likely that this play would cost a trick, even if it turned out that South had the queen. Declarer's losing diamonds, in any case, appeared destined to go on dummy's long spades whether South had the queen or not.

Declarer took with the ace and returned a trump, losing the king to the ace. West thereupon led the jack of diamonds and it came East's turn to contribute his bit.

Since West had ignored the trick signal on the opening trick, it became obvious to East that West was aware declarer could have no more clubs. The dangerous diamond lead from K-J could mean only that West was desperately trying to obtain a diamond ruff.

So East overtook the jack with the queen, even though the jack was the high diamond, and returned a diamond. West trumped with the nine and the contract went down one.

With all due credit to East and West for their synchronized performance, the contract should nevertheless have been made.

Declarer should have been more aware of the danger he faced. He could have taken one simple step to prevent the ruff which defeated him.

By ducking the king of diamonds when it was led, he could have severed communication between the East and West hands and assured the contract. Nothing could be lost by making use of this safety measure.

Trip To The Moon Is Not Pleasure For Gourmets

CHICAGO (AP) — Military and civilian researchers are preparing a meal fit for a space king—the first American to journey to the moon and back.

Maj. Gen. C. J. Bondley Jr., director of supply and services for the U.S. Air Force, expects it will be ready in about two years.

Food and container specialists believe they will be able to assure the first traveller to penetrate deep into space that he will have adequate food, liquids and oxygen for survival in reason able comfort.

By kingly standards, the meal will not be sumptuous. Items being developed include:

Semi-solid ham, chicken and beefsteak that can be squeezed out of a collapsible metal tube.

LIQUID MEATS

Slender sausages and other solid foods that can be screwed out of a lipstick-type container.

Four liquid meats and a variety of fruit and vegetable juices that can be sucked by tube out of a can.

The military services are pushing their own research into the survival problems encountered in the upper atmosphere and outer space. The food and container industries are co-operating in an effort to find suitable foods and food dispensers.

PRESSURE PROBLEMS

Why won't the space traveller enjoy the wide variety of food delicacies offered to passengers on modern airliners?

As a safety precaution, the first space travellers probably will wear pressurized suits and air-tight helmets, even though the cabin of the space ship is pressurized.
