Montague Firms Change Owners

MONTAGUE — Several Montague firms have changed hands during the past few months with the Deluxe Drycleaners being the more recent. On Tuesday the drycleaning plant was turned over to the new owner Carter Vanderstine, formerly of Peters Road and son of Mr. and Mrs. Edgar Vanderstine.

Mr. Vanderstine has been employed by the Canadian Imperial Bank of Commerce for the past fifteen years and had served at Summerside and Sydney, N.S. He is married to the former Shirley Fraser of New Glasgow, N.S., and they have two boys and two girls.

The new owner has employed Guy Jessome of Sydney who has had twenty-two years experience in the dry cleaning business. This Mr. Vanderstine relates will assure the public of the best and more modern methods of dry cleaning for the area. Mr. Jessome is also married and has a family of four. Both families expect to take up residence in Montague in the near future. The Deluxe Cleaning plant opened for business about twenty years ago with A.F. Campbell and Athol Robertson as co-owners. Earlier this year Mr. Robertson sold out his interest to Mr. Campbell who has now sold to the new owner.

Other firms to change hands this year are the Belle's Shop formerly owned by Mrs. Olive McKnight to Mrs. Edith Worth. Mrs. Worth and her mother, Mrs. Clay sold the restaurant which they had operated for several years to Mrs. Barrett of Charlottetown.

The Jamieson Pharmacy started about fifteen years ago by Harry T. Jamieson changed hands this spring with Henry Larier well known druggist of Souris as purchaser.

The Hickey and Vanderstine Firm advertised for sale has been reported sold to David Ellis, worth who opened and operated a small meat and grocery earlier this year.

A year or so ago the firm of Hooley's Mens' Wear changed hands when Neil Hooley Junior took over the business and opened under the firm name of Montague Mens' Wear.

It is also reported the firm of Montague Auto Body Shop will be closed in the near future. The owner Vince Martin will be moving to Charlottetown where he will be involved in other business.

Monty Warren Dies In Hospital

Monty Warren, a well known resident of the Island died Tuesday night at the P.E.I. Hospital at the age of 95.

Blind almost from birth, he had studied in his youth at the Halifax Institute for the Blind and even in his early years his musical talent was evident. Back in the early days of the century he had been an instructor for a band in Halifax and later had his own band which became widely known on its travels all over Eastern Canada.

Later in life he took up the profession of piano tuner and was known and welcomed in almost every city home where a piano was almost a required piece of furniture.

A native of Kings County he was named after his birthplace, Montague Irving Warren and was a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Warren. His father had one time been a city policeman and later was employed on the railway here as a blacksmith.

The late Mr. Warren had been in ill health for the past couple of years since suffering from a fall into a cellar.

He is survived by three sons, Harold, in Massachusetts, Hollis and John, in Charlottetown, as well as by six grandchildren and 11 great grandchildren. His wife, the former Leah Nauffel of Newfoundland, predeceased him in 1937.

After attending and graduating from Georgetown High School he attended Prince of Wales College and then taught school in various Island centres, including Long River; Mt. Hope; Glenfanning; Alma and Georgetown.

In 1928 he moved to Ottawa where he joined the Civil Service and worked for the Department of the Dominion Bureau of Statistics—Research and Development Section, until the time of his passing.

Left to mourn are his wife, the former Marie Soucy, formerly of Edmundston, N.B.; two sisters: Catherine (Mrs. William S. Martell) of Georgetown and Millicent (Mrs. Roland Martin) of Ottawa; also four nieces and five nephews. He was predeceased by two sisters and two brothers. Interment was in Ottawa.

Gulf Gull Is Towed To Port

GEORGETOWN — The steel trawler, Gulf Gull arrived in Georgetown at approximately 5:30 p.m. yesterday under tow by the trawler Howe Bay.

Several days ago while fishing in stormy weather off St. Pauls Island in the Gulf of St. Lawrence the Gulf broke the main wire cable that tows the fishing net and as a result the net and lead rope became wound around her propeller. It was necessary for a sister trawler to tow her to port.

After her arrival in port the chief engineer of the Gulf Gunn, Vincent Jones, an accomplished skindiver went to work in an effort to cut away the net and rope from the propeller.

