### THE SUMMER TIME TABLE.

The railway authorities have done well to recognize that the time table in vogue last summer, which gave us direct connection with Boston and Montreal, could not, under the circumstances, be greatly improved on. It is true its originators were roundly abused by the Liberal and independent press, and many absurdities suggested in its stead; but the main features of the arrangement, indeed its every detail as approved and defended by THE EXAMINER, stand. This is, after all, anything but strange to the observing mind. The simple pure article of criticism, never originated anything nor ever approved the ability that did. Now it can afford to eat itself twice over on this, as on more important matters, and declare how agreeable the diet is to its digestive organs. "Crow" is a feast to its new ration, however; and there must surely be a strong revulsion of feeling in the near future. Meantime every friend of progress can congratulate himself that the sharp connection time-card is in operation again and local as well as foreign travel thereby made up to date.

### UNITED STATES FINANCES.

The receipts of the United States Government for the past month have practically offset the expenditures and the deficit for the present fiscal year will be left in the vicinity of \$30,000,000 at the close of the coming month which will round out that period. The receipts from customs will slightly exceed those of last year. For the eleven months completed they have reached \$154,000,000, while for the last fiscal year, they aggregate \$160,000,000. The receipts for the coming month may reach \$15,000,000 although the recent orders for imports in excess of demand because of the threatened retrospective features of the tariff bill may reduce the figures somewhat. The internal revenue receipts, now \$133,000,000 are not likely to quite reach the total of last year, \$146,767,865, because of the prospect of a reduction in the tax upon distilled spirits. Upon the whole the financial position of the United States Government is not improved. Certainly a change is needed. What of the future and the results of the Dingley tariff?

### WAR PROSPECTS.

Intelligent men who are watching the situation in Greece and Turkey are exceedingly anxious concerning the future. The facts of the case are sufficiently grave. Turkish troops have lately been sent in a steady stream into Thessaly. It is estimated that Ethem Pasha has two hundred thousand men under his command. The Greeks are entreaching themselves along the line of the Sperchius and at Thessalonica in evident preparation for a last desperate resistance, if there shall be occasion for it. There are now left only a few days before the expiration of the armistice. Everything depends upon the manner in which the Powers will grapple with the situation. It is said that Great Britain will never consent to allow the Turks to retain Thessaly, and thus far no recent combination in Europe has been able to carry out its purpose when England has refused her support. The Sultan, on the other hand, is compelled to persevere in his demands for the surrender of Thessaly by the strong religious fanaticism of the Moslem world. There have been rumors that his course of action has been pursued not without the approval of or two of the Powers themselves. If that be true grave complications may be anticipated in the near future.

As a result of the labors of Sir John Macdonald, Sir Charles Tupper and other leaders of the Conservative party, Canada is now the leading colony of the Empire; and Mr. Laurier, the chief representative of Canada is to be given precedence at the Queen's Jubilee Celebration. It is a case of one man planting and another taking the fruit thereof.

### ESTABLISHED EXCHANGES.

Portland Transcript: America extends her congratulations to England in her celebration of the Victorian jubilee. May the great Queen be spared to her subjects for many years to come!

Montreal Gazette: While some are ridiculing the publication of the banns of a relic of bygone times, Bishop Hamilton at the opening of the Ottawa Synod, proclaimed himself as a favorer of the practice and gave some other advice as to the celebration of marriage that men of all denominations might well heed. There is no act that falls within a minister's duties that involves more responsibility than that of uniting two people for the term of their natural lives. It is an act that cannot be surrounded by too great solemnity, and in regard to which, as the Bishop well observes, there should be no secrecy.

London Times: "Canada stands midway upon an imperial high road, the opportunities of which enable her to regard with relative indifference the fence along her southern frontier. The longer that fence is maintained in its present position the more assured will be the connection between the Dominion and the Mother Country, the connection we have now had ample proof that both Canadian parties are desirous of maintaining."

SOUSA'S PERLESS BAND.—The band of the World's Fair and Manhattan Beach, an organization of fifty solo artists, headed by the great Sousa himself, will appear in this city next Monday night. Accompanying the band on this tour is Elizabeth Northrop, soprano, and Martini Johnston, violinists. Can any one resist such an array of musical talent. Sousa's encores are frequent at his concerts. Indeed a Sousa concert without a succession of "spirited encore pieces" would lack half of its charms, and the conductor of the band has been so quick to recognize the fact that he is always prepared to good naturedly meet the audience half way in the matter when, like Oliver Twist, it calls for more.

### INTERESTING NEWS NOTES SELECTED FOR THE EXAMINER.

A deputation of members of Parliament waited on the Premier to ask that \$20,000 be placed in the supplementary estimates for the Victorian Order of Nurses fund.

Mr. Pullman's model town bearing his own name has received the highest award of merit from the International Exposition at Prague. The verdict was based on the condition of the street, water system houses, churches, parks, etc. The labor question was not taken account of.

The Chinese Equal Rights League of America has sent out a circular announcing its intention of attempting to secure the repeal of the law debarring Chinese from becoming American citizens. In the present situation of the country, it is doubtful if this attempt will meet with success.

The Sultan joined the other crowned heads of Europe the other day in condoling with France upon the Paris tragedy. He "prays the Providence which protects us to preserve France in the future." Sarcastic London comment was to the effect that it was a great pity the "great assassin's" prayers did not extend to the Armenians.

U. S. society is somewhat flustered over a report that Mr. George Gould may imitate Mr. Wm. Waldorf Astor, and take up his residence in England. That will mean a large transfer of dollars as well. Uncle Sam had better prepare to see some more gold shipments.

The entire works of the Novelty Glass Co., at Washington, Pa., including two factory buildings, was destroyed by fire a few nights ago, involving a loss of \$70,000. Seventy-five men were thrown out of employment.

Two years ago Mrs. Price King, of LaBette county, Kansas, divorced her husband, who, being thus deprived of his means of support, went to the county poor house, where he has since remained. A few days ago Mrs. Pierce went to the poor house, took her ex-husband out and married him over again.

A policeman in Baldwinville, N. Y., town, immortalized by Artemus Ward, has been censured by the press for omitting to shoot three burglars whom he caught operating on a safe. The theory that a policeman should become judge, jury and executioner and make burglary a capital offence has at least the support of established custom.

Some boys of Warren, Ohio, were following a seine in the Ohio canal the other day, when a large turtle fastened to the toes of one of the lads, and, but for the assistance of the men present, would have drowned the boy. To unloosen the reptile its head had to be cut off close to its jaws, and then not for some time could the teeth be loosened. The turtle weighed about thirty pounds.

A few years ago a young man in Chicago was courting an Indianapolis young woman, and two or three evenings a week he would call her up at the telephone at \$2 for five minutes' talk. They courted for a long time, and when they were married the telephone company gave them a present of a beautiful little telephone in silver.

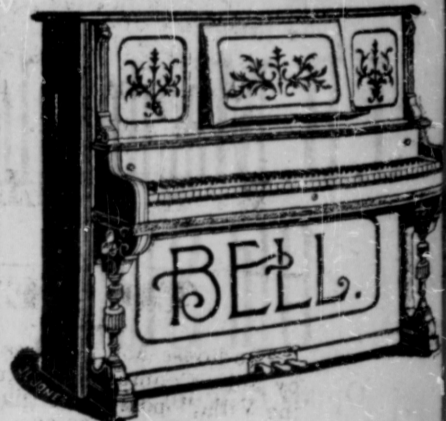
