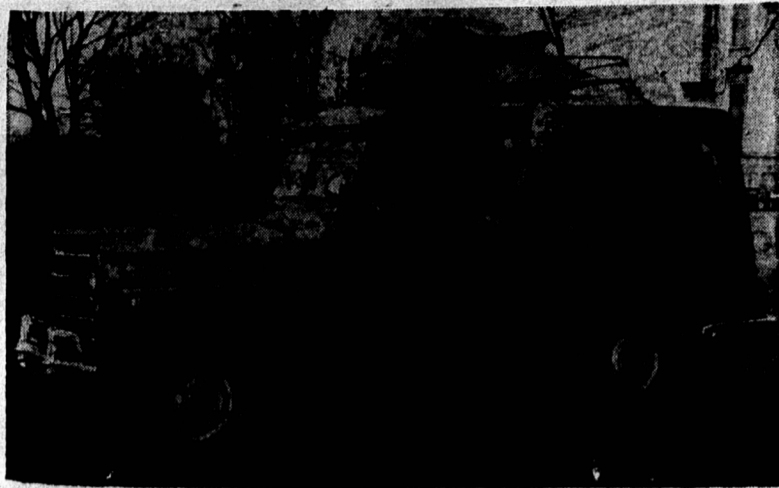

As aids to competing groups he suggested more practical help,

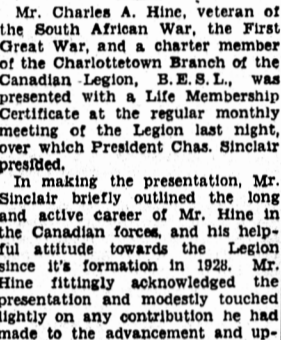

Mr. Percy W. Turner, Charlottetown, who was yesterday elected a director of Rotary International at the big Rotary convention in Mexico City.

Mr. Charles A. Hine, veteran of the South African War, the First Great War, and a charter member of the Charlottetown Branch of the Canadian Legion, B.E.S.L., was presented with a Life Membership Certificate at the regular monthly meeting of the Legion last night, over which President Chas. Sinclair presided.

In making the presentation, Mr. Sinclair briefly outlined the long and active career of Mr. Hine in the Canadian forces, and his helpful attitude toward the Legion since its formation in 1923.

Mr. Hine fittingly acknowledged the presentation and modestly touched lightly on any contribution he had made to the advancement and up-building of the Legion.

Later in the evening, Mr. Hine in reminiscing on his army experience, recalled some of the peculiar features of the South African campaign.

"We left here on October 25, 1899," said Mr. Hine, and boarded the Sardinian at Quebec. I had previously been in the permanent army corps and was discharged on May 18th, 1897, after serving my time. This previous service proved to be valuable, because an experienced man among a body of raw recruits, can always smooth the way, to some extent, for the younger untried chaps who find routine irksome and restraining at times, until he discovers what it is all about.

NON-RESIDENT ANGLERS FINED — Yesterday morning at Souris, Stipendiary Magistrate Joseph W. MacDonald imposed a fine of \$5.00 each or 10 days on 5 non-resident anglers charged under the Game Act with angling for trout without licenses. The defendants, four from Dartmouth, N. B., and one from Havelock, N. B., were also required to purchase licenses at \$3.00 each. The offenses were committed at Sturgeon and Cardigan. The cases were investigated and prosecuted by the Provincial Police Constable.

TRAFFIC INCREASE REPORTED — There were 144 more trucks ferried on the Northumberland Ferries route this month to the 27th than during the same period last year. However, the increase to 577 trucks might have been considerably greater had it not been for ice hampering the boats at the start of the season. At the same time 4,656 passengers were transported on the Prince Nova and Charles A. Dunning, compared to 4,704 a year ago. The number of automobiles crossing this month was also slightly below the figure for last May with 1,126 compared to 1,300.

SHIPPING OFFICIAL HERE — Mr. F. W. Russell, General Manager of the Blue Peter S. S. Line, owners of the Blue Prince now in dry dock at Pictou undergoing repairs, arrived in the city yesterday and will re-load the boat with livestock and other cargo now unloaded in Pictou, and proceed to St. John's, Nfld., when the Blue Seal will resume her normal run between Montreal and Goose Bay, Labrador.

WORKMEN FOR LABRADOR — Recruiting of tradesmen and laborers for the vast projects in Labrador is being carried out at the National Employment Office in Charlottetown. Interviewing of applicants by a company representative began yesterday afternoon when about fifty men called at the office. A number of these were accepted and if they pass the required medical examination will proceed to Labrador in the next few days. The interviewing of applicants will continue for a week or ten days, and it is expected that the campaign will absorb any men who are unemployed in Kings and Queens Counties. Eight men who were previously accepted will leave for Moncton enroute to the location of the work by C.N.R. on Monday coming.

MONTHLY MEETING OF CANADIAN LEGION At the regular monthly meeting of the Canadian Legion, held at their hall last evening, and presided over by President C.M. Sinclair, the fairly large audience received encouraging reports from the various committees. Extensive repairs are being made to the exterior of the building and an entirely new front concrete wall, nicely designed and completed with wide steps, when finished will add to the appearance of the quarters.
