JOHNSTOWN, Pa., July 3. Heavy rains yesterday and last night flooded out five families at Cambria City. The water came pouring down the mountains, filling the first floors of the houses and destroying all furniture saved from the flood.

A Disastrous Explosion.

PARIS, July 3. An explosion of fire damp occurred in a coal pit at St. Elime to-day, by which three hundred miners were entombed. A number of bodies have been taken out.

PARSBORO, N. S., July 3. The vote on incorporation was taken here to-day, and resulted in a majority of twenty-six in its favor.
