The Adult Education Conference which concluded at St. Dunstan's University Wednesday at noon, brought together a large number from the three Maritime Provinces, plus representation from Newfoundland, Ontario and there even appeared on the college campus a car with a British Columbia license plate.
St. Dunstan's University was a beautiful setting for the Conference and nothing was left undone which would contribute to the comfort and enjoyment of the visitors. The time of the year was ideal and the weather proved to be perfect; all of which led one visitor to remark that the entire Province resembled a giant-sized golf course.
The important part of the Conference is not, however, the hospitality and sightseeing but is that people from many different walks of life, agriculture, labor, industry, business, fishing, lumbering, education and the Church meet and learn of one another's problems. It is unlikely that there takes place any other gathering

in the Maritimes which provides the same opportunity for a free discussion of the aims and problems of the different sections of our economy.
Those who attended on Monday evening had the opportunity of listening to two splendid addresses on the future of the Atlantic Provinces from the national viewpoint. John H. Dickie, M.P., as parliamentary assistant to the Hon. C. D. Howe was naturally in a good position to picture future trends in Maritime affairs and even if many of the hopeful predictions do not come about for many years, it was nevertheless an encouraging address.
Dr. Forey is an economist in one of Canada's largest labour groups and a native Newfoundland. He approached the subject with realism and without cynicism. The region would always have problems and some of these might not be solved but this did not mean that an increasing population in the Maritimes could not go on leading happy, useful lives.

GROUP DISCUSSION
On Tuesday, the Education Conference divided into six sections, viz., Agriculture, Fisheries, Mining and Heavy Industry, Forestry and Woodlots, Education, National and Regional Economic Policies.
Delegates were free to attend the group of their choice and at two Sessions to discuss the relation of their topic to the Maritime view. Reports were then presented at a General Session and will eventually form part of the Conference literature.
The Conference was well attended but it is to be regretted that more Islanders did not avail themselves of an opportunity which will not come their way for at least another six years. These Conferences are held once every two years and it is likely that New Brunswick will be host in 1957.

and operating a farm even on a modest scale has become very high and the possibility of operating at a profit is in many cases very questionable. It was therefore natural that the agricultural group at the recent Conference should devote considerable time to considering ways and means of increasing farm income. Some of the suggestions were of a general nature but must of necessity be applied by groups. There is, of course, an individual responsibility on the part of the farmer. Summarization of these recommendations included the importance of paying attention to marketing, the joint ownership of machinery, better care of the farm woodlot, better transportation facilities, provision of more favourable credit facilities, production of more per acre, improvement of quality in farm products, and a general attempt on the part of the Atlantic Region to supply where at all possible, its own foodstuffs.

EDUCATION AND TEACHERS
This is the time of the year when local school Boards and parents approach the problem of engaging Teachers for the coming year. During the past decade there has been a marked and commendable improvement in the condition of school buildings and equipment in this Province.
It is however to be regretted that other occupations have been able to induce many of our best teachers to leave their professions for greener economic pastures. Any sort of a school with a good teacher is a good school but the most palatial building without a good teacher is a poor educational unit.
This Province, as indeed very many others, is approaching a crisis in the provision of teachers. There may be no one answer to the solution but no question is worthy of more attention. The problem must be faced up to and solved if the life and economy of
