THE FISHERY COMMISSIONERS AWARD.

It is reported here that the Fishery Commissioners have awarded FIVE AND A HALF MILLIONS OF DOLLARS for the Canadian Fisheries.

THE SCHOOL BILL.

We are informed that the Public Schools Bill, passed last winter, has at last received the assent of the Governor-General.

O'DONOGHUE'S PARDON.

That O'Donoghue should be amnestied, cannot be denied. But when the amnesty is granted on the eve of an election in which it is necessary to secure the "Irish vote," the Government is guilty of nothing more nor less than bribery.

A NATIONAL SOCIETY.

At a time when the Toronto Globe, Montreal Herald and other organs are endeavoring, for political purposes, to stir up religious strife, it is gratifying to record that a Society has been formed in Montreal.

That in the opinion of this Society it is desirable to establish a Canadian National Society, the first plank of which shall be the maintenance of affection and regard for the Mother Country.

Mr. Booker proposed, D. O. Hatton seconded, and Mr. Thomas White, of the Gazette, supported the following amendment:

1st. The maintenance of the existing feeling of loyalty to the British Crown. 2nd. The development of the sentiment of Canadian patriotism.

Mr. Trenholm, Barrister, and Mr. Desrosieres, a merchant, moved and seconded this amendment:

That a primary plank in this platform be the development of the sentiment of Canadian patriotism and harmony and good feeling among the different portions of the community.

Both amendments were put and negatived, and the motion of Mr. McMaster was carried.

THE ENTERTAINMENT LAST EVENING.

VERY wisely and well have the ladies of the City Reform Club done. The entertainment last evening was, we trust, the first of a "Winter Course."

Last evening a number of ladies and gentlemen, whom we have not before seen on the platform took part; yet the performance was, on the whole, well rendered.

THE REFORM MOVEMENT IN SOURIS.

The Temperance Reform movement is progressing favorably in Souris. At every public meeting of the Club new names are added to the roll.

On Wednesday evening, the 14th inst., a free public entertainment was given in Souris Hall.

Another public meeting was held on Wednesday, the 21st, when J. H. Fletcher, Esq., delivered his lecture—"The World's Theatre,"—to a large and appreciative audience.

Mr. Fletcher's ability as a lecturer is so well known in the Lower Provinces that it is unnecessary to give even an outline of his excellent lecture. For upwards of an hour he occupied the platform, and succeeded in delighting and instructing his hearers by his descriptions of the various characters introduced.

THE "IRISH VOTE," IN QUEBEC EAST.

M. LAURIER tried to secure the support of the Irish in Quebec East, with the following result. At a meeting of the Irish electors held at St. Roch, the following resolutions were passed unanimously.

1st. That this meeting having considered the reply made by the Hon. M. Laurier to a deputation of Irishmen who waited upon him to know his opinion regarding the unconditional pardon of Professor O'Donoghue, declares that it is not at all satisfied with the declarations of the Hon. Minister; and observing further that a rumor has been put in circulation to the effect that an unconditional pardon would be granted to the said Prof. O'Donoghue, this meeting deems the conduct of the Minister strange, in soliciting the votes of Irishmen without having consulted his colleagues or knowing their opinion on this question.

2nd. That the Irish electors of Quebec East considering the said explanations evasive and contradictory, and calling to mind the votes of the Hon. M. Laurier against an amnesty for the O'Donoghue, pledge themselves to vote against the Hon. M. Laurier and to use every legitimate influence in their power to secure his defeat.

3rd. That this meeting most emphatically condemns the policy of the McKenzie Government as ruinous to the city of Quebec, and prejudicial to the best interests of the Province, and of the Dominion of Canada.

To secure the support of those who passed the above resolution, the Government have granted O'Donoghue the pardon asked.

WAR NEWS.

[By Telegraph to Reading Room and Daily Examiner.] LONDON, Nov. 24.

A Vienna despatch says the Czarowitch's Army is 90,000 strong.

Mehemet Pasha telegraphs that a reinforcement of Russian cavalry and one of infantry, which were sent against Mevesick, were overwhelmed, and the cavalry all destroyed except six men.

A Cettinge despatch says that a battle took place near Anomaleck, in which the Montenegrins lost 40 killed and 100 wounded. Their attack has been abandoned, thus showing that the right bank of the river is not in the possession of the Montenegrins.

The report is contradicted that Austria is about to issue a diplomatic declaration, defining her interests in the Eastern Question.

The Turkish Ambassador interviewed Count Andrassy about mediation. The Count replied that mediation was inopportune, and would be disadvantageous to the Turks.

NEW YORK, Nov. 22. A special says the bombardment of Plevna has begun.

Operations near Rustchuk, reported by the Russian and Turkish bulletins, seems to indicate a disposition on the part of the Turks to attempt a repetition of Mehemit Ali's tactics for relieving Plevna by the threatening of the Czarowitch's army and Danube crossings. The Turks have repeatedly asserted that the Czarowitch's army has been materially weakened in order to strengthen other positions. Sulaiman Pasha seems to be still in command on the Lom.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Nov. 22. Steamer J. B. Walker, from New Haven, Oct. 23, with a cargo of arms and ammunition for the Turkish Government, arrived yesterday.

LONDON, Nov. 22. A Standard's special from Semlen says Serbia has strongly protested to the Porte concerning aggressions of the Bashi-Bazouks.

Martial law has been proclaimed throughout Servian frontier provinces. It is positively stated in official circles that a declaration of war may be hourly expected.

The commanders of Sistova, Simniza, Bucharest and Josly have received orders from Russian headquarters to prepare all possible means of transport for wounded men.

FRENCH NEWS

PARIS, Nov. 23. The Republique Francaise, Gambetta's organ, demands that McMahon summon a Congress of Senate and Deputies to put an end to the crisis.

An election in the ninth arrondissement of Paris for a Deputy in the place of Jules Grevey, re-elected for both that place and Dole, Department of Jura, but sits for the latter, is fixed for December 19th.

Difficulties reported this morning to have arisen in the formation of the new Cabinet relative to the Ministry of the Interior and to the Ministry of Justice, for which De Meiche and DePeyne were respectively proposed, and other appointments in their stead must be made.

GENERAL NEWS.

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 22. Arrived, steamer City of Peking, via Yokohama, from Hong Kong, Oct. 24, and Shanghai Oct. 25.

The devastation by famine continues through the northern provinces. Preparations are being made for a heavy campaign against Kashgaran Provinces next spring.

Governor Hennessy, of Hong Kong, is exciting bitter hostility among the British residents by his resolution to ameliorate the treatment of the Chinese in the colony.
