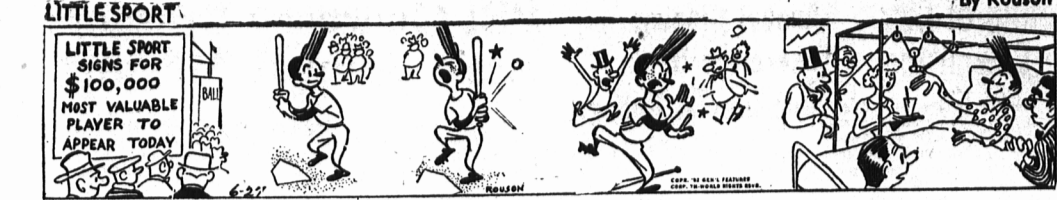

# Maxim's Manager Talks Of LaMotta Title Bout

NEW YORK, June 26 — (AP) — Joe's Maxim's manager talked today of a light heavyweight title defence against Jake LaMotta at Detroit in September as New York gasped for relief from the sweeter near-100 degree heat that forced an exhausted Ray (Sugar) Robinson to surrender in his corner last night at Yankee Stadium.

Maxim, wearing a slight bruise under his right eye, visited the offices of the International Boxing Club with his manager after his 14-round technical knockout win. Robinson, way out front on all official cards, was reported "out of town" to rest after his strenuous attempt to win a third world championship.

"He's fine, just exhausted," said Dr. Vincent Nardiello, Robinson's personal physician. "It was just the heat."  
"He asked me to get a return bout," said George Gainford, Sugar Ray's manager. "They are going to give him an 'Israel salute' to Ray Robinson's dinner at the Astor, July 10. We will for Paris on the 'Liberte' July 11. Robinson will fight Albert Yvel of 'L'Avion' in a benefit bout Aug. 2. He might even make a 'mouche' in Paris' list."

Truman Gibson, T.B.C. official from Chicago, said Robinson told him "I just want to 'sleep'." He didn't even know "Fergie" Goldstein also had collapsed from the heat and had been replaced by Ray Miller in the 11th round.

Goldstein felt all right today although his arm was swollen from infections given him in the dressing room.  
"It was just a case of heat," said the referee.

# Carina Wins Yacht Race

HAMILTON, Bermuda, June 26 — (AP) — Carina, 46-foot yawl owned by Richard Nye of New York, today won the Newport to Bermuda yacht race—the first class C boat ever to capture the 675-mile ocean race.

With only a few of the 58 starters still to be heard from, Carina wrapped up the fleet prize with a corrected time of three days, 16 hours, five minutes 47.5 seconds.

The lone Canadian entry was the Wanderer IX, 45th across the finish line, the 64-foot topsail schooner out of Halifax was skippered by Cmdr. John C. Reed of the Royal Canadian Navy and covered the distance in four days, 18 hours, 13 minutes, 34.5 seconds. Corrected time for the class B entry was four days, 10 hours, 30 minutes 27.5 seconds.

Carina was 16th across the finish line with an elapsed time of 46.5 seconds. But she received handicaps from the class A and B yachts that finished in front of her and none of those behind had enough time allowance to keep the Nye yawl from carrying off the award.

# Major League Baseball Attendance Figures Given

NEW YORK, June 26 — (AP) — Major league baseball attendance has dipped only seven per cent from last year's figures despite the unusually large number of postponements forced by unplayable weather.

An Associated Press survey showed today that the two leagues have attracted a combined total of 4,621,686 paid admissions, a drop of 441,549 from the corresponding number of games in 1951. The National League has suffered more, having drawn 287,012 fewer cash customers compared to the American League's drop of 154,537.

Despite their fall from top position in the American League to third, Cleveland Indians showed the way in attendance figures with a total of 591,161 in 32 home games. New York Yankees were close behind with 583,054 in the same number of games. Detroit was a surprising third with 493,507 for 30 home tilts.

Chicago Cubs, who yesterday ended a nine-game losing streak, all on the road, paced the National League with 462,563 paid admissions. Brooklyn's league-leading Dodgers were second followed by New York Giants and St. Louis Cardinals.

Boston's Braves, wallowing in seventh place, have had wretched luck at the turnstiles, having enclosed only 111,445 fans to Braves Field in 25 home games. That's an average of only 4,458 a game. Philadelphia Athletics have been the poorest drawing club in the American League with only 107,110 in 27 home games.
