TWENTY HERE AND BOSTON.—Attention is directed to the advertisement of the Canada Atlantic and Plant Steamship Line in this issue, which announces a change in the sailing dates of the steamers from Halifax to Boston and back. After September 20, the bi-weekly service to Halifax will be discontinued and the regular fall and winter service will begin September 25, a steamer leaving Halifax every Wednesday morning at 8 a. m., and Boston to return at noon on Saturdays. The Florida will leave Charlottetown every Friday evening and Halifax every Saturday morning, and Boston to return every Tuesday at 10 a. m., until the close of navigation.

MR. BAYFIELD'S BENEFIT.—Mr. Bayfield's Entertainment in the Masonic Temple last night drew a very fair audience. In the Execution Scene from Damon and Pythias, the acting of Mr. Bayfield was splendid. Mr. Armand, as Democles, was a distinct success. He interpreted the character gracefully and with dignity. The part of Pythias was well taken by Mr. Arthur Peake, and the scene and costumes were excellently managed. Another good thing was the scene from "Leah the Forsaken," in which Miss May Kelley took the part of Leah, and Mr. Bayfield that of Rudolph. To balance the tragedy, a farce completed the programme; and although the transition from the sublime to the ridiculous was rather sudden, the audience laughed heartily at Debbly, and Joe and Tom. Throughout the evening, Mr. Vinicombe's orchestra delighted the audience.

AN EXPLANATION.—A few days ago, THE EXAMINER published a report that an abandoned schooner, with all sail set, had been found at sea. The following explanation is now sent from North Sydney: "The schooner St. Clair left Twillingate for North Sydney August 22nd, and on Saturday morning about 2 o'clock, with a heavy sea running, she struck a rock off First Island. The vessel went over on her beam ends, and the captain and crew abandoned her and landed on the Island just before daylight. The wind changing, the schooner floated off, and at daylight she was seen about two miles from shore, drifting by Scatterie, where she was later picked up by the steamer Delta. All sail being set, the schooner drifted so fast the crew in the boat found it impossible to catch her. They, therefore, tried to engage a tug to go in pursuit of her, but were unable to secure one. The captain and crew were brought here in a small schooner this morning."

WINDSOR CHAMPIONSHIPS.—A large number of spectators from all over the province attended the amateur championship sports at Windsor on Wednesday afternoon. The events were decided on the well appointed grounds at that place, and everything passed off very successfully. Forbes, of the Wanderers, won the 100 yards and 200 yards races, and secured a record of 19 1/2 seconds by beating the pistol. Riggles, of Halifax, won the pole vault at 9 ft. 2 in. Forbes won the 220 yards in 2 3/4 secs. McIntosh had a soft thing in the 800 and mile runs, making them in 2:05 and 4:4 1/2 respectively. Gonthro, the Cape Breton man, had a walk over in the 16-lb. hammer and 16-lb. shot. The former he threw 80 ft. and the latter 33 ft. Coombs, of St. John, won the 120 yards hurdle race in 17 1/2 seconds. The best race was the 440 yards. Braly, of Halifax, ran a great race from start to finish in 52 1/2 seconds. McVicar, of Halifax, took the 500 yard walk in 27 minutes 21 1/2 seconds. Coombs won the broad jump with 18 ft. 11 1/2 in. Riggles jumped 5 ft. 8 in. and won the high jump. Laflaw won the half-mile bicycle race in 1:17; also the one-mile in 2:57. Coruwallis won the 3 miles in 8:34, making a new record. Next year's championships will probably be decided at Halifax. At the electric light sports in the evening Bailey won the three events, viz., one-third of a mile, slow race and three-mile handicap.

ANOTHER VENDOR FOR THE CITY.—We learn that the Government are about to appoint a fourth Vendor under the Scott Act for Charlottetown, and that the appointment will, in all probability be made at the meeting of the Executive Council which takes place the first of next week.

ANOTHER Sudden DEATH.—The sad news of the death of William, eldest son of Mr. William Connolly of St. Peter's Road, was brought to town this morning. The young man, who was about twenty-one years old, was working about yesterday, as usual. Last night, when going to bed, it is said he found a lat in one of the rooms and it is thought that the excitement of chasing it out of the house did him harm, as it is believed he suffered with heart disease. This morning he did not come down as usual and the younger children, going up to wake him, found his dead body in the bed, the mouth stained with blood.

THE LATE CHAS. E. ROBERTSON.—The remains of the late Councillor Charles E. Robertson, who was accidentally killed at Kensington yesterday, were brought to the city last evening in the mail special. Hundreds were at the station when the train arrived about 7:20 o'clock. The casket containing the remains was carried from the train to Messrs. Mark Wright & Co.'s hearse by their employees, and then conveyed to the cemetery and deposited on Easton Street East, near the P. E. I. Hospital, followed by an immense crowd of sorrowing friends and acquaintances. The streets along the route of the procession were lined with people. A large number viewed the remains at the home of the deceased.

The funeral will take place to-morrow afternoon at 3 o'clock, to the People's Cemetery. He will be buried with Masonic honors. Rev. Mr. Fullerton will conduct the service at the house and grave. The City Council, firemen and policemen will attend, and the funeral procession will be led by the Citizens Band. The casket will be carried on the Salvage Co's wagon, which will be drawn by the fire department. Following will be the pall-bearers Messrs. H. M. Davison, W. D. McKay, D. Nicholson, Peay Pope, Charles Lyons and Charles McGregor. It has been suggested that, as a special mark of sympathy and respect, the stores of the city be closed to-morrow from two o'clock to four.
