First Space Girl Becomes Sweetheart Of Russians

MOSCOW (AP)—The Soviet Union's first space girl, her "rainbow blue eyes" sparkling and her nose bruised, landed safely in Siberia Wednesday a few hours ahead of her male partner after a history-making orbital flight.

Valentina Tereshkova, 26, blonde and dimpled-cheeked parachutist now, the sweetheart of Russia, circled the globe more than 48 times, covering more than 1,240,000 miles in 71 hours.

Col. Valery Bykovskiy, 26, almost "a forgotten man" of the space flight, also landed safely and covered more than 2,000,000 miles.

The blonde who flashed the first female smile through the Russian news conference almost immediately with a call from Premier Khrushchev.

Her dramatic descent into an area where the car used to land followed flights completed a cosmic flight matched by no other.

She parted with a piece of "holo" out of her mouth as she cut loose with a piece of party rhetoric.

Clergy Changes Are Announced

Very Rev. P. F. MacDonald, chancellor of the Diocese of Charlottetown for the past 13 years, has been appointed pastor of St. Pius X. Parish, Parkside, effective July 4. It was announced last night by Most Rev. M. A. MacEachern, DD, bishop of Charlottetown.

Other appointments announced by Bishop MacEachern, also to be effective July 4 are as follows:

Rev. John Cash, assistant at St. Mary's Parish, Souris, has been named assistant at St. Dunstan's Basilica; Rev. Robert Khrushchev, assistant at Parkside, has been named assistant at Souris; Rev. Faber MacDonald, assistant at St. Dunstan's Basilica, will remain in this position and in addition will be vice-chancellor.

Very Rev. P. F. MacDonald will continue as chancellor of the diocese for a time, and Rev. P. Andrew MacDonald will remain on at Parkside.

Father P. F. MacDonald, a native of Grand Tracadie, attended Prince of Wales College and graduated from St. Dunstan's University in 1941. He attended Holy Heart Seminary, Halifax, and was ordained to the priesthood at Corran Barr in 1945. He was assistant at St. Dunstan's Basilica from 1945-50, and chancellor of the diocese from 1950 until the present time.

Father John Cash was born in Detroit, Michigan, and received his primary education at Kinkora. He graduated from St. Dunstan's University in 1961, attended Augustine's Seminary, and was ordained in 1965. He has been assistant at Souris for several years. ATLANTIC CITY, N.J. (AP)—A newly noted mystery germ which apparently can cause a tuberculosis-like disease in humans is creating new problems in the medical world, an army doctor says.

A real oddball in the brigade of microbes, the germ still does not have a scientific name and is being tentatively labeled as the "anonymous mycobacterium." Capt John N. Albertson of Valley Forge General Hospital, Chaptinville, Pa., told the American Medical Association's annual meeting Tuesday.

"A mycobacterium is a rod-shaped bacillus, as distinguished from certain other forms of bacteria, such as 'strep' germs which are round and often occur in long chains. In the category of the mycobacteria fall the germs of tuberculosis and leprosy.

Although the mystery germ appears to cause a disease like tuberculosis, it has various characteristics differing from those of the tuberculosis germ, and so far, it has shown resistance to standard anti-tuberculosis drugs.

Cardinals Locked In Conclave To Begin Election Of New Pope

VATICAN CITY (AP)—Preceded by a glittering crowd of Roman Catholic cardinals slowly made their way into the Vatican's Sistine Chapel Wednesday night and had themselves locked into a secret conclave to elect a new pope.

Gravely, the princes of the Catholic church—many of them aged and bent—opened their proceedings to name a successor to Pope John XXIII. Earlier they had called on the Holy Ghost to guide them.

By their manner they showed their own appraisal of the most important of this century with great questions of future policy involved.

The cardinals, clad in violet, walked to the conclave area behind acolytes holding aloft a cross and lighted candles. In attitudes of deep thought, the cardinals went to the Sistine Chapel—their place of decision—where they gave an oath of secrecy and promised to resist all outside pressures in selecting the 26th supreme pontiff of the Roman Catholic Church. They must remain in the conclave area until they have completed the task.

Even as they mediated and prayed, reports circulated that the first day of balloting today might see the election of Giovanni Battista Cardinal Montini, 65-year-old Archbishop of Milan.

Cardinal Montini, a progressive, is the acknowledged favorite. He is believed to command 30 to 40 votes. It requires 54 votes for election and there was a widespread feeling that the Milan archbishop might reach this number quickly—or not at all.

Francis Cardinal Spellman, Archbishop of New York and one of the reputed "pope makers," conferred with Montini Tuesday night.

The Turin newspaper La Stampa hinted the pair may have sought to bring together the progressive and conservative wings of the college of cardinals. Spellman generally is viewed as conservative.

One can say that the New York cardinal promised votes to Montini and in return requested the aid of the Turin archbishop in the future secretary of state.

La Stampa wrote: "A progressive pope and a conservative secretary of state would tend to balance the influence of the two groups. Presumably such an arrangement also would command wide support from the middle-of-the-road democrats."

Bombshell Move Made By Gordon

OTTAWA (CP)—In a bombshell move Finance Minister Gordon withdrew Wednesday his budget's controversial 30-per-cent "takeover" tax on large-scale sales of Canadian stocks to foreign investors.

His announcement in the Commons, following complaints from stock exchanges and other financial interests, brought stock market prices up of a severe dive.

George Nowlan, Conservative financial critic, attacked Mr. Gordon for a "stupid procedure" in disclosing his decision shortly before the stock market's close.

"I assume fortunes have been made on the rise this afternoon," Mr. Nowlan said. "The government also was faced with Conservative and New Democratic Party demands, including one from Opposition Leader Diefenbaker, for investigations of the possibility of advance 'leaks' of budget information."

Prime Minister Pearson agreed to consider such an inquiry.

REACTED SWIFTLY
Mr. Diefenbaker had asked whether Mr. Gordon had told anyone in advance of his suspension of the takeover tax, and said he was asking "because of the fact that the stock market reacted so swiftly this afternoon."

Mr. Gordon said he had told only Mr. Pearson and some other Cabinet members.

Lance E. Kindt (PC—Mod) also asked for an investigation of reports that "fabulous orders" for building materials were placed before last Thursday night.

Mr. Nowlan called the withdrawal of the tax an "amazing, historic development."

He referred to the sudden reversal of stock market prices after Mr. Gordon's announcement as an index of industrial stocks at Toronto had fallen 9.56 points to 628.70 at 2 p.m., the sharpest drop since June 2, 1962.

The minister said there have been "certain administrative difficulties" in imposition of the tax.

At the same time, he blasted Eric Kierans, president of the Montreal Stock Exchange, for his "intemperate and irresponsible" comments on the budget's measures on foreign investment as "complete and utter nonsense."
