

**Local and Other Items.**

**BARKENTINE** "Ethel Blanche," to Peake Bros. & Co., with cargo of general merchandise from London, arrived here on the 30th inst.

**THE CHALLENGE** shooting match between Sergeant M. Allan and Private Jas. Dover, both of No. 6 Company, takes place at Kensington Rifle Range, tomorrow afternoon.

A NUMBER of the professional and amateur gents who made Saturday night hideous on Pownal street will be called to render an account before the Stipendiary to-morrow morning.

**THE steamer "Worcester"** arrived from Boston at 2 o'clock this afternoon, with a general cargo and Mrs. Holt, Mrs. Hand, Miss Maggie Commands and Mr. A. B. Phelan as passengers.

**MR. T. L. CHAPPELLE** informs us that, three quarters of an hour after leaving St. John yesterday morning, the train was met by an "old-fashioned snow-storm," which lasted over ten minutes.

**THE MCCARTHY TRIAL.**—It is said sixteen new witnesses in the McCarthy case will be brought forward at the approaching trial. The St. John Globe, says rumor has it that some important evidence will be produced.

A DEEPWATER sailor, furiously intoxicated, was on the rampage in the West Bog this forenoon. He assaulted several of the female denizens of that locality with sticks, stones, etc.; stormed a dwelling; breaking glass, and threatening to murder the inmates, and on the appearance of the police disappeared towards Brighton Road.

**THE City Marshal,** yesterday evening, arrested a Rustico farmer who he found drunk and driving wildly through the streets in an express wagon which ran on three wheels—the fourth having been broken in a collision with another vehicle. He was the only appearance at the Stipendiary Magistrate's Court this forenoon, and was fined \$2 and costs or 8 days.

**THE Grand Division, Sons of Temperance,** met in this city this forenoon—Grand Worthy Patriarch Chappell presiding. Forty representatives were present, and 13 new representatives were initiated. The report of the G. W. S. and G. T. were submitted and referred to appropriate committees. A public meeting will be held in the new Division Room, Queen Street, at 8 o'clock, this evening.

**AT HALF-PAST three o'clock** this morning a barn in the rear of Mrs. Thomas Dawson's premises, Grafton street, was discovered to be on fire. The alarm was quickly given and Rollo engine was soon on the spot. She played from a tank on Grafton street and succeeded in extinguishing the fire in less than three quarters of an hour. One side of the barn is completely destroyed. The fire originated from a pile of burning weeds and shavings which were carelessly left in a garden alongside the barn.

**JAMES WRIGHT,** a native Coolie of St. Helena, and a seaman on board the barkentine "Ethel Blanche," made some insolent demand of the steward of that vessel—Thomas Michael—at noon to-day. An altercation ensued, and Wright drew a sheath-knife—the blade of which is six or seven inches long—and stabbed the steward through the muscle of the left arm, inflicting a large and ugly wound. Wright was arrested on a warrant. The wound was stitched and dressed by Dr. McLeod.
