PARK SOLD.—Mr. George Mutch, of this city has sold his farm of 180 acres at Frenchfort, known as the "Brantford Farm," to Mrs. Mayberg, of New York, formerly a Miss Bishop of Murray River, for the sum of \$6,500. Mr. Mutch retains the standing crop. We understand that it is Mrs. Mayberg's intention to have her parents settle on the farm, and there she and her husband and friends will spend the summer months.

AT IT AGAIN.—It is currently reported that George McDonald, the celebrated Western liquor pedler, free as the air he came of the shameful way those in charge are delaying the writs against him, was on hand, either in person or by his agents, at the Palmer Road Tea. THE FIREMEN'S TOURNAMENT.—At the firemen's tournament in John's Bay Wednesday, Amherst won the hose cart race in 1 minute, St. John second in 1.08-1/2, Woodstock third in 1.12-1/2, and Fairville fourth in 1.24. The race was open to ten men from each department, to run 300 yards, attach to hydrant, stretch 200 feet of hose, and put on branch pipe. The first prize was \$150; second, \$75, and third, \$25. There were two races entered for the Hook and Ladder race—five men to run 50 yards, raise a 30 foot ladder, one man to ascend to top—Amherst and St. John. The Amherst team's time was 20 seconds. The St. John team won in 17-1/2 seconds. The prize was \$25. Besides these events there were several flat races, a tug-of-war, etc. Amherst captured \$180 of the prize money, St. John \$140, and Woodstock \$25.
