leary until an ordained minister is called. As he is a student for the ministry, he was placed under the supervision of the Committee on Colleges and Students.

Rev. C. D. Matheson of Summerside presented the report of the Committee on Evangelism and Social Service, and called on Rev. W. G. Berry of Toronto, who spoke of our church's voluntary total abstinence program, visitation and mass evangelism, homes for elderly people, and the new church membership booklet, "The Christian and Peace."

The Pensions Committee report, given by Rev. J. M. Sheen, contained the request from Rev. T. A. Wilson, for retirement at the end of June, with benefits from the Pension Fund. This was approved. Mr. W. A. Black of Charlottetown expressed appreciation of Mr. Wilson's work, and good wishes on his retirement.

Rev. W. B. MacPhall, past chairman, was asked to occupy the chair while Rev. D. W. MacPherson gave the report of the Boundaries Committee. He read the application of the Eldon congregation to become a part of the Orwell - Vernon Charge. After some discussion, this was approved.

Rev. John Macdonald of Liverpool, N.S., was nominated for the next President of the Maritime Conference. Presbytery adjourned at 9.40 p.m.
