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Col. John Greer informed the magistrate that in the past two months, highway patrols have frequently given warnings to persons caught in this practice. Particularly on the roads leading to the university where such violations are the most frequent.

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In giving the reprimands the magistrate also issued a few words of warning, and asked the accused to spread the word around the campus, stating that in the next time fines will be handed out. This is a dangerous practice and should be discouraged," he said.

Filing charges to charges of speeding, John Kilburn Young, Montreal; Sam Laidlaw, Toronto; George Young, St. John's; and Oliver Percy MacDonnell, Charlottetown, were each fined \$10 and costs for five days in jail.

On similar charges, fines of \$15 and costs for five days were levied on Marvin Joseph Boich, Charlottetown, and Russell Rupert Armstrong, Ottawa. Fines of \$10 and costs for five days were given Henry Michael Belmont, Charlottetown, for permitting an unlicensed person to drive, and to Dale Marie MacNevin, Charlottetown, for driving without an operator's license.

Two persons pleaded guilty to operating motor vehicles with defective equipment and each was fined \$5 and costs for two days.

A charge of impaired driving against Allan Coles, Suffolk, was dismissed by Magistrate James B. Johnston.

Leo E. Smith, Ujig, charged with creating a disturbance in a public place, had his case adjourned to Dec. 5 for judgment.

The case of James Anthony Murphy, Cherry Valley, was a date for hearing. The accused is charged with impaired driving.

One man here in Toronto Friday flatly rejected the information that the parade was an amateur job. It is strictly a professional job.

"Everywhere we go those of us who are here are encountering the same sentiment expressed that the publicity being received is worth a million dollars to Charlottetown. Literally hundreds of people have inquired about our city as a place to spend their vacations and dozens here have said they would be down next summer."

One real bit of humor was injected into the march to fame when in New Brunswick a very old woman who said she was a former Islander peered closely at the float and said "and that the provincial building" assured that it was, she became indignant that the boys were "hauling it all around the country."

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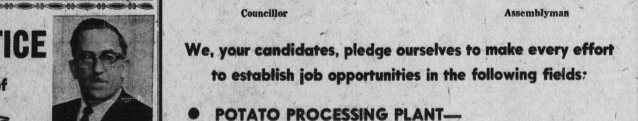
