Those Hockey Trophies

ISLAND Senior Hockey League president, Danny McCormack, has asked us to mention once again the various trophies that are up for grabs this season in the ISHL. Of course, all are awarded on the basis of play in the regular schedule and nothing done in playoffs will affect the selections. There appeared to be some slight misunderstanding on these trophies, so we hope we do not add more confusion to the situation.

The Medical Pharmacy trophy and the Maritime Central Airways trophy are awards that do not become the permanent possession of any team or individual. Each year they are up for competition. The HCA trophy goes to the team emerging the victor in ISHL playdowns. The Medical Pharmacy award goes each year to the player who amasses the greatest number of scoring points in regular league play.

The Waite Pharmacy trophy is another award that passes from one to another. It goes to the player combining sportsmanship with playing ability throughout the regular season. Last year Benny Grady copped the award.

The rest of the trophies become the permanent possession of the parties receiving them. The Charlottetown and District Labor Council has one for the best defenceman in the league; the Garrison Sergeants' Mess for the league's most valuable player; the Main Branch Naval Veterans' Association trophy to the goaltender who has played the most games with the team that has the best goals-against average; the Spring Park Service Station trophy to the goaltender adjudged the biggest asset to his team.

The best defenceman, the most valuable player, the goaltender adjudged the biggest asset and the player best combining ability and sportsmanship will be selected by Mike Hennessey, Norman Macdonald, Jim Kennedy and Pius Callaghan. Each selector will make three choices and values will be fixed at \$-3-1. Sure hope it's clear this time.

NEW YORK (CP) — New York Rangers overcame an early Detroit Red Wing lead Wednesday night and battled to a 2-2 tie in a National Hockey League contest.

Detroit, one point back of New York in the struggle for the fourth and last playoff spot, had leads of 1-0 and 2-1 with New York coming back to tie it each time.

Andy Bathgate, the league's leading scorer, got the tying goal for Rangers in the last minute of the middle period. The third period was scoreless.

Bathgate's goal, which carried off the skate of Red Wing defenceman Marcel Pronovost, was his 20th of the season. He now has 64 points, four ahead of Detroit's Gordie Howe, who was shut out Wednesday night.

Evinrudes Nip 'Birds' 6-5 In Third Period Comeback

SUMMERSIDE — The Cape Traverse Evinrudes snatched victory from defeat in dramatic fashion at Civic Stadium in Summerside last night. Bobby MacWilliams scoring the winning goal at 17:44 of the third period to beat the Old Spout Penguins 6-5 and take a commanding three games to one lead in the semi-final "B" series of the ISHL play-offs.

The Cape team was down 5-3 with half the third period gone, but managed to score three goals and take the verdict.

The Evinrudes were leading 2-0 at the end of the first period. The Penguins came strong in the middle session scoring four goals to a single tally for the Cape crew, making the score 4-3.

The Penguins increased their margin to 5-3 early in the third period and looked good to skate off with the victory, but the Evinrudes kept digging and shot three more goals without an answer from the visiting club.

Allison "Hook" Walsh scored two goals for the winners, and

gunner McCormack potted a fed it to Ev White uncovered just outside the crease. McInnis couldn't do anything with White's quick flip and the period ended with the Penguins leading 4-3.

McCormack made it 5-3 after 14 minutes of the third period, and over half the frame was over before the Evinrudes staged their comeback. Charlie Sark scored from Al Andrews at 11:27. Walsh got his second goal, again on a solo effort four minutes later, and Bob MacWilliams fired the big one with a little more than two minutes left in the game.

Lloyd "Toy-Toy" Gallant got an elbowing penalty with 53 seconds left, and coach Duck Acorn pulled his goalie for an extra forward, but the Evinrudes managed to hold them at bay.

Referee Joe Bernard and Ron Babineau handed out minor penalties, two majors and two misconducts.

Cameron Needs One Win To Retain Consols Ch'ship

The Doug Cameron rink of Charlottetown needs one more triumph to retain the British Consols championship won a year ago in Summerside.

Last night at Charlottetown Curling rink Doug and his associates handed Myron Bell's foursome its first loss of the week-long competition 8-4. The victory assured the Cameron clan of a berth in the finals.

Doug plays again Friday night at 8:30 against an opponent yet to be determined. If Cameron wins that one, it's all over. If he loses he gets another chance on Saturday afternoon.

Last night's decision by Doug was his fifth without a loss. Bell now owns a 4-1 mark the same as Art Burke who ousted Dr. Wen MacDonald from the championship division.

The RCAF rinks were bracketed together and W.T. Evans stayed alive in the hunt for the British Consols trophy with a 10-3 decision over Hugh Spicer.

Jim Burden and Andy Humphrey staged a bitter fight in their meeting. Humphrey had a 6-0 lead after three and seemed headed for a lopsided triumph. However, the Burden rink became alive and won six of the next eight ends to lead 10-8 entering the twelfth. But Humphrey was far from finished. He fought back with a pair and forced the affair into overtime.

In the 13th Humphrey managed a singleton and advanced along the championship trail to meet the winner of the W.T. Evans — Art Burke match which goes at 8 o'clock today. Humphrey sees action at 8:30 tonight.