By dark last night he had succeeded in clearing the large amount of net that had fouled the propeller and was working on cutting an inch size rope cable that was wound several times around the propeller. It is expected that the operation will be completed today.

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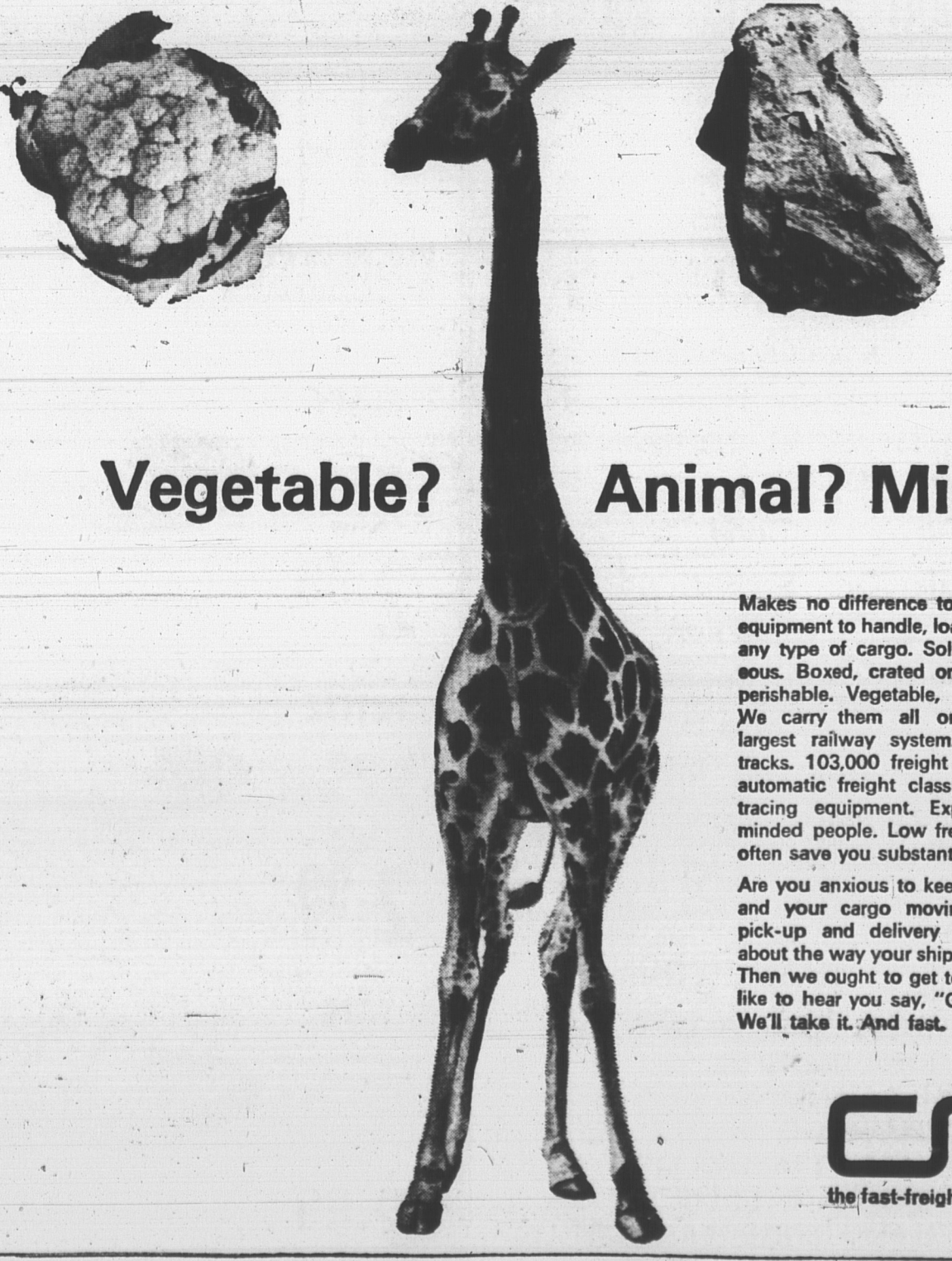
