CITY COUNCIL.—The four Councillors, Fenell, Hazzard, Hooper, and Hughes, were again present at the Council Chamber last evening. There was no quorum and the meeting was further adjourned until this evening.

ACCIDENT.—A boy named Wm. Mahar about 15 years of age, in the employ of Wm. Grant & Co., Queen Street, was thrown from their express wagon, near the Rankin House, by the horse running away. He was badly shaken up, but no bones are thought to be broken. Dr. Conroy was called and had him removed to the Charlottetown Hospital.

ENTERING THE LISTS.—We learn that Mr. Dillon is about sending five lots of P. E. Island cheese for exhibition at Ingersoll, Ontario. As Ingersoll is the birthplace and home of the dairy enterprise in Canada, the county of Oxford, of which it is the chief town, containing upwards of forty cheese factories, and exporting \$800,000 worth of cheese per year, the fact of P. E. Island entering the lists there is decidedly interesting. Mr. Dillon is also, we learn, about to send a lot of cheese to the Ottawa Exhibition.

ESTERED.—Dr. Firman Jodaux was this morning committed to Prince County Jail, under an execution issued against his body upon the judgment obtained against him by Valentine Cameron at the last Trinity Term of the Supreme Court. After the judgment was recovered, efforts were made to realize the amount, but nothing could be had as a bill of sale had been given to his lawyer. The doctor was then examined under the provisions of the Garnishee Act, and it was discovered that a day or so before the execution was issued Dr. Jodaux drew the most of his money from the Bank and sent it to his son in the States. An application was then made to a supreme court judge for an execution against the P. E. body on the ground that he had fraudulently done away with his money to defeat the execution of Cameron, and the hearing came on before Mr. Justice Hodgson at chamber yesterday, and was argued by Mr. Stewart G. C. and Mr. Johnson for the plaintiff and Mr. Bell for the defendant. At the conclusion of the argument the learned judge held that the Dr. had been guilty of fraudulent concealment of his money. The execution against his body was then issued, and the Dr. is now in Prince County jail.

Mr. William Earle had a miraculous escape from what might have proved a fatal accident at Montreal on Saturday evening last, during a thunderstorm. While crossing a street, he was struck down and carried some distance by the fender of an electric car. His many friends here will be glad to learn that he only received a slight laceration, and is now quite well.

Mr. Percer Carver, who has been studying law at Davies & Hazzard's, leaves for Boston next Friday morning, where he will pursue his studies at Boston University Law School. To-night the Personal Sporting Association and Foresters will entertain Mr. Carver at the residence of Mr. John Smith, of Pownal.

SEIZURE OF LIQUOR.

Police Raid on a Drinking Shop.—A successful raid was made this morning by Marshal Cameron, Sergeants Boyle and Bradley, and Policemen Carter, Taylor and Campbell, and Special Officer Warren, representing the strong arm of the law, proceeded to the residence of Capt. John Hughes, on Water Street. The Marshal was armed with a search warrant, sworn out by Officer Vance, in consequence, it is believed, of information received by him to the effect that the proprietor conducted a bar for the sale of liquor, contrary to the provisions of the Canada Temperance Act. By the time the police officers arrived at the place they were followed by a procession of citizens who had got wind of the affair. No time was lost by the Marshal when he got to the house and found the door locked in his face. Three times he commanded the door to be opened in the Queen's name, and when no response had been made to his demand, he and his force promptly battered the door down with a plank taken from the platform, and entered in triumph.

In the house were the proprietor's wife and some others. The bar is entered from the back yard, it appears, and this door, too, had to be battered down after considerable effort. Then they seized the liquor in stock and put a guard on it. More battering had to be done, however, and the cellar hatch suffered next. This was broken open with a crowbar and the officers entered the cellar. Here they found the proprietor in hiding. Marshal Cameron served him with three summonses, two for first offences against the Canada Temperance Act, and one for keeping liquor for sale. Here, too, a quantity of liquor was found. A truckman was called and the policemen proceeded to load all the ardent upon a sledge. Among the crowd on the opposite side thirsty throats grew drier and wistful eyes looked wistfully upon the brandy, rum, gin and whiskey, in casks, cases, jugs, bottles, and the popular "clack" as it moved off to the Police Station, conveyed by the men in blue. It was placed in the Marshal's office to await the judgment of the court. Capt. Hughes will be up for trial on Monday next.