These two matches are the only ones on schedule today in the championship division.

Four previously undefeated quartets meet in the afternoon battle and the Cameron and Bell rinks came through to qualify for the night clash with each other.

Burke won five ends to Bell's four. The rinks put up zeros in the third, fifth and twelfth, the Bell foursome managed a pair of threes in the sixth and ninth and the best Burke could do was double in the eighth. The loser's four others came on singletons.

Cameron had no trouble whatever with Spicer, romping to an easy 14-4 triumph that was conceded after 11 ends. Doug had 3's in the fourth, seventh and eleventh. Spicer was able to muster singles in the third, fifth, eighth and tenth.

Jim Burden ousted Dan O'Rourke in a hard fought 15-10 afternoon's clash. At the same time on other ice lanes, Dr. Wen MacDonald sidelined Summerside's Bert Hunter 16-12 and Andy Humphrey crushed Eric Johnston of Summerside 13-2. This match was halted after 18 ends of play.

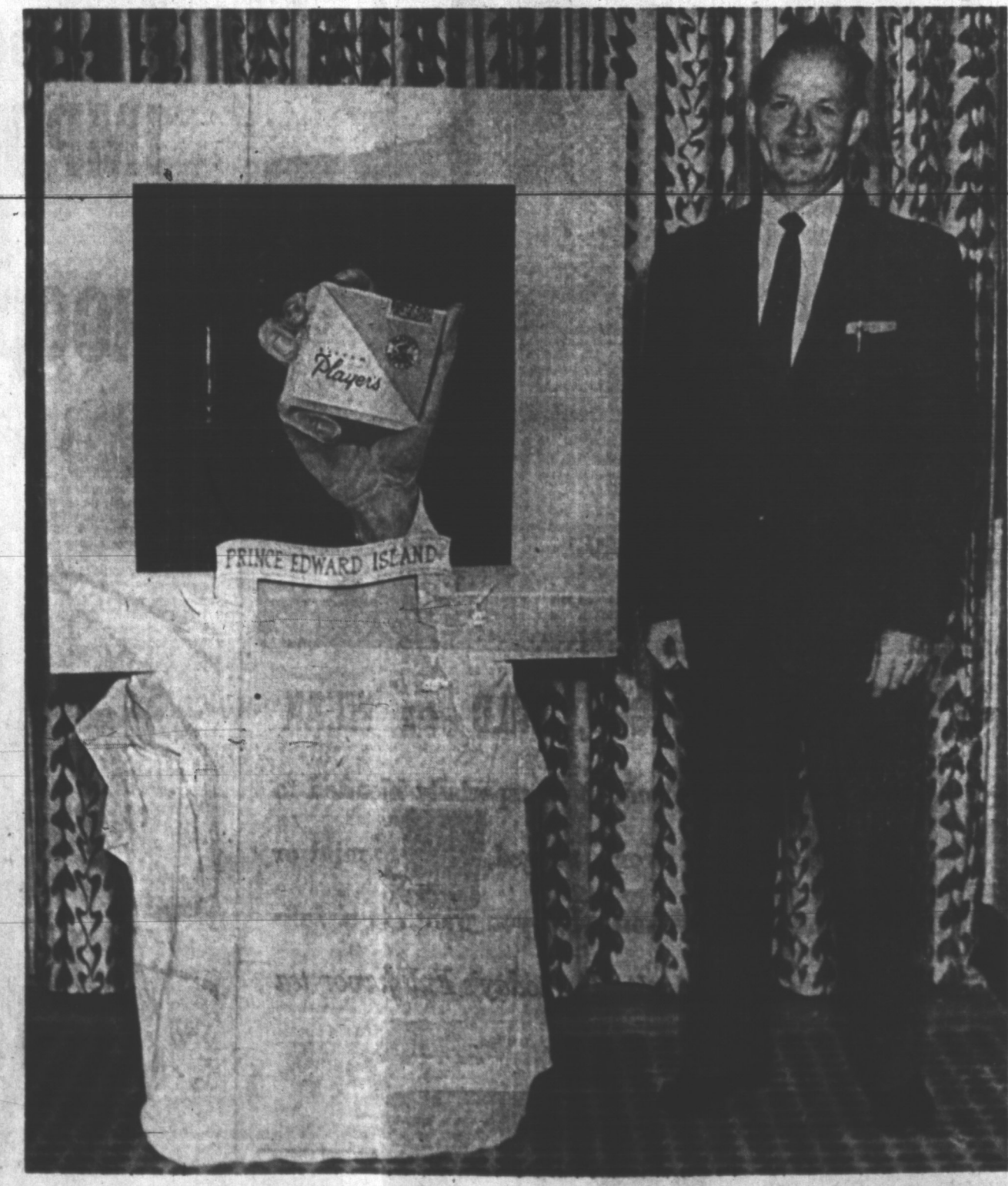
Busher Jackson Suffers Seizure

Jackson was stricken while visiting the press room at Maple Leaf Gardens where Leafs, the team he was on in his heyday, were playing Boston.
