

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

[SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.]

Emigration Denounced.

DUBLIN, Dec. 10. Notwithstanding that the Government forbade the holding of the Nationalists League Meeting at Loughrea yesterday. The meeting was held close to that town. The authorities despatched a force of police to disperse it; but it had adjourned before the police reached the spot. A motion was passed by the meeting denouncing emigration from Ireland. A letter from the Bishop of Clonfert was read, saying there is room in Ireland for double the present population.

The Fate of O'Donnell.

LONDON, Dec. 10. Grey, O'Donnell's Solicitor, in a letter to the newspapers begs that the members of the jury which tried O'Donnell will confidentially communicate with him, as he desires to address them upon a matter of extreme urgency. He says all other means of communicating with them failed, as he was refused a copy of the panel of the jury before the trial. He has been unable to ascertain their identity since.

Trouble in the East.

BELGRADE, Dec. 10. M. Passhitia, the radical leader in the Skuptschina, and twenty other radicals who were implicated in the recent revolt have been summoned to appear before the Judges at Reaschar for trial on the 16th inst. Most of them, however, have escaped into Bulgaria. Twenty of the rebels who were condemned to death in November have been reprieved.

French Politics.

PARIS, Dec. 10. A Voltaire newspaper urges the Chamber of Deputies to pass a vote of confidence in the Government in order to strengthen it against the intrigue of China. DeLesseps has telegraphed to the Egyptian Government that the alleged arrangement with the shipowners relative to a second Suez Canal, amounts at present simply to informal negotiations.

Frauds Exposed.

NEW YORK, Dec. 10. The Tribune continues its expose of frauds committed in the Department of Public Works, giving additional facts in regard to the contracts for street improvements. In all cases contractors are shown to profit enormously by reason of misleading estimates prepared by the Department.

Irish Troubles.

SLIGO, Dec. 10. Nine persons have pleaded guilty to the charge of conspiracy to murder Martin Lydon, Connemara, county Galway. Patrick McKeown testified that before the murder of Mrs. Smith the prisoners met in a barn and formed an assassination society for the removal of tyrants and bad landlords.

Marine Disasters.

LONDON, Dec. 10. The brig "Joseph" of Queenstown, from Charlottetown, P. E. I., lost, bulwarks and stanchions, and sustained other damage. The brig "Archie," Newfoundland, to Bilbao, put in at Vigo. She jettisoned part of her cargo and is leaking.

Continued Preparations for War.

PARIS, Dec. 10. It is stated the Government has telegraphed to Admiral Courbet to continue his preparations for his campaign against Sontag and Bacnaha, but to await fresh orders from France before taking decisive action.

Sedition in Austria.

STOCKER, Austria, Dec. 10. A number of seditious placards have been found posted about this town. Pamphlets bearing the signatures of several anarchists have been seized.

Fight at a Political Meeting—Whitt vs. Black.

GREENSVILLE, MISS., Dec. 10. During a fight at a political meeting to-night, a white man was seriously injured, one negro killed and two wounded fatally.

Chinese Immigration.

OTTAWA, Dec. 10. A despatch from Victoria, B. C., says the Local House passed a resolution instructing the Government to introduce a bill restricting Chinese immigration.

Fishing Vessels Lost.

GLOUCESTER, Dec. 10. It is feared that four more fishing vessels are lost, making nine in all, with 120 men, by the November gale.

Arrived Too Late.

CAIRO, Dec. 10. The troops recently despatched to Suakin had not arrived there on the 2nd inst., when the defeat of Egyptians near that place occurred.

Irving's Success.

BOSTON, Dec. 10. Henry Irving made his first appearance here to-night as Louis the Eleventh. The performance was very successful.

Tennyson a Peer of the Realm.

LONDON, Dec. 10. The Queen has made Tennyson a Baron.

Fatal Casualty.

DETROIT, Dec. 10. The steam barge "Enterprise" owned in Dresden, Ont., was sunk on Lake Huron this morning. Seven lives were lost.

Sad Drowning Accident.

BUFFALO, N. Y., Dec. 10. Five men while hunting this morning were drowned on the Niagara river by the upsetting of their boat.

A Fight Imminent.

NEW YORK, Dec. 10. Pendergrast, the Brooklyn pugilist, announces his willingness to fight Sullivan for \$5,000.

Ottawa Notes.

OTTAWA, Dec. 10. Craig's extensive furniture factory in St. James Street, Montreal, was destroyed by fire on Saturday night. The total loss is 40,000 dollars which is covered by insurance in British offices. The writ to fill the vacancy in South Huron has been issued. Nomination will take place on the 27th inst. There is no talk of opposition to Sir Richard Cartwright.

LETTERS TO THE EDITOR.

The Next Dominion Exhibition.

SIR,—In yesterday's EXAMINER I noticed a requisition to the Sheriff, asking to have a meeting called, to consider the advisability of petitioning the General Government to grant a sum of money for the purpose of holding a Dominion Exhibition at Charlottetown next year. I have no objection to the Sheriff or any other person calling a meeting, providing that any good can be done by so doing. I think we will simply make an "exhibition" of ourselves by calling a meeting for the object named.

For the past three years we know by bitter experience what it has been to send our small exhibit across the water to get to the Halifax, St. John and Montreal Exhibitions, yet we have the temerity to ask the Government to name Charlottetown as the place to hold the next Dominion Exhibition, thus compelling thirty-nine fortieths of the people to come to an Island extreme part of the Dominion with their exhibits. Have we the building for such an exhibition? Have we hotel accommodation for three hundred people, much less for the many thousands who should attend. We are ever asking for something out of all reason, and, of course, get nothing. One day some genius suggests that we ask the Dominion Government to assume the liabilities of the Bank of P. E. Island, again another proposes that we be satisfied with nothing short of a tunnel under the straits; and now we have others asking to have the Dominion Exhibition held at Charlottetown.

Now let us as a people give up this nonsense. Let us simply ask the Government to carry out the Terms of Union, by giving us the necessary steam communication with the mainland, and also represent that inasmuch as we are isolated from the rest of the Dominion, and find it difficult to get our exhibits over (or the rest of the Dominion to get here) would they not grant us a sum towards a good local exhibition, seeing it would be inexpedient to give us our turn in holding the Dominion Exhibition here.

COMMON SENSE.

The New Railway Time Table.

SIR,—Superintendent Coleman, of the P. E. Island Railway, deserves the hearty thanks of the people of Prince Edward Island, for the comprehensive notice of the winter arrangement of the trains, published in Saturday's EXAMINER. It is the first intelligent and intelligible table ever issued in connection with our railway. Heretofore, even those who gave attention to the subject, found it difficult oftentimes to get a correct idea of the movement of the trains. Sometimes one might commence at the top of the table to gain information as to the starting of certain trains; other times he must go to the bottom and read up; again, it would be necessary to commence in the middle and go up or down. It was often the result of deep brown study to tell which was right; and yet again he must commence near the bottom and go both ways. The whole of the arrangements were a muddle and a jumble to the greater portion of the public. Those who were adepts at difficult puzzles, and in deciphering hieroglyphics, found pleasure, no doubt, in solving the difficulties of the tables; but to those who valued time and wished to put their brain power to other uses the tables were a source of more than annoyance. But, now the public has a time table which any person who can read can comprehend. The whole story of the movements of trains is told as plain as the letters of the alphabet and the numerals can tell it. "He who runs may read." A feature not common to railway time tables is also given in the columns showing standard railway time, and common or ordinary time. The idea is an excellent one, and Mr. Coleman deserves additional praise for having entertained it. Those who now miss trains have only themselves to blame.
