Clashes Reported In Polish Capital For The Fourth Night

WARSAW, Poland (AP)—Club-wielding riot squads hurled tear gas into demonstrating crowds here Sunday night for the fourth successive night. Several persons were arrested.

The clash came outside the 30-storey Palace of Culture, a Russian-built structure housing government offices and theatres in Parade Square, formerly called Stalin Square.

PATROL ARMED
Crowds had been assembled there for two hours, warily watching riot police who, for the first time, patrolled with rifles.

As the crowds stoned passing police cars, police pulled some men out of the mob, beat them and arrested them.

Across the town, students packed into St. Anne's Church to hear a sermon by Poland's Roman Catholic primate, Stefan Cardinal Wyszyński.

Police and demonstrators have clashed in Warsaw for the last three nights in the biggest flare-up of trouble since the anti-Soviet riots a year ago.

CALLED HOOLIGANS
The new demonstration came

after police announced the arrest of 150 persons whom they described as hooligans. Student groups appeared to be backing away from further demonstrations. It was a student demonstration last Thursday that spraked the series of riots.

A communique published in all Warsaw papers said "various groups of hooligans incited riots Saturday between 7 and 11 p.m. at Constitution Square and later in the vicinity of Chmieleska and Swietokrzyska Streets."

Militia men—factory workers deputized to support police—were showered with stones before they could disperse the rioters.

Although the disturbances sprang from student protests over suppression of the student newspaper Po Prostu, persons of all types joined in the battle with police and militia. The students also managed to arrange over tough police tactics in breaking up their demonstration Thursday near the Warsaw Polytechnic school.

The Polytechnic student committee appealed to other students today to stay away from trouble areas and not to let themselves be identified with troublemakers.

His dog on a mat, his clothes on a chair.

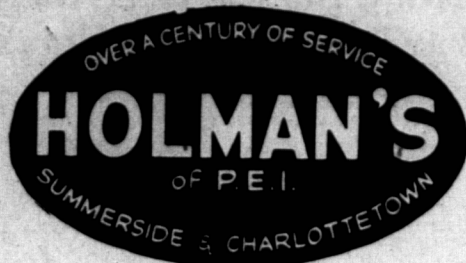
We strive hard for money, its needed of course
